The Lord Your God Is Testing You

"Christendom" in our land struggles how to deal with homosexuality. A quick Google search will reveal how many denominations are changing their teachings. Within the last year, the United Methodist Church has a major doctrinal shift and two distinct Methodist groups now exist. Others who have ordained homosexuals as church leaders included the Evangelical Lutheran Church (since 2010), the Presbyterian Church USA (since 2012), the Episcopal Church, the Disciples of Christ, the Reformed Church in America, the Mennonite Church in the USA (2013) and a host of others in our land are struggling in their conventions about what they should teach.

Internationally, the same is true. Ordination of homosexuals is practiced in the Anglican Church of Canada (since 2016); The Anglican Church in New Zealand; the Anglican churches in South Africa, Brazil, Wales, Ireland and South India. The same is true of the Reformed churches in Switzerland; the Protestant Church in the Netherlands; the Church of Sweden;

> The Danish National Church; the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Finland; the Church of Iceland and scores of others.

> Homosexuality is just one aspect of the fact that mankind, while claiming to deeply love the Lord, has failed God's testing of their love. The very basis of religious division and denominations is when we are ignoring what God says about a matter and then failing the test. Our world has failed the test of how

to worship, baptism, the Lord's supper, the role of women in the public assemblies and most important of all in teaching what one must do to be saved.

Let me appeal to every member of the Lord's church. Read Deuteronomy 13, and see that those who are advocating changes in His church are failing the test. If we truly love the Lord, we will realize that God's tests will confront us to allow us to visually see if our understanding of it means to know the depth of our love for Him. South Florida has a ground water issue that not many other places in the U.S. deal with—the salinization of fresh water aguifers. Since 1985, there has been an increase in the salinity of the Biscayne Aguifer. In that time, there has been a 12-17% decrease in available freshwater. There are

many factors, one of those is the amount of fresh water pumped out. If it is not replaced, it leaves room for salt water to seep in if the aguifer is inside the salt-What are we water intrusion line. It is a threat to the purity of our water. There is a similar threat to the church.

We are here in this world and we are charged to keep the church "without spot or wrinkle" (Eph. 5:27). What are we allowing to seep into the church? The world around us is far from holy. The

United States is seemingly more and more polarized on issues. Many are getting a steady diet of half-truths and politicized information, all of which drives a larger wedge between neighbors. While in the recent past we may have been able to talk about these differences and still be civil, even friendly, it seems like that ability is also slipping away. Is that also seeping into the church?

To keep the influences of the world around us out we must stand on the truth of God's word. There is a lot of information out there that is being spun in every direction. The church should not be a place where that happens. "I write so that you will know how one ought to conduct himself in the household of God, which is the church of the living God, the pillar and support of the truth" (1 Tim. 3:15). Filling our hearts up with His truth should leave little room for the deception that is in the world. "Your word I have treasured in my heart, that I may not sin against You" (Psa. 119:11).

> To keep the influences of the world around us out of the church we must strive for unity. It is what Christ prayed for (John 17:21-22). It was what Paul prescribed for the churches (1 Cor. 1:10; Eph. 4:3). "Make my joy complete by being of the same mind, maintaining the same love, united in spirit, intent on one purpose. Do nothing from selfishness or empty conceit, but with humility of mind regard

one another as more important than yourselves; do not merely look out for your own personal interests, but also for the interests of others" (Phil. 2:2-4). Do your part to maintain unity in the church (Rom. 12:18).

Lastly, to keep the influences out we must labor in love. "Beyond all these things put on love, which is the perfect bond of unity" (Col. 3:14). Love looks for the best in others and keeps no record of wrongs (1 Cor. 13:4-7). We will need all of these and more for the church to keep the world out.

"God, help me to have this focus"

When Paul wrote the book of Romans, he told the church that his "heart's desire and prayer to God for Israel is that they may be saved" (10:1), and he went so far as to say, "I could wish that I myself were accursed from Christ for my brethren," so that they might be saved (9:3). Paul wanted all people to be saved, but have you ever considered what these folks had done to him?

They spent time "contradicting and blasphemfor the Dav ing" and "opposed the things" that he spoke (Acts 13:45). They "stirred up" a revolt, "raised up persecution" and "expelled" Paul from their region (13:50). They "poisoned" the minds of the multitudes (14:2) and made a "violent attempt...to abuse and stone" (14:5). Eventually they "stoned Paul and dragged him out of the city" (14:19).

Yet, after years and years of this kind of treatment, he was still willing to be accursed from Christ, if that meant they could be saved. Paul looked beyond himself to the eternal salvation of even his enemies. Here's the question: Do we do that for those who have done us wrong? - DS

Opportunities abound

As we know, opportunities to do wrong and to gratify the flesh abound all around us. And sometimes Christians think that they can take advantage of their "forgiving God" who "always forgives them," and use that liberty to do some things that they should not. Paul warned about this in Galatians 5:13 -"For you, brethren, have been called to liberty; only do not use

> liberty as an opportunity for the flesh..." Meditate on that for a moment.

> As we know, opportunities to do right and to make a difference in the lives of others abound all around us. Do you not have just as many, if not more, opportunities to do good during your

day than to do evil? That's why Paul went on in that same verse to say, "...do not use liberty as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love [use liberty as an opportunity to] serve one another."

Opportunities abound all around us! For good and for evil. For right and for wrong. For helping people and for hurting people. Which opportunities will we choose? -DS



5 Essentials in Raising Respectful Teenagers



"Ferris Bueller's Day Off" is a great movie. This is almost an objective fact. The humor is driven by the idea that this high school kid is significantly more clever and intelligent than any and all adults he encounters. It, of course, plays to what all teenagers know to be true: They are smarter than the adults who try to tell them what to do. If you have a teenager, this dynamic is not news to you.

Teens distrust authority. This is both developmental (pushing boundaries) and a result of the seemingly daily dose of information we get about authority figures who have failed us (see church abuse, political scandal, incidents of police brutality). And yet we know that authority isn't inherently bad. In fact, in most cases, our teens need to respect authority to thrive in life. Here are 5 essentials in raising respectful teenagers.

1. Be honest.

Don't lie to your teen. Certain teachers, ministers, politicians, police officers, and others in authority do terrible things. Dismissing the truth about them because you're afraid your teen then will distrust all authority simply reinforces the idea that authority figures (e.g., you) can't be trusted. Raising respectful teenagers begins with being honest with them.

2. Be the change you wish to see.

If you want to prove that authority figures are worthy of respect, be the kind of authority figure who is worthy of respect. Make a list of what you want your teen to have modeled for him or her in their authority figures. Then ask yourself: "Do I display this for my teens? Are they more or less likely to trust authority figures based on their interactions with me?"

3. Be intentional.

While most of the authority figures your teen will interact with are not ones you get to choose, you can be intentional about creating connections with adults who model the kind of integrity you want your child to see. Do you know someone who is in a position of authority who models what you want your teen to see? Be intentional about spending time with that person and your teen. Expose your teens to folks who are worthy of their respect. Then talk with them about that experience.

4. Be respectful to authority yourself.

Raising respectful teenagers is as much about modeling as anything. How do you respond to the authority figures in your life? How do you talk about your parents? What do you say about your boss while at home? How do you speak about politicians? You are teaching your teen how to view authority the same way you view authority. Be respectful.

5. Be respectful to teens.

It's easy for us to dismiss the concerns of teens as naïve or self-centered or simply ignorant of how the "real world" works. However, raising respectful teenagers is impossible if your teen doesn't feel respected him or herself. Of course you still need to correct your teen and challenge him or her. But dismissing a teen's viewpoints or refusing to take a teen seriously is a great way to undermine his or her ability to respect you—and all other authority figures.


