## **After a Covenant Is Confirmed**

The Gentile churches in Galatia were being troubled by Judaizing teachers who sought to bind the keeping of the Old Testament law (specifically circumcision) on them. Both Jews and Gentiles could recognize that God's threefold promise to the fathers was that every family on the earth

would be blessed (Gen. 12:3). These teachers made the keeping of the law absolutely essential to obtaining this blessing. The church at Rome also had this problem. There is no way

Paul answers this false teaching by looking to change a coveat a secular promise or covenant. He looked at an ordinary covenant and states, "Though it is only a man's covenant, yet if it is confirmed no one annuls sealed and delivor adds to it" (Gal. 3:15). Think of a business contract which once it is "signed, sealed and delivered," it cannot be changed.

The covenant made with the fathers was given and confirmed by God. God made the covenant (and remember He cannot lie) and sealed it with an oath. He swore by Himself that He would keep that covenant promise (Heb. 6:13-18). That covenant was "signed, sealed and delivered" and nothing could change it.

Now note how Paul uses the simple truth about ordinary business contracts (covenants). He first shows that the covenant was given before circumcision. The covenant was made in Genesis 13 and circumcision was given 20 years later in Genesis 17. Read Romans 4:9-12 to see this "time" argument. Paul makes the same "time" argument to the Galatians when he clearly states that the law came 430 years after the covenant. Thus, neither circumcision nor the law have anything to do with God's confirmed covenant.

> What is the significance of this to us and how does the "time" argument impact us? God has made a New Covenant (testament) with us. Like He gave the covenant with the fathers and confirmed it, He has given a new covenant with us.

How did He confirm this New Covenant? Read the closing verses of Mark. "So then, after the Lord had spoken to them, He was received up into heaven, and sat down at the right hand of God. And

they went out and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them and confirming the word through accompanying signs" (Mark 16:19-20). Those miracles were the confirmation. They were God's seal of the New Testament.

Those miracles no longer exist. The dead are no longer being raised! The covenant has been given and confirmed. What follows is that once given and confirmed, "No one annuls or adds to it." No synod, convention, church hierarchy or pastor can make a single change to it. Think about this!!



#### Let's See How They Are Doing

Unquestionably, the apostle Paul was one of the greatest soul winners of all time! We could learn a lot by trying to emulate his love for lost souls and his determination to teach the good news of "Jesus Christ and Him crucified" (1 Cor. 2:2) to every individual he encountered (from the lowliest of

slaves to the highest of kings). But, there is something more we can learn from this great apostle.

Paul was not merely concerned with getting folks baptized. Are we guilty of that sometimes? Do we focus so much on the culmination of seeing someone immersed into Christ that we neglect to follow up in the days after their conversion? When Paul was getting ready to embark on his second mis- until they mature someone's own handwriting. In this card you could sionary journey, he said to Barnabas, "Let us now go

back and visit our brethren in every city where we have preached the word of the Lord, and see how they are doing" (Acts 15:36). Did you catch that? Let's go and see how they are doing! Their continued growth as babes in Christ was so critically important!

That reality has not changed! Just as newborn babies need special care and attention until they grow to take care of themselves, so babes in Christ need special care and attention until they mature to a stronger faith in Christ. They need this attention from the elders. They need this attention from special programs in the church. Truly, they need this attention from every member of the body of Christ.

Brethren, do you know someone who was recently converted to Christ? Maybe in the last few weeks, but even in the last year or two? Let us make up our minds to see how they are doing by:

> 1. Texting them. Just a short note of encouragement from a fellow Christian can make a huge difference.

> 2. Calling them. A text is nice but hearing someone's voice on the phone is even better.

> 3. Sending them a handwritten card. There's something particularly effective about seeing a message in say, "Here's something that has helped me as a Chris-

tian-to grow and to remain faithful."

4. Intentionally seeking them out at services. Don't just wait and "if we happen to run into each, I'll say something." Make it a point to find them.

5. Spend time with them outside of services. Build a relationship with them, so that they truly feel a part of the family of God. What you do for them, they will do for other converts.

Let's decide today to go and see how they are doing! Let's decide today to help them to remain faithful!

## The Bible Under Attack, Again

"Do not move the ancient boundary which your fathers have set" (Prov. 22:28). A warning from the Proverbs that was set forth in Torah law. It carries with the concept of not moving the established teaching or thought on a matter. Today it seems almost fashionable to change established thought

on a matter. Marriage, no longer just between man and a woman. Sexual identity, no longer just male and female. Moving the divinely appointed boundaries crehad many critics,

ates a ripple effect that cascades through our collective understanding. Another boundary was moved in Nashville, Tennessee recently.

Josh Scott, spiritual guru at the Grace Pointe Church, has claimed that the Bible is not the inspired and infallible work of God. He stated that, "As Pro-

gressive Christians, we're open to the tensions and inconsistencies in the Bible. We know that it can't live up to impossible, modern standards. We strive to more clearly articulate what Scripture is and isn't...The Bible isn't: the Word of God, selfinterpreting, a science book, an answer/rule book, inerrant or infallible. Rather, it is: a product of community, a library of texts, multi-vocal, a human response to God, living and dynamic" (Leonardo Blair, "The Christian Post"). He goes on to claim that the Bible contains things that are against the nature of God like genocide. People have used these passages to support segregation, slavery and white supremacy. This obviously received some backlash from the "Christian" community. It did receive praise from an unlikely source. Hemant Metha from the Friendly Atheist wrote, "Those are the words of someone who's actually read the Bible. Good on him."

The only thing mentioned about Mr. Scott's concept of the Bible that is accurate is that is not a science book or even just a rule book. Beyond that he drops off the edge of

> understanding, established concepts and reasoning about the Scriptures. If you move this landmark into the realm of "a product of community, a library of texts, multi-vocal, a human response to God, living and dynamic," then you have replaced Divine authority with human authority. This Bible is not God's redemptive message to man, it is man's concept of God. All hail the golden calf.

How should we respond? "Continue in the things you have learned and become convinced of ... you have known the sacred writings which are able to give you the wisdom that leads to salvation... All Scripture is inspired by God and profitable" (2 Tim. 3:14-16a). This is not the first religious organization to criticize the Bible. The Catholic church burned every English copy they could find when it was first translated, along with the people translating it. Truth will always win out. The Bible has had many critics, but they all eventually fade away.

#### Believe it or not, it's hard not being a Christian

Some people think that being a Christian is the hardest life to live. Unfortunately, they look at the commandments of God as "negative restrictions" rather than "positive opportunities" and "for our good always." They think that living the life of the world is much easier.

Did you know this verse is in the Bible? Proverbs 13:15 states, "The way of transgressors is hard." Think about that. Could that be true? Could it actually be hard to live a life of unfaithfulness to the Lord? Some folks would immediately say, "No way!"

Consider one example. When a person lies about something, now they have to remember "two realities": the true one and the one they made up. They also have to remember to whom they told the "alternate reality" and when they told them. It's much easier, in the long run, to just tell the truth to everyone. Is it "difficult" sometimes (Matt. 7:14)? Sure it is. But "difficult" does not mean "worse"! In fact, after regular practice, "difficult" becomes a desired (yeah, easy and preferable) way of life! - DS

May we so fall in love with Jesus and with serving others that our own reflection loses its appeal! - DS

# 8 Reasons Your Kids Are Misbehaving



Every parent deals with kids misbehaving from time to time. Sometimes, as parents, we think our kids are just being bad when there may be more going on under the surface that we need to address. Why do kids misbehave? While there may be many reasons for kids misbehaving, here are 8 that every parent must consider.

#### 1. They have an irregular/unhealthy diet.

Bottom line: What kids eat has an effect on how they behave. Doctors have been saying it for years, but it's true—healthy eating encourages better behavior.

#### 2. They have a lack of consistent discipline.
