They Knew So Little, Yet They . . .

To read the account of the life of Jesus is to see how often He was either frustrated or amazed at the apostles' lack of understanding about what He was saying. He was with them almost daily for over three years, but their words even at the ascension show just how little they had comprehended.

Those apostles struggled to understand even the simple truths He taught. Think of how easily you grasp the parable of the sower. Yet after Jesus told the story of the man who sowed seeds on four kinds of soil, the disciples privately came to Him and asked for help in understanding it. Jesus' response was, "Do you not understand this parable? How then will you understand all the parables?" (Mark 4:13).

After Jesus had fed the 5,000 and the 4,000, the disciples had forgotten to take bread with them as they were crossing the sea of Galilee. When Jesus gave a stern warning to beware of the leaven of the Pharisees, they misunderstood, thinking His words were about the fact they had brought only one loaf with them. Jesus said, "Why do you reason because you have no bread? Do you not yet perceive nor understand? Is your heart still hardened? Having eyes, do you not see? And having ears, do you not hear" (Mark 8:14-18). Think of how readily we understand His words about the leaven of the Pharisees. Note amazement as He rebuked them. They did not understand the simple things He said.

They did not understand the most fundamental truths of why Jesus came. When He foretold His betrayal, death and resurrection on the third day, "They did not understand this saying, and were afraid to ask Him" (Mark 9:31). On another occasion when He taught this simple truth, Peter took Him aside and began to rebuke Him. Jesus turned and rebuked him

> saying, "Get behind Me Satan! For you are not mindful of the things of God, but the things of men" (Mark 8:32-33). It is remarkable to think they did not comprehend the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus.

They did not understand the nature of the kingdom. He spoke of the bread and the fruit of the vine in the kingdom, but they failed to see its nature. Just minutes before He ascended into heaven they still thought the coming kingdom had to do with the reestablishment of the Jewish earthly kingdom (Acts 1:6-8).

Jesus selected the twelve, spent years with them and they still did not see why He came and the work He was doing. Now think about what you understand compared to them. They grasped so little of the heart of the gospel, but they were used by Him to change the world. They knew so little but took what they knew to the lost. We know so much more, what are we doing with what we know?

How in the world could an innocent man like Jesus end up being convicted, tortured and nailed to a tree? One thing is for certain—rational thinking was not present or practiced among His enemies in those dark

In the early morning hours of that Friday, the leaders of this inquisition "led Jesus from Caiaphas

to the Praetorium...But they themselves did not go into the Praetorium, lest they should be defiled, but that they might eat the Passover" (John 18:28). Slow concerned in the down and get the picture here.

Jesus had been arrested upon a deceptive identification from Judas and hauled off (bound like a vicious criminal) to stand trial before the high priest or about decency but we can't violate our traditions and go inside. (Mark 14:53). Jesus spent that night before Annas,

Caiaphas and then the Sanhedrin, in a series of unlaw middleof-the-night trials. (The Jews were breaking their own laws.) In those trials, "the chief priests and the entire Council kept trying to obtain false testimony against Jesus, so that they might put Him to death" (Matt. 26:59). Did you catch that? They were not seeking "true testimony" but "false testimony." What kind of debased persons do that? "Many bore false witness against Him, but their testimonies did not agree" (Mark 14:56). It's hard to get lies to all sound alike!

Finally, when Jesus affirmed that He is "the Christ, the Son of the Blessed...they all condemned Him to be deserving of death" (Mark 14:61-64). After spitting on Him, blindfolding Him, beating Him and mocking Him that night (Mark 14:65), the revered religious leaders "plotted against Jesus to put Him to death...bound Him, they led Him away and delivered Him to Pontius Pilate" (Matt. 27:1-2). For the last several hours, they were not concerned in the least about truth, about law or

> about decency. But, then their traditions (not God's law) kicked in. They would not enter the Praetorium, "lest they should be defiled" and not be able to "eat the Passover" (John 18:28). All night, they had been riding their emotions and would not ease up one bit on condemning and killing an innocent man. But, then, oh wait! We are more than ready to kill Him

Emotions are powerful! They can lead us to do great things that we normally wouldn't do. They can also lead us to say, do and believe things that are not rational or Biblical. Sometimes a parent doesn't want to affirm that their own child's behavior is sinful (because of their emotional attachment), so they take an irrational or unbiblical position. Sometimes we get weary of society force-feeding immorality to us and so we give in (emotionally easier) rather than take a stand. May God help us to not get so caught up in our emotions (like Jesus' enemies) that we lose sight of the purity of His truth!

Quiz: How Do I Really Know? (Part 1)

There used to be these things called magazines, paper publishing that came out monthly. In some of those magazines that targeted women and teen girls there were tests. Some of the popular ones were: "Does your crush secretly love you?" or "Are you really best friends?" and "Which Disney prin-

cess are you?" While these are not meant to be scientific evaluations, there is some truth to the questions. This quiz is to help evaluate our love toward God.

Quiz, how do I know I really love God?

1. Do I seek His companionship?

The companionship we can offer God is through worunlovable. ship, assembling with those that worship God (Heb. 10:25). Another form of companionship is through prayer. How often do we pray that is not connected with food? We ought to "always pray and not lose heart" (Luke 18:1). "Always praying" and "without ceasing" are emphasized in Scripture (Eph. 6:1; 1 Thess. 5:17). Companionship can be sought in Scripture, reading and listening to God's wisdom (Rom. 7:22).

2. Am I happy over this relationship?

There is a spirit of rejoicing that comes with first entering into a relationship with God (Acts 8:39; 16:34). We see that in new converts, but has our rejoicing waned? "Rejoice in the Lord always. Again I will say, rejoice!" (Phil. 4:4).

3. Do we have things in common?

Can I say that I love the things He loves (1 John 5:3)? Can I say that I hate the things He hates (Prov. 6:16-19). If we love God, then we need to have these things in common.

4. Do I trust Him?

This is a tremendous problem in many relationships. Trust is something that is earned over time. God, He loved us even throughout all time has proven Himself to be trustworthy. "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will make your paths straight" (Prov. 3:5-6). "Have faith in God" (Mark 11:22).

5. Do I gladly give Him gifts?

Am I willing to share what I have? It was God's to begin with. "Each one must do just as he has purposed in his heart, not grudgingly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor. 9:7). Some have chosen to rob God (Mal. 3:8). Our gifts prove the sincerity of our love (2 Cor. 8:8).

While this is not the entirety of the quiz, we can see how helpful it is to take a moment and evaluate the question. He loved us even when we were unlovable (Rom. 5:8).

Who are you to judge?

The only two words some folks know in Matthew 7 are "Judge not." And they act like there is a period or exclamation point after the word "not." They could not be further from the truth.

Certainly, Jesus says, "Judge not," but following the comma He goes on to say, "...that you be not judged" (Matt. 7:1). Jesus is not teaching that it is wrong to judge. He goes on to say to "first" examine your own faults, "and then you will see clearly" to help others for the Day with theirs (7:5). If it is wrong to judge others, then how could one know who are the "dogs" or "swine" (in verse 6) or the "false prophets" (in verse 20)? The whole chapter demands evaluations and judgments to be made. Jesus explained this further in John 7:24 - "Do not judge according to appearance, but judge with righteous judgment." Judging according to the Divine standard of judgment (i.e., the righteous judgment of God's Word) is commanded and expected.

As we "measure" (7:2) others against God's Word, He will use that same "measurement" against us! Let us be consistent and fair and true. -DS

When certain Jews became Christians in the first century, they brought with them a self-generated arrogance, thinking that they were better Christians because they boasted in their circumcision, their fastings, their denial of certain meats, etc., etc. To these Christians Paul wrote, "Let us not become conceited, provoking one another, envying one another" (Gal. 5:26).

Think about that statement for twenty-first century Christians. Is it possible that we could "become conceited" ourselves, thinking that we are better Christians than others for one reason or another? Maybe "I've been a Christian long-

er than you"? Or "I was raised in the church and you weren't"? Or "I went to such-and-such a school or I was taught by so-and-so preacher"? Guess what that kind of spirit can lead to? "Provoking one another and envying one another."
