The Foolishness of Idolatry

The most profound truths can so often be evaluated and understood by just using common sense. The reality is that God did not write the Bible in such a way that only the most scholarly could comprehend it. It was written for ordinary people with common sense. To see this, read these words

from Mark about the profound teaching of Jesus. "And the common people heard Him gladly" (Mark 12:37).

The prophet Isaiah showed the folly of those who worshiped idols in his day. He described that artisan who was creating his idol, fashioning it "...with his hammers and working with the strength of his arm...He is hungry, and his strength fails; He drinks no water and is faint" (44:12). Common sense would tell you that his idol/god should feed him!

The next few verses describe the process of producing a wooden idol. He cuts down the cedars, the cypress and the oak. He first takes some of the timber to warm himself and bake his bread. "He burns half of it in the fires; with this half he eats meat; he roasts a roast ...and says, 'Ah, I am warm, I have seen the fire.'" He then takes the rest of the "firewood" and carves it into an image. "He falls down before it and worships it, prays to it and says, 'Deliver me for you are my god.'" Common sense says, "How can firewood do anything for you?" His actions show that his cedar tree is helpless! Idolatry simply does not make sense. An idol is nothing more than a tree!

To see the folly of idolatry read Psalm 115. "Their idols are silver and gold, the works of men's hands. They have mouths, but they do not speak; eyes they have but they do not see; they have ears, but they do not hear; noses they have but they do not smell; they have hands, but they do not handle; feet they have but they do not walk; nor do they mutter

> through their throat." The most amazing observation is that in the history of mankind millions and millions have fallen down, bringing gifts and burning incense to a piece of metal or wood or some precious stone. Their actions of worship were not seen, heard, or smelled by the idol. Its hands never moved, and its feet never walked.

Finally hear the words of Paul to those who had left idolatry to become Christians. "You know that you were Gentiles, carried away to these dumb idols, however you were lead" (1 Cor. 12:2). Those idols were deaf mutes. He says a similar thing to the Christians in Thessalonica. "You turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God" (1 Thess. 1:9). Hear the contrast and stand in amazement of how anyone could worship an idol. You turned from dumb, blind, deaf pieces of wood to serve a living God. Next week, we will look at the hands, eyes, ears, feet and mouth of our living God.



Using the Word "Minister" in the Way the Bible Uses It

Profound truths

can be easily

Who is a "minister"? It is common today for that word to be capitalized ("Minister"), as a way of designating a title given to someone (both in a government and in a religious setting). In the church, the word is used almost exclusively as a title for those who preach, those who work with the

youth, and those who are hired by the church to fill other roles. How does the Bible use that word?

In the Old Testament, the word "minister" is most often used as a verb, to describe those men who served as priests, when they came to "minister to the Lord," "minister in the holy place," "minister before the ark of the Lord," etc. It was a term used almost exclusively for the priests and Levites.

In the New Testament, the word "minister"

is much broader and is used in describing a variety of persons and their labors. Note that it is not used exclusively of a select group of individuals. We might most often think of the word being used to describe the work of Paul (1 Cor. 3:5; Eph. 3:7), Apollos (1 Cor. 3:5), Timothy (1 Thess. 3:2), Tychicus (Eph. 6:21; Col. 4:7), Epaphras (Col. 1:7), and others. However, the word is not being used in those passages as a title for those men, but instead, it was used to describe their labor. How can we know that? The Greek word for "minister" that is used in each of those texts to describe those men is the word *diakonos*. That word is used in a variety of ways for a variety of individuals. As we have noted, it is used of various preachers. It is also used for "deacons" in the church (Phil. 1:1; 1 Tim. 3:8, 12). The same word is used of civil rulers, who are "the minister of God" (Rom. 13:4), and it is also used to describe "Satan's ministers" (2 Cor. 11:14-15). A sister in Christ in Cenchrea was also

called a *diakonos* (Rom. 16:1). Thus, that word is **Not used strictly** used of many different people.

The noun *diakonos* is most often translated "servant" (as in Matt. 20:26; 23:11), and the verb form *diakoneo* is most often translated "serve" (as in Matt. 4:11; Luke 10:40). Jesus Himself said that He came to *diakonos* (i.e., to minister, to serve) (Mark 10:45). So, what's the point?

The word "minister" is not used in the New Testament strictly in the form of a title for the local preacher at the church. It is a descriptive term of a "servant," which is a quality that a preacher should have, but it is a universally-needed quality and an action in which every Christian must engage (Heb. 6:10; 1 Pet. 4:10). In other words, every Christian is a "minister," in the Biblical sense of the word, and not just the local preacher. It is not wrong to call him a "minister," but let us recognize that all of us are "ministers" just as much.

Faithful Sayings

We are in a time where trust and acceptance of someone's word is at a premium. It is difficult to find information that we know is true and won't change. It should be obvious that God's word can be a source of truth. In writing to Timothy and Titus, Paul included, "This is a faithful saying" before

some of his inspired comments. These faithful or trustworthy statements are always so, no matter the year, culture, or circumstance. May we consider

"It is a trustworthy statement, deserving full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners..." (1 Tim. 1:15a). It was the point and purpose to redeem mankind (Gen. 3:15; Eph. 1:4-12; 1 Pet. 1:18). The grace of God has appeared to all men, even Paul, the chief of sinners (1 Tim. 1:15). In

this context, Paul mentions that is was given to him abundantly so that "Jesus Christ might demonstrate His perfect patience as an example for those who would believe in Him for eternal life" (1 Tim. 1:14,16). For God desires all men to be saved (2 Pet. 3:9). No person is beyond the grace of God. Paul perpetrated terrible acts against the Christians, and yet he still obtained mercy from the God of heaven. So can we.

"It is a trustworthy statement: For if we died with Him, we will also live with Him; If we endure, we will also reign with Him; If we deny Him, He also will deny us; If we are faithless, He remains faithful, for He cannot deny Himself" (2 Tim. 2:11-13). The grace of God and eternal life is something that is conditional. This is evident by the many conditional statements in this passage. Paul tells us that if we be "dead with Him" then we can live with Him (Gal. 2:20). It is a truth that if we endure with Jesus the Christ then we shall be saved.

"For bodily discipline is only of little profit, but godliness is profitable for all things, since it holds promise for the present life and also for the life to come. It is a trustworthy statement deserving full acceptance" (1 Tim. 4:8-9). While there might be a little profit in the discipline of the body it pales in comparison to the benefit of godliness. Godliness is a blessing for this present life and the life to come.

"This is a trustworthy statement; and concerning these things I want you to speak confidently, so that those who have believed God will be careful to engage in good deeds. These things are good and profitable for men" (Titus 3:8). "For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand so that we would walk in them" (Eph. 2:10). "They profess to know God, but by their deeds they deny Him, being detestable and disobedient and worthless for any good deed" (Titus 1:16). May we consider these faithful sayings in our daily service to the Lord.

Sorry I'm not sorry

Did you ever have a teacher or parent force you to say, "I'm sorry," to some other kid? I'm not claiming that such an effort should never be made by an adult, but there is something usually lacking in that scenario – true sorrow. Saying the words is not the same as meaning the words.

Paul had written a sternly-worded letter to the church at Corinth (our "First Corinthians"), and then said this about the effects of that letter: "I perceive that the same epistle made you sorry," and "that your sorrow led to repentance. For you were made sorry in a godly manner... For godly sorrow produces repentance leading to salvation, not to be regretted; but the sorrow of the world produces death" (2 Cor. 7:8-10).

Note that there are two kinds of "sorry." One is genuine and the other is fake. One is produced in the heart and the other is hypocritically expressed with the lips. As Christians, which kind should we possess? Which kind should we express? When "I'm sorry," I need to be "sorry" as God would have me to be! -DS

Tell me how he knew

The apostle Paul had been through so much during his service to the Lord! When he penned his second letter to Timothy (and the final letter we have from his hand), he referenced some kind of legal trial to which he had been subjected, and he stated, "No one stood with me, but all forsook me" (2 Tim. 4:16). How sad! When he looked around, no friends or advo-

cates stood with him. He could literally see there was no soul beside him.

But then Paul stated, "But the Lord stood with me and strengthened me" (4:17). What a great source of comfort that would be! But wait. How did he know the Lord stood with him? He

could not literally see Him. How did he know? Paul knew the Lord was with him because He had made a promise, "I will never leave you nor forsake you" (Heb. 13:5). Paul walked by faith in the promise of Christ (2 Cor. 5:7), which to him was "proof of things not seen" (Heb. 11:1).

He knew the Lord was there! Do you? Christ made that same promise to you! -DS

5 Ways to Fight Apathy in Your Marriage



There they both sit night after night. A couple not acknowledging an unhappy marriage, as they go through the motions of necessity. The kids put to bed, the toys somewhat put back in place, and they stare at the television as bed time quickly creeps up. He looks her way and has a romantic intention, but it evaporates as fast as it came. "Too much work," he thinks as he mentally resigns to self-satisfaction. As she weakly smiles his way, in her mind races a million different thoughts. One of them is, "I'm not desirable enough for him to want me anymore." Her heart believes the lie. They exchange an, "I love you," with an insincere peck on dry lips, and part ways until the next day. Apathy has laid waste to their marital joy.

So what's the good news? If you are feeling apathetic in your marriage, this can most certainly be fixed. Your marriage can be rejuvenated and the happiness you once felt together can be restored. I've been married nearly 20 years and we have seen plenty of ups and downs. Our saving grace has been that we both come from broken homes and we both agree our marriage will not be one. So we fight for each other.

Are you willing to fight for your marriage and family? Here are 5 ways to fight it.

1. Find the Problem

Which bad habits has your marriage fallen into? Has it become sexless or close to it? What is your communication like? What are your thoughts when you think of her? What do you think she feels about you? Pinpoint where your marriage has allowed apathy to grow.

2. Reconnect

Depending on the seriousness of your situation, professional couple's therapy or ministerial assistance might be required. Tell each other how you're really feeling.
