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Lifeless Idols or a Living God

The psalmist said of idols, "They have mouths, but they do not speak; Eyes they have, but they do not see; They have ears, but they do not hear; Noses they have, but they do not smell; They have hands, but they do not handle; Feet they have, but they do not walk; Nor do they mutter through

their throat" (Psa. 115:4-7). What a contrast between them and our living God!

The living God speaks. "God, who at various times and in various ways spoke in time past to the fathers by the prophets, has in these last days spoken to us by His Son" (Heb. 1:1-2). What a contrast there was at Mt. Sinai between the golden calf and God idols. Who would whose voice echoed from the heavens and shook the earth.

The living God sees. "For the eyes of the Lord run to and from throughout the whole earth, to show Himself strong on behalf of those whose heart is loyal to Him" (2 Chron. 26:9). Add to this the words of Peter, "The eyes of the Lord are on the righteous..." (1 Pet. 3:12).

The living God hears. "The eyes of the Lord are on the righteous, and His ears are open to their prayers" (1 Pet. 3:12). He heard the groanings of the Jews in Egypt and sent Moses because He heard them. If He hears every idle word any man speaks (Matt. 12:36), how much more will He hear the sincere cries of His children today? His ears are always open to your prayers!

The living God smells. When Noah exited from the ark, he offered a multitude of sacrifices to God. "The Lord smelled a soothing aroma" (Gen. 8:21) and promised mankind He would never again destroy the earth by a flood. The smell

of burning flesh, hairs and feathers might not be pleasing to us, but they are an aroma to God. Remember that your prayers are mixed with incense which comes into His presence (Rev. 8:3).

The living God touches and holds us with His hands. David cried out to God, "Stretch out Your hand from above, rescue me out of great waters" (Psa. 144:7). His hands made the heavens (Psa.

102:4) and how comforting it is to know that He holds us in His hands.

The living God has feet to move and to help. "Yes, He loves the people; All His saints are in Your hand; They sit down at Your feet; Everyone receives Your words" (Deut. 33:33). We must never forget that our God is omnipresent, and His feet are always with us.

Why would any person choose a lifeless idol!



18 Ways to "Build Up" One Another in Worship Assemblies

There is no better day of the week than the first day of the week! There is no greater blessing and privilege on the first day of the week than to worship the God of all creation, our heavenly Father! And the New Testament emphasizes that this wonderful opportunity takes place when "the church"

"comes together" each Lord's day (1 Cor. 11:17, 18, 20, 33, 34; 14:23, 26).

One primary purpose for the church to "come together" to worship on the first day of the week is to "build up" one another. That is repeated throughout the fourteenth chapter of First Corinthians (14:3, 4, 5, 12, 17), where Paul concludes: "Let all things be done for building up" (14:26). While we can certainly "build up one another" outside the

worship assembly, the "building up" emphasized in this chapter is a "building up" that is particular to the assembly of the church and cannot be given or received outside of it. So, in a practical way, what are some things that we can do to "build up" one another when we assemble together as a church on the first day of the week? Let's consider just a few.

- 1. Arrive early, well before it's time to start.
- 2. Start by talking to folks while in the parking lot.
- 3. Don't just go to your seat; walk around greeting people.

4. Smile.

- 5. Hug.
- 6. Shake hands, fist bump, high five, whatever.
- 7. Have a real, genuine, intentional conversation.
- 8. Look into their eyes and show sincere interest.
- 9. Seek out folks you don't know as well or speak to often.
 - 10. Say something like, "It is so good to see you."

11. Say something like, "How have you been doing this week?" and then listen.

12. Say something like, "I prayed for you this last week," or "I will definitely pray for you this week."

- 13. Participate heartily in the worship.
- 14. Sing out with joy, rather than sitting silently.
- 15. Reflect on the cross during the Lord's Supper, rather than carrying on a conversation or making a grocery list.
- 16. Engage in the sermon and show real interest, rather than being disengaged, playing on your device or looking bored.
- 17. Don't rush off. Stay late, several minutes after dismissal.
- 18. Take the initiative, rather than waiting for others.

What would you add? Let us make assembling on the Lord's Day the most encouraging time of the week.

Peacemakers

The beatitudes are what introduce the Sermon on the Mount. They serve as a framework or a starting place for the hearers of the message. They also serve as a reminder of the basic characteristics of a follower of God. They teach us so much about faith. By Josh Blackmer They teach us how faith begins poor in spirit,

with mourning and meekness. They teach us how faith grows,

hungers and thirsts after righteousness. They teach us how faith matures merciful, pure in heart, and peacemakers. They also teach us how faith is tested by persecution. Among them is the concept of a peacemaker. "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God" (Matt. 5:9).

What does it mean to be a peacemaker, and how does it affect our lives? A peacemaker is a per-

son who is actively seeking to establish and maintain peace. They don't make war or create conflicts with others. They seek to resolve conflicts and eliminate all hostility. They have a positive force for good and all that is profitable for mankind. Peacemakers are those who demonstrate peace in their lives. In that, they are at peace with God. "Therefore, having been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Rom. 5:1). Sin separates us from God and makes us enemies. "You adulteresses, do you not know that friendship with the world is hostility toward God? Therefore whoever wishes to be a friend of the world makes himself an enemy of God" (Jas. 4:4).

Peacemakers are at peace with others. "So then we pursue the things which make for peace and the building up of one another" (Rom. 14:19). "Finally, brethren, rejoice, be made complete, be comforted, be like-minded, live in peace; and the God of love and peace will be with you" (2 Cor. 13:11).

> Peacemakers are at peace with themselves. "My son, do not forget my teaching, But let your heart keep my commandments; For length of days and years of life And peace they will add to you" (Prov. 3:1-2). "Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body; and be thankful" (Col. 3:15).

and mankind. The ultimate work of God is making peace between Himself and mankind. "Now the God of peace be with you all" (Rom. 15:33). If God is with us, He can help us maintain peace. "The God of peace will soon crush Satan under your feet" (Rom. 16:20a). God resolves the war to bring peace to our lives. Our trusting obedience in following His teachings will produce peace in our lives. We need to do our part to maintain the peace He has blessed us with and also show others the way of peace.

> The Hebrew spies and the shepherd David saw giants, who were threatening to God's people (Num. 13:33; 1 Sam. 17:4). So what? Since our God is not limited by physical size, He is infinitely "bigger" than all of our problems! Jesus and the apostle Paul taught Christians to not worry

about tomorrow or to be anxious about anything (Matt. 6:25-34; Phil. 4:6-7). Why not? Our God is not limited by physical time; thus, He is already "there" in our "tomorrow" and taking care of it for us!

Rather than limit our God, let us seek to appreciate and trust His magnitude and His majesty! - DS
