And the Word Was God and More!

Sometimes individuals ask as to why we have four different accounts of the life of Jesus. Why did God not simply reveal in one book all that Jesus did? One of the reasons is that each of the gospels has a different audience and a different purpose as they write.

Luke's audience was Theophilus, whom he addresses as "most excellent." This was a special

term used in the first century to give honor to nobility within the government. Both Festus and Felix are As you read, look One in who was life (1:4). Adam, the first life was addressed in this way (Acts 23:26; 24:3; 26:25). Why did Luke write this gospel? Read his opening words. There were many (obviously, not just Matthew, Mark, Luke and John) who were trying to write what they remembered about Jesus, but Luke says that he had a "...perfect understanding of all things from the

very first..." and he was writing to give to Theophilus a precise account in the exact order it happened (Luke 1:1, 4).

Why is John so different from the other gospel accounts? Because his purpose is not to focus on chronology, but he selects seven miracles to accomplish his purpose. "Truly Jesus did many other signs in the presence of His disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written that you might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in His name" (John 20:30-31).

Now focus on John's opening paragraph. There is no mention of Jesus' birth, the shepherds, the wise men or Herod. John wanted his readers to be fully convinced that Jesus is the Christ. He goes back to the beginning, to the time before there was the heavens and the earth. Jesus was there. The Word was there; He was with God (Deity), and the Word was Deity. The rest of this book is designed to magnify the Word so that everyone might be fully convinced that Jesus is God.

> In that paragraph Jesus is introduced as the created through Jesus ("without Him nothing was made that was made"), but He is even more. His is not just physical life, He is the One through whom all who believe may have eternal, spiritual life (20:31).

But He is even more. He was "...the light of men" (1:4). The world into which He came and this Light "shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not comprehend it" (1:5).

He is even more. He is "the true light which gives light to every man" (1:9). He is the "...only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth" (1:14). While Moses gave the law, "...grace and truth came through Jesus Christ" (1:17).

As you read your Bible, slow down! Look carefully at every book, every chapter, every paragraph, every sentence, every word! There are heavenly treasures in every word!



The Church Has Problems

It seems that there are some folks who are bent on focusing on so-called "problems" that a church has. "Well, you know, that church has leadership problems. That church has problems with gossip. That church has problems keeping their young people. That church has financial problems.

That church has problems with race relations. That church has problems keeping their members happy. That church has problems with what some of their teachers teach." And so on, and so on it goes! There are some "Professional Church Inspectors" out there who carry a badge in one hand and a magnifying glass in the other and are determined to find, broadcast and criticize whatever so-called "problems" they think a particular church (i.e., congregation) has.

Can I ask you a question: "What benefit do such folks bring to the Lord's church? What good do such folks produce for the cause of Christ?" Think about that for a minute and we'll come back to it.

Here's the reality. Here's the big, not-so-secret truth about the church. Are you ready? Feel free to share this with everyone you know. The church is made up of people, and people have problems. Isn't that profound? Honestly, that should not surprise us at all. Now, consider this.

Every congregation that we read about in the New Testament had problems. Some of them were bigger and more noticeable than others, but they all had issues they were dealing with, and some of those issues even characterize those churches in our minds today. What church was dealing with division over following preachers like Paul, Apollos and Cephas? What church was struggling with second coming doctrinal issues? What church had left its first love? What church

> was lukewarm? We don't know these problems because there was a "Profession Church Inspector" going around and finding some sense of satisfaction in pointing out all of their flaws. We know this because the Bible reveals them to us, along with the inspired teachings to help them overcome their issues.

> > Are you a "Professional Church Inspector"?

If so, have you ever gained any great benefit from holding such an office? Has your shaking finger and sharp tongue ever won a lost soul to Christ or built up the kingdom of God? What is your goal, if you champion this critical effort?

Let me encourage all of us to actually DO something that can benefit the cause of Christ. Let us focus ourselves on things above, let us find positive things happening in the Lord's church and shine a light on them, let us encourage and build up every Christian we know, let us pray for our elders, let us forgive, let us emulate Christ. And let us not be "the problem."

Slavery in the New Testament



It has been estimated that one third of the Roman population were slaves. Slavery was a common part of everyday life. If you went to the doctor, visited an accountant or bought goods in the markets, all of those jobs could've been done by slaves. By Josh Blackmer There were slaves in every section of labor.

Some worked in mines and guarries, in homes, farms, as soldiers, gladiators and prostitution. One could become a slave for various reasons: prisoners of war, children of slaves, you could be sold into slavery, orphans or abandoned children were often raised as slaves. You could also sell yourself into slavery because of debts, to get an education, or to be owned by a prestigious house. Slavery was not based on the color of one's skin. Anyone could be a slave, and anyone could own a slave. There were possibilities of buying one's free-

dom. Does that mean slavery is good? Of course not, but condemning slavery would have made millions of people homeless and on the streets. The Roman empire would have been in an uproar. Many slaves were slaves by choice. A whole society would've crumbled by trying to make such a drastic change. However, Christianity had within it the seeds of its demise.

In the New Testament, Paul taught more than any other directly on the subject of slavery. Mutual respect and concern were emphasized because both slave and master have the same Lord (Eph. 6:5-9; Col. 3:22-4:1). The letter of Philemon was written to a slave owner about his runaway slave. In this letter, Paul tells Philemon to receive Onesimus not just as a slave, "but more than a slave, a beloved brother" (Phile. 1:16). The Bible teaches that if you can earn your freedom, you should but that becoming a Christian doesn't mean you are free (1 Cor. 7:21-24). Being a slave has no bearing on salvation or your status before God (Gal. 3:28). Christian slaves are per-

> mitted to object to a master's order based on conscience but must patiently endure the punishment (1 Pet. 2:19-20).

Slavery is horrible and a blight on any society.

Indirectly, the New Testament has much to say about slavery. "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you" sets the first principle to erode slavery (Matt. 7:12). To "love your neighbor as yourself" would undermine the concept of slavery

(Mark 12:31). It also condemns kidnapping (1 Tim. 1:8-10). Widows and orphans were to be supported by the church to prevent their sale into slavery (Jas. 1:27). The idea that "while we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, and especially to those who are of the household of the faith" should have motivated those in the church to help keep brethren from slavery (Gal. 6:10).

Slavery is horrible and a blight on any society. It was Christianity that changed the concept of our responsibilities to our neighbors and eventually ended slavery.

How long, Lord?

The prophet Habakkuk cried out to the Lord in a fashion that may sound like something we might say to Him. "O Lord, HOW LONG shall I cry, and You will not hear? WHY do You show me iniquity, and cause me to see trouble?" (Hab. 1:2-3). From the people's perspective (that's key), God was allowing evil to go unpunished and unchecked in Judah. "How long will you re-

main idle, God?" Have you ever thought, "HOW LONG, O Lord, are you going to continue to let this happen? WHY do You not do something?" That's OUR perspective.

Notice what God said in response to Habakkuk.

"Look among the nations and WATCH—Be

utterly astounded! For I WILL WORK a work in your days which you would not believe, though it were told you. For indeed I AM RAISING up the Chaldeans..." (1:5-6).

God told His people what "I WILL" do for you (future). God told His people what "I AM" doing for you (present). May God help us to trust HIS perspective and to WATCH what He WILL and IS already doing to help us! - DS

Make it plain

As the prophet Habakkuk was questioning God, the Lord responded with direct and precise instructions. Following the prophet's second interrogation, look at what the Lord told him. "Write the vision and make it plain on tablets, that he may run who reads it" (Hab. 2:2). Think about that. The Lord wanted the prophet to record the vision that he would receive from

> heaven, and then the prophet was to make it known to others, so that they could respond to it.

The Lord said, "Make it plain." Do not add to it. Do not take from it. Do not make it your own message. Do not complicate it. Make it plain,

so that men may understand. The Lord said, "So that he may run who reads it." The message from heaven would require immediate action, so don't get yourself or your words in the way of that response.

Apply that today. People around us need to hear the saving message from heaven. Our responsibility is to make it plain, so that they may respond appropriately. Keep the focus on the message and not on us! - DS




