Learning to Listen to God

James describes the kind of heart we need in order to profit from studying the Bible. Read His words carefully. "Receive with meekness the implanted word, which is able to save your souls. But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves" (Jas. 1:21-22).

We must learn to

listen to God,

and let His words

sink deep into

Friend,

you are rich!

Every time we read the Bible, listen to Bible teaching or are studying the word, we must receive it with meekness. Sometimes there are individuals who have great knowledge about the Bible and can readily quote it, but it does not seem to change them. Why? Because they do not receive it with humility. Knowledge of the Bible involves the "head," but meekness involves the "heart." When Samuel heard the message of God in the middle of the night, he said, "Speak, Lord, for Your servant hears."

There is more than meekness involved in Bible study which will change our souls. James uses the expression, "the implanted word." Jesus' parable about the sower described what happened to the seed which fell on good soil. Unlike the seed which fell on stony ground which began but "had no root" (Luke 8:13), the roots of the seed on the good soil had depth and produced much fruit. James is not talking about just hearing the words but adds the word "implanted," showing

that the "seed" is far more than knowing the Bible. This seed sinks deep into our hearts. This is why the KJV translates this as "the engrafted word." Bible study in this passage describes four actions: (1) the hearing of the word; (2) an openness to receive the word; (3) a heart which humbly listens to God—he is humble enough to accept the truth, even when it hurts and condemns; and (4) letting the words sink deeply into us.

Look again at this paragraph in James. It begins with the word "therefore." This indicates that divine truths had just been uttered and based upon that truth a heavenly conclusion is stated. What had James just said?

James had described a man who so readily charged God with tempting him. James showed this violated the nature of God. Look at verse 19. "So then my brethren, let every man be swift to hear,

slow to speak, slow to wrath." Is it possible that these words which can apply to dealings with others have a primary application to not hastily charge God, but to be swift to hear God, slow to speak before Him and become angry at what He says?

The next time you study the Bible, do not begin your study with a preconceived conclusion you want to use the Bible to prove what you believe. Remember that Solomon said that when we come before Him, "let your words be few" (Ecc. 5:2). Always be swift to hear God. Think about it.

Rich Toward God

The richest man who ever lived gave a stern warning about riches. So, it was not a poor man making accusations against those who are rich. It was a warning from the Man who owns everything Himself—Jesus Christ.

The Owner of all things said, "Take heed and beware of covetousness" (Luke

12:15). The original Greek has the word "all" in the text, so it is best translated, "Be on your guard against all covetousness" (ESV) or "against every form of greed" (NASB). Think about that word "all" or "every." Is there more than one form of greed or covetousness? Jesus indicated that there is, and He warns all of us to beware of every form that covetousness can take in our lives. What a concept!

In this context in Luke 12, Jesus tells the Parable of the Rich Fool. Jesus does not teach that this man was a fool because he was rich. There is nothing inherently wrong or sinful with being rich—the Bible never hints that there is. However, what we learn about this man in Jesus' parable is that he was rich toward himself, having laid up treasure for himself. That was (for him) the focus, the purpose, the intention of his riches. It is obvious that he suffered from the debilitating disease called "The Love of Money."

In this parable, the rich man was condemned because

he did not use and focus his riches toward God and furthering the cause of the Lord. That sharp censure ought to grab our attention. Those who are rich, especially, need to examine whether they are rich toward self, toward family, toward the world, or rich toward God. Beware and be on guard against EVERY form of covetousness—which means, "Don't be deceived into telling yourself that you're ok!"

The reality is that God has made ALL of us rich! Think about that. ALL of us are rich IN God and BY God! I'm not talking about money! And I'm not talking about material possessions! I'm talking about every form of blessing we experience in this life—including the splendor of His creation, the relationships we enjoy, the abilities He has given to each of us, the influence that we have, etc., etc. We must be EVER on guard against EVERY form of covetousness that

would make us lose sight of WHO blessed us with all of these things and TO WHOM we should be utilizing them on a daily basis! Friend, you are rich! The question is, are you rich (with these blessings) toward self or are you rich toward God?

The richest man who ever lived taught us much about the many, many riches that we have in this life. He owns the world and everything in it, including us. May we do everything we can to use what He has given to us (in every form of our riches) to be rich toward God!

Sin in 4D (Part 4)

"Death comes for us all; even at our birth, death does but stand aside a little. And every day he looks towards us and muses somewhat to himself whether that day or the next he will draw nigh. It is the law of nature, and the will of God" (Robert Bolt, A Man for All Seasons). While Mr. Bolt is off on his the-

ology and personification of death, it is none the less true. The writer of Hebrews put it this way: "It is appointed for men to die once and after this comes judgment" (Heb. 9:27). While death has been a part of life, it wasn't always so.

us all. Are we The sin of Adam and Eve made death an inseparable consequence of sin (Rom. 5:12). God ready? warned them that death would be the consequence of sin (Gen. 2:17). Since then, "the wages of sin" has been death (Rom. 6:23). This spiritual death and separation from God is the most dangerous but not the only danger (Matt. 10:28). Sin can result in a physical death. All mankind suffers the consequences of Adam's sin in that they die physically (Rom. 5:12), and as a result, the world is dotted with cemeteries. Physical death is often caused by our own choices, our sins or the sins of others. Countless lives have been cut short due to vices, greed, anger and selfishness. Physical death should not be what we are afraid of most. It is the spiritual death that should concern us most. "Fear Him who is able to

destroy both soul and body in hell" (Matt. 10:28b). James highlights the nature of sin and that when it is "accomplished, it brings forth death" for the individual (Jas. 1:13-15). "The person who sins will die" (Ezek. 18:20). Though a sinner is dead, he is still able to do his part in the conversion process. "Work out your salvation with fear and trembling" (Phil. 2:12).

Those who have never "died to themselves" or have been "baptized into His death" must contend with the second death (Rom. 6:3-11). Because "their part will be in the lake that burns with fire and brimstone, which is the second death" (Rev. 21:8). Those that have been baptized are blessed, for "Blessed and holy is the one who has a part in the first resurrection [baptism]; over these the second death has no power" (Rev. 20:6). Although it sounds nice, we do not live to greet death as a friend; death to a Christian is a concaration quered enemy (Rev. 20:14). That is why Paul says, "The sting of

death is sin, and the power of sin is the law; but thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Cor. 15:56-57).

Sin leads to death. It leads to spiritual death, possibly physical death, and surely the second death if it is not forgiven. That can only happen through the blood of Christ. That can only happen through my obedience. Death comes for us all. Are we ready? Are we doing what we can to help others be ready? This is the most important thing we can share.

How could he sleep?

Immerse yourself in this scene. Get the full picture in Acts 12. Peter was witnessing and personally experiencing the violent persecution that Herod Agrippa ("the king") was bringing against Christians. Peter saw Herod kill his fellow apostle and friend, James, with the sword. He was seized by Herod's henchmen, with plans to do the same to him as was done to

James. Peter was arrested, thrown in prison, guarded by sixteen soldiers and bound with two chains between two soldiers. What would you be doing in that prison cell? Where would your emotions be? How uncomfortable, miserable, traumatic and faith-draining would all of that be?

The night before Herod was about to sentence him, do you know what Peter was doing? What would you be doing? The record tells us, "that night Peter was sleeping" (Acts 12:6). Could you be sleeping? Peter trusted unequivocally in the presence of God, and knowing "the Lord is my helper," he determined, "I will not fear," for after all, "What can man to do me?" (Heb. 13:5-6). Do we trust in the Lord so much that we can sleep in our worst trials? -DS


