

# **His Temple Is Being Destroyed Again**

**Tragically, His** 

new temple is

suffering the

same fate of the

old one.

The time of the writing of Psalm 74 is unknown for its contents fit into almost every situation when the people of God grieved as they saw the temple in ruins. The psalmist described the holy city and how the sin within God's nation had brought about such dire circumstances.

He described the action of those evil men who en-

tered that sacred temple. "The enemy has damaged everything in the sanctuary" (v. 3). "They seem like men who lift up axes among the thick trees" (v. 5). "With axes and hammers, they have set fire to Your sanctuary...They have burned up all the meeting places of God in the land" (vs. 6-9). Nothing was sacred to those who destroyed God's temple.

Tragically, we live in a day where much the

same has again happened to God's holy temple. The Jerusalem temple was destroyed years ago, but our God still has a new temple.

Paul described what happened when the temple (the church) came into that Gentile city. "You are no longer strangers and foreigners, but fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God, having been built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the chief cornerstone, in whom the whole building, be-

ing fitted together, grows into a holy temple in the Lord...a dwelling place of God in the Spirit" (Eph. 2:19-23). That Old Testament temple was about to be razed, and His New Testament temple was replacing it.

Tragically today, His new temple is suffering the fate of the old. The enemy has entered His holy temple and destroyed much of what Jesus placed there. Far too many of them have destroyed the importance of the Lord's Supper. The

early church gathered every week for the express purpose of sharing His supper (Acts 20:7; 1 Cor. 11:23 -33). In most churches in America, there is a weekly assembly to listen to choral groups or to listen to a message by the head pastor who directs that church. "With their axes and hammers" they have destroyed the purpose how His holy temple worshipped.

Those same "axes" have minimized the baptism which unites us with the death of Jesus and His sacred blood. In its place they have produced "the sinner's prayer," which they affirm the moment it is said salvation comes. While the Bible says baptism saves us (1 Pet. 3:21), their axes and hammers are used to say that baptism does not save. While Jesus says, "He who believes and is baptized will be saved," they use their axes to say, "He who believes and is NOT baptized will be saved." They destroyed His Old Testament temple, and men are doing the same to the New Testament temple.



## **Opposite Day Is Not a Good Day**

Have you ever played "Opposite Day"? According to Wikipedia, "Opposite Day is a make believe game usually played by children. Conceptually, Opposite Day is a holiday where things are said and done in an opposite manner. It is not a holiday on any calendar, one can declare that today is

Opposite Day (sometimes retroactively) to indicate something which will be said, or has just been said should be understood opposite to its original meaning." While some might have fun with this "game," those who "played it" in the Bible lost every time.

Nadab and Abihu played Opposite Day and lost. As priests, they were responsible before God for taking "a censer full of burning coals of fire from the altar before the Lord," but instead they "offered

unauthorized fire before the Lord" (Lev. 16:12; 10:1). As a result, "fire went out from the Lord and devoured them" (10:2). Don't play Opposite Day with God!

Moses played Opposite Day and lost. In Numbers 20, God told Moses, "Speak to the rock before their eyes, and it will yield its water," but instead "Moses lifted his hand and struck the rock twice with his rod" (Num. 20:8-11). As a result, Moses was not permitted to enter the promised land (20:12). Don't play Opposite Day with God! King Saul played Opposite Day and lost. God had chosen the tribe of Levi to stand before Him and to offer sacrifices (Deut. 10:8), but instead King Saul (of the tribe of Benjamin) "felt compelled, and offered the burnt offering" himself (1 Sam. 13:9-12). As a result, his kingdom was taken from him (13:13-14). Don't play Opposite Day with God!

Uzzah played Opposite Day and lost. God had specified that the ark of the covenant was to be transported on

poles and that "they shall not touch" the ark (Num. 4:15), but instead Uzzah transported the ark on a new cart and "put his hand to the ark of God and took hold of it, for the oxen stumbled" (2 Sam. 6:3-6). As a result, "God struck him there for his error; and he died there by the ark of God" (6:7). Don't play Opposite Day with God!

Certainly none of us would intentionally play Opposite Day with God! We know that would be a foolish venture! But, is it possible that we do it without even knowing? God tells us to "go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15). Do we play Opposite Day? God tells us to "repent and be baptized" (Acts 2:38), for "baptism saves us" (1 Pet. 3:21). Do we play Opposite Day? God tells us to "sing and make melody in your heart to the Lord" (Eph. 5:19). Do we play Opposite Day? Everyone who "played" this "game" in the Bible lost. Let us not try it ourselves!

While such pursuits are not intrinsically wrong when kept within moral boundaries, that has shifted for our country. Even in our lifetimes we have seen the ancient landmarks of righteousness that had been tattered with time are now ruble and forgotten. What do we do when a nation has destroyed herself for a lack of knowledge (Hos. 4:6)?

First, take a deep breath. While this is all new for us, it is not new for the righteous people of God that have lived throughout the centuries. We have many brothers and sisters around the globe that have been living in the same conditions or worse for much longer.

> Second, we don't change, and we don't pander. We need to continue to "speak the truth in love" (Eph. 4:15). We must "hold fast the form of sound words" (2 Tim. 1:13). If we falter or fail in this, we too have become those that would move the boundaries that God has set.

Third, we must stand. Your family needs defending! Look at the church today. She is not immune to the false ideologies and new standards of right and wrong that infiltrated into our congregations. How often today do we "recognize faces" and show partiality? How often today do we determine how we will treat someone based upon "facial recognition software" that we have installed in our brains? Disable your facial recognition software today (Jas. 2:1, 9; 3:17)! - DS

#### "So I have come down to deliver!"

How long had Israel been slaves in Egypt? Well, that depends on who you ask, but by the end of Exodus chapter 2, that generation of Israelites had not known any life except the one there in Egyptian slavery. Do you think they had ever "groaned because of their bondage" before Exodus 2:23? No doubt they regularly groaned and cried out to God because of the daily


