The Hope For America Lies in the Valley of Achor

The parallel between the demise of the Jewish nation as they headed for captivity and the demise in our land is so striking. We know specifically that God had chosen the nation of Israel and brought them into a land flowing with milk and honey. The remarkable history of America and its elevation

to being a world power in it such a short time is almost unheard of in world history. We are not God's chosen nation, but we have been brought into our land of Perhaps it is time blessings. that America

Look carefully at how the Jews responded to their blessings. They lived in the abundance He gave to them, but almost immediately forgot about the One who gave them such blessings. Our land was born under the banner being one nation under God. Isn't it remarkable how our nation is now doing all it can to be one nation out from under God!

As the northern kingdom of Israel was about to be destroyed God sent His messenger, Hosea, to make a final appeal. What was that message? Where could that nation who had left God find in hope of reconciliation? Hear the words of Hosea. "I will give her...the valley of Achor as a door of hope" (Hos. 2:17). The hope of Israel was to be found in a valley that was part of the birth of that nation (Josh. 7).

The young nation of Israel had just captured the city of Jericho as God collapsed the walls of that fortified city. He was with them! The joyful prospect of now conquering the rest of the land with God's help was within the heart of every Jew. God had promised that land to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob and now He was giving it to them. The pagan nations seemed powerless before Him. To the Jews' amazement, they came to the next city, Ai, and were soundly defeated. What had happened? The answer is found in the valley of Achor.

> The nation was not aware that one man had taken some of the spoils of Jericho which had been sanctified as belonging to God and hid them in his tent. The small village of Ai had routed the mighty army of God. Why? Because of the sin of one man.

> How did God look at that sin? He made it an example for every Jew as they conquered the rest of the land.

What did they do to this man? More importantly, where were they when they dealt with the sin? They stoned that man, Achan, and his entire family. They burned all his possessions and raised a heap of stones as a "memorial" to the importance of dealing with sin. Where was the monument? It was in the valley of Achor (Josh. 7:25-26).

That valley was the only hope Israel had of surviving in Hosea's day. Their failure to deal with sin was their demise. America has left God. Perhaps it is time we go the valley of Achor and find the only hope we have!

Why the Story of Peter's Mother-in-Law?

The record of the life of Jesus in the New Testament is filled with interesting events, which may make you wonder why a particular detail or event was mentioned, among so many possibilities. The healing of Peter's mother-in-law is one such event. Matthew and Luke allot two verses, and

Mark (the gospel account which really focuses on the miracles of Jesus) gives it three verses. While there is little told to us in these verses (Matt. 8:14-15; Mark 1:29-31; Luke 4:38-39), notice how much really is told. account reminds

Jesus left the synagogue in Capernaum, where He had been teaching and casting out a demon, and He "entered Simon's house." Mark tells us that Peter's brother, Andrew, also lived there (1:29). So, five men entered the home: Jesus, Simon Peter,

Andrew, James and John. All three accounts tell us that Peter's wife's mother was "sick." Matthew and Mark both tell us that she was "lying sick with a fever." The physician Luke specified that she "was suffering from a high fever." Mark and Luke indicate that the disciples "told" Jesus about her and "made request of Him concerning her." Now, notice what happens.

Matthew says that it started when Jesus "saw" her. Think about the tenderness of that word. The physician tells us that Jesus "stood over her," like a doctor may come near and bend over to get closer. Then, Jesus "touched her hand" and "took her by the hand." This is very personal. Jesus then "rebuked the fever" and "lifted her up," and the Bible says that "immediately the fever left her." All three accounts emphasize that she was so completely restored to health that "she arose and served them."

Why is this account of the life of Jesus recorded? What are we to learn from this?

> Perhaps this event is recorded for the purpose of showing us that Peter was married (see also 1 Corinthians 9:5). Many want to claim that Peter was the first Pope, yet we are specifically told that Peter (why tell us about him and not the other apostles?) was married. Perhaps God was putting in the Bible the answer to a future false doctrine.

Perhaps Scripture records this incident to teach us that we need to take care of our family, our parents, our in-laws, when such is necessary. He who does not take of his own family "is worse than an unbeliever" (1 Tim. 5:8).

If for no other reason, this brief account reminds us of two immutable truths: Jesus cares! Jesus can! The tender compassion of Jesus pours forth in this text. He has that compassion for you! The power of Jesus to overcome any trouble is clear in this text. He has that power to help you! Thank God for these few verses to remind us of our wonderful Jesus!

What They Didn't Know

It is possible that we have been absolutely certain of something only to find that we were wrong. What we don't know can be detrimental and devastating. [God] "dealing out retribution to those who do not know God and to those who do not obey the gospel of our Lord Jesus. These will pay the

Because, if we

admit our

penalty of eternal destruction, away from the presence of the Lord and from the glory of His power" (2 Thess. 1:8-9). Ignorance, in this case, is not bliss. At the beginning of the church in Acts 2, there were things that the audience didn't know. After the message they couldn't plead ignorance about the will of God.

It is clear from the text that they didn't understand what was happening. "And they all continued in amazement and great perplexity, saying to one another, 'What does this mean?'" (Acts 2:12). Here are some things they didn't know.

They didn't know this was the fulfilment of prophecy. Peter begins assuring the listeners that the apostles were not drunk, but that this was the pouring out of God's spirit (Acts 2:14-19).

They didn't know they were in sin. The first time we read about "calling on the name of the Lord" is a direct quotation from the prophecy of Joel (Acts 2:21; Joel 2:31). This is

tied directly to salvation. We see this again in connection with Paul in his conversion account. "Get up and be baptized, and wash away your sins, calling on His name" (Acts 22:16). Naturally, they would need to understand sin in order to see the need for salvation.

They didn't know that faith in Jesus as the Son of God, repentance, and baptism lead to salvation. Peter spends some time providing a case for the deity of Jesus from Nazareth (Acts

2:22-36). He starts with "Jesus the Nazarene, a man" talking about the miracles that many of them could have witnessed or at least heard about. He ends with, "Therefore let all the house of Israel know for certain that God has made Him both Lord and Christ—this Jesus whom you crucified" (Acts 2:36).

They didn't know this was God's eternal plan. In Peter's defense of the Christ and the events of that day, he mentions prophecy, acknowledging that was premeditated by God. Also, he mentions that Jesus' delivery into their hands was "by the predetermined plan and fore-knowledge of God" (Acts 2:23). This was supposed to happen.

They didn't know that they would be added to the eternal kingdom. Those who were obedient were added (2:41). We see again, "the Lord was adding to their number day by day those who were being saved" (2:47). They were added to that eternal plan and salvation that God revealed in their sight.

Just Admit It! — 2 Samuel 12

You've probably seen this scene in a movie. After many hours of questioning, an interrogation officer moves a light directly into his suspect's eyes. He slams the table and shouts, "Admit it!" The suspect breaks down and pours his heart out. The police get their man, and it's a job well done.

Admitting guilt is not easy. We will

go to great lengths to keep our worst sins to ourselves. Because, if we admit our faults, we might hurt our reputation. Or worse, we might have to give them up.

No good comes from keeping sins secret.
You rob yourself of an opportunity to repent, and you also open yourself up to more sin. This was King David's great failure. "David did what was right in the eyes of the LORD, and had not turned aside from anything that He commanded him all the days of his life, except in the matter of Uriah the Hittite" (1 Kgs. 15:5, NKJV).

In 2 Samuel 11, David gave in to temptation and took another man's wife for himself. When Bathsheba became pregnant, David didn't do the right thing and admit his guilt. Instead, he looked for ways to cover it up. When his plans failed he sent Uriah, Bathsheba's husband, to die in battle. David then went about his life like nothing had happened. As

far as he was concerned, he got away with it, and no one was the wiser. But the Lord knew.

Because of these sins, David's family was plagued with turmoil including the death of his child. It was only when he was confronted by Nathan, the prophet, that he finally admitted his sin (2 Sam. 12:13). When he did, God forgave him immediately. If David admitted his sin from the start, he would have been saved from far greater sorrow.

It is hard to admit when we do wrong, especially when we think can keep our secret from getting out. Like David, we go about our lives like nothing is wrong, feeling good about ourselves.

God knows the secrets of the heart (Psa. 44:21). Sins have consequences, whether they are found out or not. By refusing to repent of them, we dig a deeper and deeper hole to get out of. But, if we

would just admit it, we can make the changes we need to be in a right relationship with God, and He will forgive us (1 Jn. 1:9).

The day will come for each of us when we will be under the light of the Judge of Heaven, and there will no longer be an opportunity to admit our guilt. If you are a Christian and have secret sin, just admit it, and God will forgive you as quickly as He forgave King David. "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 Jn. 1:9).




