

Plans For Tomorrow?

It is not wrong to make plans for tomorrow or even for months ahead. Paul's letter to Rome shows just how far ahead he had planned his life. As he was collecting the funds from the Gentile churches, he reveals his plan. It involved: (1) finishing gathering the funds; (2) making sure they were safely

plans about the So how did all this turn out? The funds were gathered and delivered to the saints, but the rest of future this plan simply did not happen. Notice his words in verse 31, "...that I may be delivered from those in Judea who do not believe." As he continued his journey, God used prophets in every city as he visited them to continually reveal what lay ahead. "And see, now, I go bound in the spirit to Jerusalem, not knowing the thing that will happen to me there, except that the Holy Spirit testifies in every city, saying that chains and tribulations await me" (Acts 20:22-23). Yet, he still made plans to visit both Rome and Spain. It is not wrong to make plans for our lives, but there is one matter to be remembered.

Paul even mentions this one thing in his letter. He said, "That I may come to you with joy by the will of God." He said, "by the will of God." Think of Jesus in Gethsemane. He prayed about the future, knowing that there was no way to escape the cross. In every prayer there He said, "Not as I will, but as You will" (Matt. 26:39).

See that important exception in James chapter four. He does not say we should never say, "Today or tomorrow we will go to such and such a city, spend a year there, buy and sell, and make a profit." This planning ahead with examples of was not wrong. What should we say? "If the Lord wills, we shall live and do this..." (Jas. 4:13, 15).

> There is no master plan, which we sometimes think when we say, "if the Lord wills." His master plan for Jesus was fixed, but such a plan does not exist for us. His master plan is to use you in such a way to help you grow in Christ and arrive in heaven. We have

> the freedom to make choices as to where and how He uses us. However, as we make plans of any kind, our hearts need to remember to make those plans realizing that we really do not know what awaits on the morrow.

> Making plans is not wrong. The Bible is filled with examples of those who did this. Making plans and leaving God out is wrong.



Hear Ye Him!

Who are the most common people that we "listen to" today? For some of us, it's our mom and dad, or our grandfather or grandmother. The wisdom of those generations is something we ought to cherish. For some of us, we listen to what our friends By David Sproule have to say. We care about what they think.

For some of us, we listen carefully to what a teacher says or what some scientist has discovered. We respect those who are trained in certain fields. For some of us, we listen to what police officers or judges say. We hold up those individuals who have been charged with keeping and enforcing the law. For some of us, we listen to what politicians say. We expect our local, state and national leaders and representatives to look out for our best interests and communicate with us about what is happening. For some of us, we lis-

ten to the media. We look to those who have insight and access into matters that we do not and assume they will tell us the details of what we need to know. For some of us, we listen to our inner voice. We do those things that seem right to us in the moment. There are certainly a lot of different "voices" that we listen to and pay attention to today. However, are these the most trusted sources? How can we be certain that we are not led astray down the wrong path?

In Luke 9, Jesus' three close friends, Peter, James and John, were listening to Him and Moses and Elijah talk about Jesus' impending death (9:31). While listening to them, Peter apparently saw three equals in the conversation and suggested building three tabernacles for them to stay and continue talking, "not knowing what he said" (9:33). The voice of God redirected Peter's misstep and said, "This is my Son, my chosen; hear ye him" (9:35, ASV). There were other great and power-

> ful voices to hear that day (the voice of Israel's lawgiver and the voice of the mighty prophet), but there was only one voice that mattered! Hear ye JESUS!

There are many powerful voices out there that desire to be heard (and even demand to be heard, in some cases). But, when it comes to those matters of ETERNAL consequence—such as holiness, righteousness, faith, salvation, baptism, the church,

worship, morality, homosexuality, fornication, the sanctity of life, abortion, sin, etc.—the ONLY voice that matters is JESUS! He has authority (Matt. 28:18)! Hear ye Him! His Word thoroughly equips us for all things (2 Tim. 3:16-17)! Hear ye Him! He is King of kings and Lord of lords (Rev. 19:16)! Hear ye Him! He will judge all mankind, at the end of time, by the standard of His Word (Acts 17:30-31; John 12:48). Hear ye Him!

Don't get caught up listening to the wrong voice! There are so many loud ones, it's easy to do! Hear ye Him!

Never Forget the Face of Our Father

Sometimes the memory of an event is all we have. Those memories help us hold on to a moment with a loved one or a lesson learned. There was an admonition from the Lord by Moses for the Israelites not to forget. When they went into the Promised Land, they were not to forget all that God had

done for them and the lessons learned in the wilderness (Deut. 6:12-15). There is a moment, as the nation of Israel crosses the Jordan River into the Promised Land, where this is emphasized by God (Josh. 4:1-24).

God commanded the ark of the covenant to be carried by the priests ahead of the people. As the feet of the priests touched the waters of the Jordan River, the water parted and stood still. All the people crossed while the priests stood with the ark. Then twelve men, one from each tribe, were sent into the river to pick one large stone per tribe from near the feet of the priests. The stones were brought back to the Promised Land side. As the feet of the priests left the riverbank, the waters came rushing back to their original flood stage. They placed the stones together and the place was called Gilgal.

"He said to the sons of Israel, 'When your children ask their fathers in time to come, saying, "What are these stones?" then you shall inform your children, saying, "Israel crossed this Jordan on dry ground. For the Lord your God dried up the waters of the Jordan before you until you had crossed...that all the peoples of the earth may know that the hand of the Lord is mighty, so that you may fear the Lord your God forever"" (Josh. 4:21-24).

The twelve stones were significant because they represented the tribes brought safely to the Promised Land and a fulfillment of the promise of God. Gilgal wasn't far from where

Abraham first built an alter to the Lord in Canaan. The day was significant because it was exactly forty years after the first Passover that was practiced in Egypt. Now they stand in the Promised Land, another promised fulfilled. The ark was significant because God had promised that He would lead them and go before them. The name Gilgal was significant—it means to roll or sweep away. The reproach of the

last forty years in the wilderness had been swept away. All of these things were to be taught to future generations, a remembrance of the work of God in their lives. It would forever be a reminder to the peoples of the mighty hand of God.

Is it any wonder that God would have set up a memorial feast for His people in connection with the greatest sacrifice, the greatest act of love, and the greatest promise fulfilled? What are we doing to teach future generations of the mighty hand of God working in our lives? We must remember—never forget the face of our Father.

How many loaves do you have?

Counting up all of the men, women and children, there were likely well over 10,000 people who had "continued with" Jesus "three days" and had "nothing to eat" (Matt. 15:32). Jesus wanted to feed them, but the disciples said, "Where could we get enough bread?" WHERE? What a question! Jesus asked them, "How many loaves do you have?" (15:33-34).

Think about being asked that question. "How many loaves do you have?" They answered, "Seven," but they were likely thinking, "We only have SEVEN loaves for ALL these people!"

Consider two things about the Lord in this context: (1) The Lord had supplied whatever number of loaves they already had. (2) The Lord would supply whatever number of loaves they would need to do His work. Friend, let me ask you, "How many loaves do you have?" In other words: (1) What has the Lord already given you? (2) Do you trust that He will give you all that you need? Just as in Matthew 15:32, know that He has "compassion" on you! – DS

Is something out of tune?

Sometimes it's easy to point the finger at others and not make application to ourselves first. Sometimes we might use a verse to talk about other people and think it only applies to them (and not us). Before we ever censure others, we must first make the application to ourselves.

Take Matthew 15:8 for example. We readily direct this at others, but what about you? What about me? Jesus described some "hypocrites" by saying, "These people draw near to Me with their mouth, and honor Me with their lips, but their heart is far from Me." Could this describe us?

Do we ever sit in worship and sing songs with our "mouth," but our "heart" is somewhere else? Do we ever speak about how important Jesus or His church is to us with our "lips," but our "heart" is singing another tune? God is listening to our hearts, and He knows if our words are not in sync with our hearts. If we're going to apply this to others, let us examine ourselves first! May God help me to not be a "hypocrite" or to worship Him "in vain"! – DS





Dining with the Devil

In Luke 14:15-24, Jesus tells the Parable of the Great Supper. He spoke about a man who gave a great feast. He sent his servant to call in all the wealthy, privileged guests he invited, but each one came up with an excuse as to why they could not attend. To each of them, their excuses were certainly reasonable. However, the master was angered by their excuses. In their place, he decided to let in the poor and the handicapped. When they all entered, there was still room, but the master would not allow any of those who refused him into the feast.

When the Lord told this parable, He was speaking about the Pharisees. Of all people, they were in the most privileged position to hear the invitation of Jesus Christ. They knew the prophets, they knew the Law, yet they rejected the invitation of the Messiah. Their priorities were elsewhere.

Our priorities show where our loyalties lie (Matt. 6:21). If our hearts are not with the Lord, then where are they? Jesus says that if we do not love Him and reject His word, then our hearts are with Satan. "You are of your father the devil, and the desires of your father you want to do" (John 8:44).

Like the Pharisees, Christians have been placed at the highest level of privilege, yet many of us offer excuses instead of worship to the Lord. Will you eat with the Master at His feast or lose your invitation and have to dine with the devil?

What Must I Do to Be Saved?

The Bible says...

- 1. Believe that Jesus is the Son of God
 "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and you will
 be saved" (Acts 16:31).
- 2. Repent of your sinful ways

 "Repent therefore and be converted, that
 your sins may be blotted out" (Acts 3:19).
- 3. Confess your faith in Jesus

 "If you confess with your mouth the Lord
 Jesus...you will be saved" (Rom. 10:9).
- 4. Be immersed in water

 "He who believes and is baptized will be saved" (Mark 16:16).
- Commit to a lifetime of faithful service
 "Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life" (Rev. 2:10).
