His Comforting Words in Our Times of Trial

Babylon lay on the horizon for God's chosen people, but none of them realized it. When God extended the life of King Hezekiah, an envoy from a small nation hundreds of miles away came to see the king. Hezekiah showed to them all the golden treasures Israel had amassed. He saw no danger, for when they came, Babylon was a small insignificant nation. How strange the words of the prophet Isaiah must have sounded to him. "Behold the days are coming when all that is in your house, and what your fathers have accumulated until this day, shall be carried to Babylon; nothing shall be left" (2 Kings 20:16-17).

Isaiah had another message which would help those who later would be carried to Babylon. It was about the nature of God in the midst of that terrible trouble they would endure. These words of comfort should be remembered by us whenever great trials come into our lives. They speak so clearly of the eternal, unchanging nature of God.

"I have chosen you..." There was that time when one nation was his chosen people. In the midst of trials, we must see how His mercy has made Christians His chosen ones.

Fear not for I am with you..." The peace He has given us, which surpasses the ability for any mortal to understand, is

based on the promise He has made that He will never forsake us. Faith in that promise conquers all fear.

"Be not dismayed, for I am with you..." His presence gives us more than the removal of fear. When trials come on, the ungodly are so often overwhelmed by them. Remember His words, "Be anxious for nothing."

"I will strengthen you..." When the Almighty One stands beside us, we can rest assured that He will give His strength to us. We are always greater than the enemy, and there is absolutely nothing that is a problem to the God who delivers us from every trial.

"Yes, I will help you..." The inclusion of this word "yes" is God's way of saying that He is determined to help us. There is no temptation for which He does not provide a way of relief, and our God, who cannot lie, will always help us.

"I will uphold you..." Paul lists those things which cannot separate us from God, and then concludes, "In all these things we are more than conquers through Him" (Rom. 8:37).

"With My righteous right hand" (Isa. 41:8-10). We sit on His right hand, the hand of strength, and it is that hand with which He works in our lives—always working righteously.

Making the Return of Christ Simple

The denominational world has surely complicated what the Bible teaches about the return of Christ. They have added much to the simple information that we have in the Bible. Let's see just how simple it is.

(1) The timing of the return of Jesus is unknown and completely unpredictable (Matt. 24:36-44; 1 Thess. 5:2). There will be no signs to indicate the time is near.

(2) "All" of the "signs" in Matthew 24 before verse 34 were signs that would happen in that "generation" at the fall of the Jerusalem and destruction of "the temple" in A.D. 70. (24:1-34). None of them apply to Christ's coming at the end of time.

(3) "Every eye will see" Jesus when He is "revealed from heaven" with "a shout" and "with the trumpet of God" (Rev. 1:7; Acts 1:9-11; 2 Thess. 1:7; 1 Thess. 4:16). There will be nothing secretive about His return.

(4) When the "last trumpet" (1 Cor. 15:52) sounds on "the last day" (John 6:40, 44, 54), "all who are in the graves will hear His voice and come forth" in the same "hour" (John 5:28-29). The Bible never places any amount of time between the resurrection "of the just and the unjust" (Acts 24:15).

(5) The only people under discussion in First Thessalonians 4:13-17 are the "dead in Christ" and the "alive" in Christ

at the time of His coming. No one outside of Christ is in view. On the same day, the dead in Christ will be raised, and then the alive in Christ will be "caught up" to meet them.

(6) Once everyone on that "last day" is removed from the earth (the dead and the living), the earth will "pass away" (Matt. 24:35), "with a great noise," "the elements will melt with fervent heat," and everything "will be burned up" and "dissolved" (2 Pet. 3:10-12). Nothing will be left.

(7) Christ established His promised kingdom in the first century, just as He promised to do (Matt. 4:17; 16:18-19). The kingdom has been in existence since Acts 2 and Christians are part of it today (Col. 1:13; Rev. 1:9). Christ will not step foot on this earth again (1 Thess. 4:17; Acts 1:9-11) nor be coming to set up and reign over a literal kingdom for a literal 1,000 years. Revelation is written in symbolic language (Rev. 1:1), including the events and time in chapter 20.

(8) At the time of Jesus' return, He will "sit on the throne" and "all nations will be gathered before Him" (Matt. 25:31-32). All will be judged on the same day (Acts 17:30-31).

(9) Christ will sentence the "righteous" to "eternal life" and the unrighteous to "everlasting punishment" (Matt. 25:46). The eternity of both realms is firmly established.

A lot is going to happen on that "last day." But it is not as complex or drawn out as some try to teach.

“Do Not Fear, I Will Help You”

I’ve wanted to tell people on several occasions that everything would be okay. There have been times when I wish I could’ve given people assurances about the future, and to let them know that as dark as it seems right now things would work out. Don’t be afraid, it will be okay. As much as I wanted to say it, I knew that wasn’t an assurance I could give. Things happen in this life outside of our control. No matter how bad we want to say it, we know that life isn’t always alright. There is only One that can give those kinds of assurances, and He does to those who love Him.

In one particular passage, God gives His assurances over and over. “Do not fear, for I am with you; Do not anxiously look about you, for I am your God. I will strengthen you, surely I will help you, Surely I will uphold you with My righteous right hand... For I am the Lord your God, who upholds your right hand, Who says to you, ‘Do not fear, I will help you.’ Do not fear, you worm Jacob, you men of Israel; I will help you declares the Lord and your Redeemer is the Holy One of Israel” (Isa. 41:10, 13-14). This passage addresses several of our human concerns when we are in the grip of fear.

“Do not fear, for I am with you.” The presence of a capable confidant makes all the difference when fear has

seeped into our hearts. Fear tries to isolate and keep us from the source of our greatest strength—the Lord our God and those that follow Him. The presence of the Almighty is something that can drive away fear.

“Do not anxiously look about you, for I am your God.” Anxiety and fear go together. The chest tightens, breathing becomes labored, and rational thought slips away when anxiety grips us. God has said the I AM will be with us. It was the I AM that spoke the world into existence and breathed life into man. He is the one that is with us and asks us not to fear.

Our God can make these assurances when man can’t.

“Do not fear, I will help you.” The presence of the Almighty I AM should help with the anxieties of fear, but He doesn’t stop there. There are things He will do to help us. He will strengthen us and provide that help of encouragement and fortitude that is found in confident trust. If we can learn to trust Him, then fear has no place in us. He will uphold us with His righteous right hand. It is significant that it is His “righteous right hand.” The right hand is the hand of power and dominance, to the defeating of our enemies. Righteousness is the idea that his judgment and actions for us or even against us will always be right. He will not arbitrarily pass any judgments.

Our God can make these assurances when man can’t. He knows what is best for us. We need to learn to trust Him.

Mark of your ownership

Is the Christian life worth it? Is it “worth all the sorrows that here befall”? In all that the apostle Paul endured, he certainly insisted that it is well worth it! He pleaded, for example, with the churches of Galatia to remain true to the Christ and to His gospel and to not “turn away” from Him. In his next-to-last sentence in the letter, to show how very worthwhile it is to stay true to Christ, Paul stated, “I bear in my body the marks of the Lord Jesus” (Gal. 6:17).

In those days, slaves were usually marked with the name or stamp of their owner, to prove to whom they belonged. In a very literal sense, Paul had received in his body “stripes above measure” (2 Cor. 11:23), having been beaten countless times for his devotion to Christ.

Does your life bear any “marks” of the one to whom you belong? I’m not talking about signs of physical beatings or branding marks. I’m talking about clear signs of steadfast devotion to, unwavering faith in and personal sacrifice in faithful service to your Savior. Is it obvious to whom you belong? – DS



Greet is a personal imperative

Five times in the letters to New Testament Christians, instruction is given to “Greet one another,” “all the brethren,” with a “holy kiss” or “a kiss of love” (Rom. 16:16; 1 Cor. 16:20; 2 Cor. 13:12; 1 Thess. 5:26; 1 Pet. 5:14). In addition to those five, twenty-one other times Christians are instructed to “Greet” specified brethren. That’s 26 times where Christians are told to “Greet, Greet, Greet” one another.

Now, as you read through these instructions, it is interesting to see that there are no qualifications or conditions placed upon fulfilling this command to “Greet.” There is no verse that says to wait for others to greet you first. There is no verse that says to complain when others don’t seek you out to greet you. There is no verse that says to only greet those who you know, or who you like, or who you expect will be pleasant toward you.

Brothers and sisters, do we “greet” one another? Truly? Can we increase and improve in this area? – DS

Belief or Obedience?

John 3:16 is one of the most well-known verses in the Bible. This passage has been used by many to downplay the importance of baptism. Is belief all that is needed to be saved? The New Testament is filled with passages that proclaim the essentiality of baptism (cf. Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38; 1 Pet. 3:21), but what does John 3 really teach?

In verse 5, Jesus explains what it means to be born again. He says, "...unless one is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God." Jesus is talking about baptism. In this passage, Jesus spoke to a Pharisee, named Nicodemus. A Pharisee would have understood John's baptism. Some Pharisees even came to John to be baptized (Matt. 3:7). So, when Jesus told him to be born of water, he would have known that He was speaking of baptism.

The chapter continues this theme, recording John the Baptist's explanation of Jesus' baptism (v. 27-36). In his conclusion, the NKJV translates verse 36, "...he who does not believe the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abides on him." This may lead someone to say that he is emphasizing belief. However, the ESV, NASB and ASV more precisely translate it, "he who does not obey." Throughout the Bible, nothing is emphasized more than faith-based obedience. It is how we express our love to Him (John 14:15). If we do not obey God, we will not enter His kingdom and baptism is an act of obedience.

Auditorium (Richard Watson):

Exodus & Leviticus (Part 2)

Exodus details the birth of a nation, of Abraham's family, and the promise of a great nation fulfilled. Leviticus teaches Israel how to be a Holy Nation, set apart by God.
