A Morning Devotion

Let me share with you an experience I had just a few days ago. I have no idea what prompted it, but the lyrics of a song which I had not thought of for more than seventy years came back to me. They were written on my heart before I entered school, and for some reason, I remembered them.

Where had I learned this song? In my memory I went

back to the wooden frame church building at West Huntsville. I recalled what Sunday School classes were like where I went to my "classroom" and what I thought was an anciently old woman taught me. We would often begin the class by singing the same song. These were the lyrics that came to my mind the other day.

> "I washed my hands this morning, So very clean and white; And lent them up to Jesus, To work for Him till night."

Think of the power of these words and the impact they had on a child. Once these words were written on the heart, how could a child not think of them every time he washed his hands? Hand washing was far more than getting dirt removed from the hands. It was a reminder that those very hands were lent to Jesus to work for Jesus all day long.

The song did not end with this thought. There was a chorus, a refrain, which we then sang:

"Little feet, be careful, Where you take me to; Anything for Jesus, Only let me do."

What a concept. It brought to a child's mind that wherever he went that day he had committed to do anything for Jesus.

There was a second verse to the song followed by the same refrain:

> I told my ears to listen, Throughout the live-long day; For any words of kindness, My little lips might say."

Thank you, "Miss Hastings," for teaching me this song and for helping a small child view each day so differently. I am not sure her name was Hastings, but I remember how she sat with her open Bible and told me stories about what God had done. She had no flannelgraph, no visual aids—nothing like we have today—but I can still see her with the Bible in her lap trying to help children.

So, when you "wash your hands this morning," think about using hands, feet, ears and lips for Him today!



Baptism of Fire? No, Thank You!

It is critically important to understand things in the Bible in the way that they were written to be understood. There are some religious teachers who would suggest that the baptism of fire is a good thing and something for which we should long. However, that is not what Scripture teaches.

Let's study what the Bible says in Matthew 3:11.

The Bible student should notice the setting. The preaching of John was leading many people to be baptized. When "many of the Pharisees and Sadducees" came to his baptism, John warned them of the dangers that awaited them if they did not repent (Matt. 3:7-12). In the midst of this warning, John made this statement about Jesus: "He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire" (3:11).

The Bible student should define terms. The Greek word baptizo means to "dip, submerge, immerse." Jesus was going to immerse individuals in the Holy Spirit and in fire. The definitions themselves draw into question one being BOTH immersed in the Holy Spirit and immersed in fire.

The Bible student should keep the verse in its context. There are some who believe that the "baptism of fire" is a desirable activity, and they tie it to the baptism of the Holy Spirit. They speak about the purifying nature of fire and suggest that is what happens when one is baptized with the Holy Spirit.

First, regarding the baptism of the Holy Spirit, Scripture only accounts for two occasions when that took place: in Acts 2, when the Jewish apostles were immersed in the Holy Spirit; and in Acts 10, when the Gentiles were immersed in the Holy Spirit (see Acts 11:15). The baptism of the Holy Spirit is not available to man today, as it is not the "one baptism" (Eph. 4:5). And the "baptism of fire" is not the fire associated with

Fire is not anything that any would want to experience

the baptism of the Holy Spirit, as that fire merely "sat upon" them (Acts 2:3), rather than immersing them.

Second, put "baptize you with fire" (Matt. righteous person 3:11) into its immediate context. In the verse before it, unfruitful tress would be cast into the "fire." That's the eternal judgment of God against evil. In the verse *after* it, the chaff would be burned up with unquenchable "fire." That's the eternal judgment of

God against evil. If the "fire" in the verse before is God's judgment and the "fire" in the verse after is God's judgment, then the fire of the "baptism of fire" must also be God's judgment.

The Bible student will conclude that the baptism of (i.e., the immersion in) fire is not anything that any righteous person would want to experience, when God "casts" the unrighteous "into the furnace of fire" (Matt. 13:42, 50). Let's make sure to study and understand the Bible in the way God intended, and let us flee from the wrath of baptism in fire.

The words of a song from 75+ years ago still are part of my heart and soul



A Psalm For Life

When you get a new Bible as a gift, many times it is signed by the giver. Often, they might cite or quote a passage they think is important or helpful. This happened for me, and the passage that was referenced is one that I have gone back to over and over again in my life. No matter my age or situa-

tion, it has been a constant help and reminder.

"How blessed is the man who does not walk in the counsel of the wicked, nor stand in the path of sinners, nor sit in the seat of scoffers" (Psa. 1:1)! This verse was written with great exclamation. Literally it is, "O the happiness of the one that..." It is not just a pious statement of depriving oneself of corrupt company but a statement of the happiness that comes when they are avoided.

"But his delight is in the law of the Lord, and in His law he meditates day and night" (Psa. 1:2). Joy or delight is found not in corrupt company and any their exploits but in the word of the Lord—the delight of a life lived in close connection with God's guidance.

"He will be like a tree firmly planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in its season and its leaf does not wither; And in whatever he does, he prospers" (Psa. 1:3). Then, we are reminded of the results of that kind of life. Be careful that we read this in the right context. This is not a health and wealth gospel. If we are living our life in step with the Lord, bad things will still happen and not everything will go our way. Look at the life of Paul, for example. However, the prosperity that we seek needs to be seen in the context of the spiritual reward that we seek.

"The wicked are not so, but they are like chaff which the wind drives away. Therefore the wicked will not stand in

the judgment, Nor sinners in the assembly of the righteous. For the LORD knows the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked will perish" (Psa. 1:4 -6). Lastly, we are reminded that the results of not following after God are the opposite of the righteous life. The fact that judgment is mentioned and not simply stating what they do won't prosper means that the spiritual realm is what is in focus and not

wealth and prosperity that many might emphasize. The unrighteous will not be numbered among God's special treasure. This is yet another reminder that there is not a third gray area with God. You are either His righteous one or a sinner and alienated from His promises of future glory.

This has been a great passage to help keep my focus and priorities right. Not all that shimmers is gold. We get to live the best life walking with God. I challenge you to find your touchstone passage that is memorized and on quick recall.

Bringing Evil Into the Home

In an article by Victoria Shupryt from KOAT Action News comes the headline, "12-year-old Dies of Fentanyl Overdose, Mother and Grandmother Charged in Death." It would be difficult to imagine anyone being unphased by such a title. There is not much left to wonder about what happened in this incident. The article reports,

"the family has a history with drug abuse and neglect and that family members provided drugs and alcohol to the boy" (Shupryt). How could a mother and grandmother do such a terrible thing? We are welcoming the worst

Bringing drugs into the home and providing them to a child is an extreme case. No Christian would condone such a thing. However, many Christian parents today bring all sorts of harmful materials

into their home and expose their children to them without a second thought. Their children have nearly unrestricted access to all the evils found on the internet and video streaming services. They put a phone in their pocket and don't check to see what videos they view on TikTok or what pictures they're sending or receiving on Snapchat.

Exposure to pornography is devastating to young minds. According to the American College of Pediatricians, children who watch pornographic material experience

"...increased rates of depression, anxiety, acting out and violent behavior, younger age of sexual debut, sexual promiscuity, increased risk of teen pregnancy, and a distorted view of relationships between men and women."

Parents have an obligation to "train up a child in the way he should go..." (Prov. 22:6), but we are welcoming the worst kinds of evil directly through our front doors and into our children's pockets. We need to rethink what we allow on

the screens of our televisions and cellphones.

We must "abstain from all appearance of evil" (1 Thess. 5:22). If we neglect our children, we will face the Lord's judgment. "But whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in Me to sin, it would be better for him if a millstone were hung around his neck, and he were drowned in the depth of the sea" (Matt. 18:6).

If we want to protect our children, then we need to reconsider everything that we have exposed them to. What movies do you allow them to watch? What shows are you allowing them to stream? Does it contain sexual content? Is the content you've approved for them more likely to cause them to draw closer to God or to seek out more and more perverse sexual content? Do you check their search history? Does the browser on their phone have firewalls for pornographic websites? Are you bringing evil into the home?

If you don't know or check it, you'll believe it

I may have misheard this. The morning traffic report on the radio said that there was an accident on the Beeline Highway at Lake Worth Road. Some people would completely disregard because they're not on the road that day. Others would be-

lieve the report, as it is coming from a professional who knows what he's talking about—why question him? Still others would realize that those two roads are nowhere near each other, so the reporter was wrong.

Hearing this report on the radio made me think of how some folks handle Biblical teaching that they hear. Some folks completely disregard it, as they are not interested. Other folks believe what a preacher or "knowledgeable Bible student" says, as it is coming from someone who "knows what they're talking about." Still others listen carefully and critically to what is said and then check "the road map" (i.e., the Bible) to see if what is being said is "actually so."

Which hearer are you? I may have misheard the radio report. Do you ever check what you hear? -DS

When your temptation starts calling

If a snake came and talked to you and offered you a piece of food that your Physician had forbidden you to eat, would you give in? Sometimes we are quick to judge. First, we may think, "Who in the world would pay attention to a talking snake?" (Yet, we have another man in the Bible arguing with a talking donkey.) Second, we may think, "Staying away from

that one food would be so easy, when there are so many others to eat." (Yet, staying away from temptation is often very difficult, even when it may seem obvious to others.)

Paul tells us that Satan "transforms himself into an angel of light" (2 Cor. 11:14). In his

"craftiness" (11:3), he can make a lie sound like a truth (Gen. 3:4). He can make a stone look like a good meal (Matt. 4:3). Others may look at your temptations and think, "That's silly." But a temptation is a temptation to the person to whom it is tempting.

Our job is to not be "ignorant of his devices," so that he cannot "take advantage of us" (2 Cor. 2:11). Then, we need to "resist" him and "draw near to God" (Jas. 4:7-8). – DS
