"For Thine is the Kingdom".... Really?



So many individuals know the words of the prayer Jesus gave in the Sermon on the Mount. It begins by addressing God with the words, "Our Father which art in heaven. . ", and ends with "For Thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever. Amen" (KJV-Matt. 6:9-13). What can be so

easily overlooked is the prayer of David as he discussed the building of the temple by his son, Solomon. He said, "Thine, O Lord, is the greatness, and the power and God has not abthe glory, and . . . the kingdom" (1 Chon. 29:11).

What does the expression "Thine is the kingdom" really mean? Look at the NKJV rendering of the words of David, "Yours, O Lord, is the greatness, the power and the glory. . .Yours is the kingdom, O Lord." The kingdom is God's. Thine (Yours) is the kingdom!

Now when we understand that John the Baptist, Jesus, the twelve and the seventy proclaimed that the kingdom of God was at hand, about to come in the first century (Matt. 3:2; 4:17; 10:7; Luke 10:9), should we be surprised that Jesus taught His disciples to pray, "Thy kingdom come"? Jesus said that the kingdom would come with power in the lives of those who heard His words (Mark 9:1). We know what that kingdom is. Those in the early church had been translated into the kingdom (Col. 1:13). Jesus said the kingdom would come in the first century. What came? That which came was the church.

Now note how the prayer the Lord gave said that the kingdom belongs to God! He said that kingdom is Yours (Thine). He planned it and the blood of Emmanuel bought the church (Acts 20:28). It is His and His alone! He is the King over the kingdom. He is the head over the church (Eph. 1:22-23). Look again at the prayer. The kingdom belongs to Him forever.

> O the folly of any mortal, whose very life is dependent on the breath God gives him, to usurp the right of the King to govern His kingdom, to rule His church. But isn't that what has been done in Christendom?

> The whole basis of denominational division is that God has abdicated His throne and given the kingdom to mortals and the right to change anything in the church any man desires. God did not give men

the right to change His rules for His kingdom about worship, the Lord's Supper, congregational singing, church organization, baptism, and a host of other matters. Where is the authority for all these changes? Does it come from a church synod, the reverend pastor, the church board, etc.?

Read the Bible. Let God be King over your life. Let's return to the way He designed His kingdom, the church. Let's not just say the words, "Thine is the kingdom." Let's give the kingdom back to Him.



The Bible Is Hard to Understand? (Part 1)

How many times have you heard it said? Or maybe you were the one saying it? "The Bible is too hard to understand." People have been saying that for years. But, is that true? Should we set the Bible aside and dismiss it as an incomprehensible book? Or have we maybe been misinformed and the

Bible can actually be understood? Let's consider this.

First of all, who is saying that the Bible is hard to understand? I have known people over the years who had not read the Bible but were making claims about the Bible. If you haven't read the Bible, then how do you qualify to offer any evaluation of it? Or maybe you are one who has tried to read it but you have found it hard to understand. Why is that?

Sometimes things we have heard cause us

to think the Bible is hard to understand. Some have said over the years that "only the clergy could understand it." That conditions the mind of the average person to think, "Well, then I won't be able to understand it." Perhaps you've started to read the Bible but didn't expect to understand it. Again, the mind is already closed to the possibility and is preconditioned to "not" understand.

If you are one who has thought the Bible is "too hard to understand," can I ask you a sincere question—How much

have you read? What parts have you read? When someone who has never read the Bible asks me where they should start, I usually tell them to start with the book of John, then read Acts after that, and then go back to Genesis or to Matthew. John is easy to understand and it's all about Jesus. After reading through John, can you still say, "The Bible is hard to understand"? I've never met anyone who could still claim that.

> Admittedly, some parts of the Bible are difficult to understand, such as reading about animal sacrifices, or reading the names of people and places that we don't recognize, or reading figurative language that is not familiar to us. Peter made a statement about Paul's epistles and said, "in which are some things hard to understand" (2 Pet. 3:15-16). Someone might say, "Well, there you go! Even Peter said it was hard." But wait? Notice that Peter says it was

"SOME" things hard to understand. Not all. Not most.

Here's something we need to grasp. God gave us the Bible (2 Tim. 3:16), and He said that it could be understood. Paul wrote, "when you read" what he had written, "you can understand my insight" (Eph. 3:3-4). We can understand what Paul understood and such is expected (Eph. 5:17; John 8:32).

So, let me encourage you to open your Bible. Expect that you will understand it. Ask God to help you. Then, start with the book of John and enjoy reading about Jesus.

this statement; however, it is no laughing matter when it comes to our lives as Christians. We might be excellent so far as the nouns and adjectives are concerned: doctrine, faith, good, faithful. The question might be, "But where are the verbs?" Go, do, teach, serve, give, pray, visit, attend, love, study, and so on are all actions that can ensure that we are not unfruitful in our service to God.

We sometimes get into the mindset that "going to church" and "being a good person" are the extent of our reasonable service (Rom. 12:1). Yet, when you think on it, going to meetings and being a good person isn't any different than the Boy Scouts of America, Shriners or Kiwanis Clubs, and any other civil service organization. Christ did not die to set up another nonprofit organization or club. We know that intellectually, but we don't always live it. Paul charged Titus to "set in order" the things that remained (Titus 1:5). Chief among those things was establishing an eldership in every congregation on the island. Paul closes the letter with this also, "Our people must also learn to engage in good deeds to meet pressing needs, so that they will not be unfruitful" (3:14). The context of this statement was specifically seeing to the needs of some evangelists that were to be traveling in their area. We need to shift our thinking about good deeds away from philanthropy and towards eternity. I will say that there are times when those things overlap but, the focus needs to be on removing the physical need to get to the greater spiritual need (Luke 5:20-26).

Learn to engage in good deeds to meet pressing needs. for a g yourself around needs?

A changed mindset and a shift in a paradigm for a group starts with us individually. Try asking yourself two questions. What are the pressing needs around me? What steps can I take to meet those needs? This puts you in the active engaging role of fruitful Christianity. If I were to see the needs around me and ask the question, "Why isn't anyone doing

this for me/them?" that is victim Christianity. If I see a need in my life or another's and I ask the question, "Which church or person will do this for me/them?" that is consumer Christianity. We are trained to be consumers and taught to be victims by society. Christ has empowered us to not fall for those weak ways of thinking. A Cretan was known as a "lazy glutton" (Titus 1:12). We can't afford to be either in our service to the Lord. Look around. What are the pressing needs in your life, in your home, in the congregation, in the lives of those you come in contact with? What will you do about it?

state's 1931 ban on abortion. Can't you hear the arguments in your imagination? "Oh, c'mon! That is ancient history! We've grown as a nation since then! We are so much more advanced now! We've got move on beyond our foolish, closed-minded past!" Is a 90-year-old ban on abortion all that naïve?

> What about a 2,000-year-old ban? Jesus banned abortion in the New Testament (Mark 7:21; 10:19; Rom. 1:29; Gal. 5:21; 1 Pet. 4:15). What about a 3,500-year-old ban? God banned abortion in the Old Testament (Ex. 20:13; Deut. 5:17; Prov. 6:16-17). "If men...hurt a woman

with child, so that she gives birth prematurely...if any harm follows, then you shall give life for life" (Ex. 21:22-23). What about a 6,000-plus-year-old ban on abortion? Murder has been prohibited from the beginning, with the "blood" of those who are killed "crying out to God" (Gen. 4:8-10).

Whatever a state or nation or individual decides about abortion, God has already ruled on it! -DS

Now, take that and apply it to us. What is the

evidence of our love? Is there any proof that we love the Lord? Jesus said just a few verses earlier: "If anyone loves Me, he will keep My word" (14:23). Jesus loved the Father and, therefore, kept His commands. We love the Lord and, therefore, keep His commands. Jesus ties those two loves together in John 15:10. So, does God know that you love Him? He told us the way He wants to be loved. Think about it. -DS
