Jesus described how long he would be in the tomb. The words and phrases He used as He did this have often troubled Bible students. Those who focus only on the words of Matthew 12:40 usually concluded that these words demand that He was crucified on Thursday and raised up on Sunday. In

their understanding this is the only way Jesus could have been in the tomb for three nights.

Then, there are those denominations whose emphasis is on the Sabbath. One such group says He raised "on the that Jesus was raised precisely 72 hours later and that resurrection was on Saturday just precisely at the same time He was buried three days before. To them, the resurrection was "discovered" on Sunday morning.

Other Sabbath keepers use the words of Matthew and conclude that he was crucified on Wednesday and raised on Saturday morning. To them the three nights are Wednesday, Thursday and Friday night. Is there any way to know just what happened?

Remember that Jesus said, "Man shall not live by bread alone but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God" (Matt. 4:4). Jesus often mentioned the time He would be raised but uses two other phrases to describe that time. He only once spoke of "three days and three nights," but in the gospel accounts He used the phrase "the third day" at least eight times. Both Peter and Paul also use this phrase (Acts 10:40; 1 Cor. 15:4). The accounts of His resurrection show He was raised on Sunday morning. Those disciples walking on the road to Emmaus said, "Today is the third day" (Luke 24:21). If Sunday was the third day, then Saturday and Friday were the other two. This does not solve the problem of the three nights

of Matthew, but it shows one cannot simply read the Which is it? Was one account. He must deal with every word Jesus spoke. Consider what Jesus said in His message to Herod. "Go, tell that fox, 'Behold,' I cast out demons and perform cures today and tomorrow and the third day I shall be perfected'" (Luke 13:32).

> Jesus also used another phrase which complicates this matter. In Mark 8:31, Jesus said that "He

must...be rejected by the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again." There is no way to take the phrase "on the third day" and "after three days" literally and not make the Bible contradict itself.

So, what is the solution? Was He literally in the tomb three nights, raised on the third day, or after three days. Atheists and unbelievers use this problem to say that the Bible contradicts itself. What is the solution? Was it on the third day or after the third day? We will look at the solution in next week's article. It may not be as hard as it appears.



It's All a Matter of Authority (Part 2)

Every facet of your life requires authority to exist and then for authority to be recognized and respected. Whenever authority is not accepted and submitted to, chaos results. All of this is true for every part of your life, but especially in the realm of religion.

so where do I go?

It begins with an understanding that Jesus Christ has ALL authority (Matt. 28:18). We must "hear [Him] in all things, whatever He says," lest we be "utterly destroyed" (Acts 3:22-23). So, where do I find Christ's authority today? He's not here "in person" (per se),

Wouldn't you know that Jesus thought of that before He died, was buried, was raised from the dead and then ascended back into heaven? Did you know that He made arrangements for His authority to reside on this earth globally, cross-culturally and perpetually? He took His authority and He firmly embedded it in His Word—the Word that He received from the Father. Watch this.

When Jesus was on this earth, look at what He said in John 12:49-50 (pay attention to each word)—"For I have not spoken on My own authority ... " What? Then on whose authority did you speak? "...but the Father who sent Me gave Me a command, what I should say and what I should speak..." Oh, so Jesus spoke on the authority of the Father? Good! And since Jesus and the Father are "one" (John 10:30), then the full authority of heaven in His words. Jesus continues, "...And I know that His command is everlasting life. Therefore, whatever I speak, just as the Father has told Me, so I speak." Now, that's authority! That's assurance!

But, wait a minute! I didn't live back then! I didn't actually hear the words that Jesus spoke! What about me to-

> day? Back to the question: where do I find Christ's authority today? Read the verse right before these verses. Did you see the word "For" at the beginning of verse 49? Jesus is tying into what He just said.

> "He who rejects Me, and does not receive *My words, has that which judges him—the word that* I have spoken will judge him in the last day" (12:48). Grab that. Think about it. "The word" that Jesus

spoke "will judge" us "in the last day." Where is that "word" today? Interestingly, John depicts the judgment scene in Revelation 20, when he saw that "books were opened...And the dead were judged according to their works, by the things which were written in the books" (20:12).

Jesus took His Word and He put it into a book! He put His authority into the Bible! And on the day of judgment, His all-authoritative Word will judge us! But, how do I know that's where His authority resides? Read next week's article.

Be Nice



"I find it easy to portray a businessman. Being bland, rather cruel and incompetent comes naturally to me" (John Cleese). It is easy to be mean, and the world makes it easier. Life seems to be a gauntlet of rude awakenings, playground politics, the rage of rush hour, the push-and-shove along the

corporate ladder, and the snippy bickering of a thousand petty

conflicts can thoroughly trample any sunny disposition you may have once possessed as a child. It seems inevitable that we will be formed into a scowl. After receiving our fair share of mistreatment, we can end up approaching life with a preemptive, chronic frown. We brace ourselves for unkindness, and we are slowly transformed into a grouch.

This is not so for a Christian. A Christian must resist this darkening of the demeanor (Col. 3:12). A Christian doesn't indulge in the pettiness of the world. A Christian is known for kindness (Gal. 5:22). It's not an optional accessory. If you're a Christian, then that means you are kind. A Christian is loving. It's what defines him/her (1 John 3:10). The difference is obvious. Those who truly belong to God are loving, in particular, toward other Christians. This means unkindness can be a dealbreaker.

As far as Jesus is concerned, we can't draw the line

anywhere. Even when it comes to our very enemies, the appropriate response is love (Matt. 5:44). He goes on to explain that there's nothing necessarily admirable about loving the loveable (Matt. 5:46). There's nothing unusual about loving the loveable. Loving the unlovable, that's where you'll find a Christian. You'll also notice there are no excuses. 1 John 4:7 doesn't say, "Beloved, let us love one another unless you're in a really bad mood." Ephesians 4:32 doesn't say, "Be kind to one anoth-

er unless the other person is unkind to you first or if we have a genetic disposition for anger in your family." Scripture is not open to our good reasons. It might be difficult. It might feel downright impossible, but we are commanded to be kind to everyone. Love is the key ingredient. If we remove it from any situation, we are reduced to nothing more than an irritating noise (1 Cor. 13:1). If we do not love, we degrade our position. Even if we're right, we're wrong

because we didn't set out to do the right thing with love.

For a Christian, at the heart of every action is a basic question. When dealing with conflict and annoying personalities and even your enemy, it comes down to this very simple question. Do you love them? This question would stifle gossip, deception and maliciousness. This is the first brick that goes into place in determining everything else. Love, or the lack of it, will determine whether any action we take after that is godly or not. Action without love is easy.

The difference in one little word

Would you say that the apostle Paul had a close relationship with God? It's hard to draw any other conclusion. But, how close to God was he? He certainly believed in God (Act 27:25; 2 Tim. 1:12), prayed to God (2 Cor. 13:7; 2 Thess. 1:11) and trusted in God (2 Cor. 1:9; 1 Tim. 4:10). And he said those very words. But, I want you to see one little word in the book of Philippians.

Paul begins and ends the book of Philippians talking about his God. At the beginning of the book, he tells the brethren that he prays to God. At the end of the book, he tells the brethren that God will supply their needs. But,

would you open your Bible and underline the little word that is right before the word "God" in Philippians 1:3 and 4:19?

Paul did not just pray to "God" and trust in "God." Paul said that he prayed to "my God" and trusted in "my God." God was not just "God" to Paul. He was "my God"! If you want to have the kind of relationship with God that Paul had, don't just see God as "God." See Him as "my God"! -DS


