When we read the story of the prodigal son, we are so impressed that the father ran to meet him and immediately gave him such blessings. Have you considered that when Jesus lived on this earth, He showed the same kind of love for the wayward? He was Immanuel, God with us, and to see Him

was to see the Father (John 14:9).

Those in the first century had their own We overlook that ideas about those who would be part of the kingdom. When Jesus talked about how it was easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for those who trusted riches to enter into the kingdom, His disciples asked, "Who then can be saved" (Matt. 19:25)? The disciples had the rich at the top of their list, but Jesus' list was so different. He came to seek and save the lost, but like the father of the prodigal understood, prodigals would be part of the kingdom.

When He chose His apostles, He chose ignorant and unlearned fishermen (Acts 4:13). He chose a tax collector—the most despised occupation among the Jews (Luke 5:27). He chose a Zealot—a Jewish "terrorist" (Luke 6:15). He surrounded Himself with men whom He knew would all forsake Him in Gethsemane (Matt. 26:31, 56). Why? Because His heart was like the heart of the father of the prodigal. The prodigal turned completely away from the father and these apostles all fled from Jesus at His darkest hour. Yet, He longed for their return. He never rebuked them for this after His resurrection. He did not rebuke, He received. We must never overlook the message He gave to the women at the tomb, "Go tell My disciples to meet Me in Galilee" (Matt. 28:7).

Look at His life and see how He treated people so differently. He received and defended the woman taken in

> adultery (John 8:3-11). He accepted the thief on the cross, who at first blasphemed Him, and gave Him entrance that same hour to Paradise (Matt. 27:43-44; Luke 23:43). That thief had mocked Jesus by saying that Jesus was worthy of death and questioned that even God would not accept Jesus—yet Jesus, like the father of the prodigal, received Him.

Read the story of His life. He exemplified the heart of God who had said, "To this man will I look, even to him that is poor and of a contrite spirit, and trembles at My word" (Isa. 66:2). Jesus was like His Father and always "ran" to prodigals who sought Him.

Can I add one other person to those who Jesus so readily received when they sought Him? We sometimes overlook this person in the list of those whom He received. You already know that person. That person is you! Think about this.

Matthew? Really?

What's the first book of the New Testament? You can name it, almost as automatically as you can name your own children. But wait! Think about this for a moment. The first book of God's marvelous New Testament, where He is bringing His eternal plan to fruition, was written by a man

named Matthew. Do you know who this is?

Matthew was a Jew, so it is not surprising that God would select a Jew to write this allimportant book in revealing the unfolding of His plan. In fact, the second and third books of the New Testament call him by his more common name—Levi (Mark 2:14-15; Luke 5:27-29). But, here's the deal. Matthew was a tax collector!

New Testament Tax collectors were despised! As ones who collected taxes for Rome, they were viewed by the Jews as traitors, oppressors and apostates, who were perpetuating the rule of a pagan power. Even more, they were considered to be dishonest scoundrels, as many of them demanded and collected more taxes than Rome required in order to enrich themselves. The animosity that was held toward these individuals is seen throughout the gospel accounts (Matt. 9:11; 11:19; Luke 18:11; 19:7). So, isn't it intriguing that God would use a tax collector to write the first book of the New Testament?

Look at the passage where Matthew was called to be an apostle (Luke 5:27-32), and you will see why God chose to use such a man. When Jesus called Matthew to "Follow Me," the very next statement says, "So he left all, rose up, and followed Him" (5:27-28). He immediately went after Jesus.

Matthew then invited Jesus into "his own house" and "gave Him a great feast" (5:29). How many others had done that with the Lord? Matthew apparently invited "a great num-

> ber of tax collectors and others" to come and sit down with Jesus at this feast (5:29). He was trying to help others to see what he saw in Jesus.

> Unfortunately, there were a host of critics who looked down on Matthew and his fellow tax collectors. Jesus was quick to answer them and remind them of that which should have been quite obvious—the Son of God came to call to Himself

those who were spiritually "sick" (i.e., "sinners"), that they might have an opportunity to repent and be made right with Him (5:31-32). Matthew became the ideal disciple to write the book bridging the Old Testament and the New Testament.

We would do well to see people the way God sees them—not as the world sees them, not as their past life sees them, not as "those you like to pin everyone into some category" see them. Everyone needs Christ and needs an opportunity to be made right with Him!

The Expectations of God

Clearly communicated expectations are very helpful. When you start a new job, part of the interview process and even into the first few weeks is getting to know what is expected of your position. If that is clearly defined, then you are able to work toward achieving the expected standards. However,

if your duties are vague or unclear, then there is some uncertainty about how you should proceed. In like manner, God has not left us with an ambiguous idea of how Following clearly He expects us to live. Throughout the Bible, we see clear and direct commands.

God's first commands to mankind were given to Adam and Eve. They were to multiply, have dominion over nature and not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil (Gen. 1:28-29; 2:16-

17). This wasn't burdensome. He communicated what they were supposed to do, what they were supposed to eat, what they couldn't eat, and what would happen if they disobeyed. Yet, they were deceived, and they disobeyed. It is interesting that since the time that the knowledge of good and evil was introduced to mankind, we have had more commandments from God. A knowledge of good and evil requires a choice and guidance on how to live. Those next generations after Adam and Eve slowly degraded to the point that God destroyed the world. The salvation of mankind depended on one man following the commands of God (Gen. 6:5-8,13-22; 1 Pet. 3:20).

As you follow the generations from Noah, to Abraham, to the people of Israel under the direction of Moses, you find the commands of God to Israel. These books, known as the Law, Torah, or Pentateuch, contain 613 commandments of God. However, in all the complexity there is a way to simplify the concept of obedience and understand what is expected.

> The ability to do what is pleasing to God starts with the heart. God said, "Oh that they had such a heart in them, that they would fear Me and keep all My commandments always" (Deut. 5:29a). I need to make sure my heart is in line with the will of God. He communicated exactly what He wanted and the expectation of the kind of heart that would be obedient. "Now, Israel, what does the LORD your God require from you, but to fear the LORD your

God, to walk in all His ways and love Him, and to serve the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul, and to keep the LORD'S commandments and His statutes which I am commanding you today for your good" (Deut. 10:12-13).

When asked about the most important commandment, Jesus quoted from the law of Moses about the love of God and the love for your neighbor (Matt. 22:34-40; Deut. 6:5; Lev. 19:18). Following clearly communicated expectations will help us stay on task. God has commanded this for our good.



7 Keys to Happiness in the Home

1. Keep in Mind That God's Plan for Marriage and the Home Has Always Been the Best!

- a. God's original intention in marriage: "What God has joined together ..." (Mark 10:9).
- b. When humans break the God-given pattern for marriage, sorrow and heartbreak are the result.
- c. Hollywood and some social scientists have claimed that humans are not designed for monogamy. The Bible suggests the opposite: God designed marriage for the benefit of humans (Heb. 13:4).
- d. The God who created human beings wired them for life-long marriage.

2. Learn to Use Words Well!

- a. We tend not to give words enough credit for their power either to hurt or to heal.
- b. Rash (poorly thought-out) words hurt the other (Prov. 12:18).
- c. Words are ready to ambush the victim at any time (Prov. 12:6).
- d. Use words designed to build others up (Eph. 4:29). So...are you a building contractor or a demolition expert?

3. Learn to Become a Good Listener!

- a. Quick to hear, slow to speak (Jas. 1:19).
- b. When you are talking...you must not be listening (Prov. 18:2).
- c. Listen to the other side of the story; consider the possibility that there is another side of the story (Prov. 18:13).
- d. The first principle of being a good listener is being quiet (Prov. 17:28)!
- e. You have the responsibility to get what the other person said right. You do not have the right to fly off the handle on the basis of what you think he said, or suppose he said!

4. Forgive!

- b. Forgiven people forgive (Eph. 4:32).
- c. If only we had as high expectations for ourselves as we do for the other!
- d. You have only two choices: forgive or have no relationships at all. There is no third option (Matt. 6:14-15).

5. Ask Not What Your Marriage Can Do for You But What You Can Do for Your Marriage!

- a. The Golden Rule "Do unto others" still works (Matt. 7:12).
- b. Brecheen and Faulkner's chapter, "The Problem with Us Is Me," is still a pretty good way to approach the issue.
- c. Why not rather be wronged? If the relationship is that important to you (1 Cor. 6:7).

6. Before You Give Your Heart to Your Partner, Give Your Heart to God!

- a. Seek God's Kingdom first (Matt. 6:33).
- b. We are all aware of the love triangle that destroys a marriage. Here is a love triangle that builds a marriage: You, your spouse and God.
- c. Be involved in a congregation. Become an essential part of its work.
- d. Question a woman asked me: "If two people are genuine Christians, can they get married and be truly happy?"

7. Grow!

- a. We are commanded to grow (2 Pet. 3:18).
- b. On a day-to-day basis we should be changing into the image of Christ (Heb. 3:18).
- c. You cannot substantially change your outward appearance; you can however change the inside (1 Sam. 16:6-7).
- d. In Christ, there is the possibility of change, growth. This is the premise upon which all of Christianity is founded, and a better Christian becomes a better spouse
