I have been amazed over the years at how simple God has made eternal truths to every man who deeply longs to find the meaning of all that God has said. One of the major problems is that we come to the Bible with preconceived ideas and wrong conclusions which have come from those who have

used pamphlets, books, radio, television, campaigns and lectures. So, when we read the Bible, these preconceived ideas block our ability to just let God teach us.

Whenever we read the Bible, we must make a distinct difference between the thoughts we bring into the Bible and the thoughts which come forth from the divine words given by the Holy Spirit.

A vivid illustration of this is in the applicaearthquakes tion of Jesus' discussion of "...wars, rumors of wars...nations shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom...famines, and pestilences, and earthquakes..." Individuals have read these words almost since He said them, and then they apply these words to whatever has just happened or whatever looms on the horizon. In my lifetime these words have been applied to WWII, Berlin blockade, the Cold War and threat of Russia, the Korean War, Vietnam, Cuban crisis, the Six Day War, ongoing conflict between Israel and the Arab nations, the invasion of Iraq, rise of the military power of China, the

conflict in Afghanistan—the list seems endless. How on earth could one ever know when the words of Jesus actually had application? How often have you heard others mention the words of Jesus and then say, "The end is at hand"?

Are you aware that if one hears all the words of Jesus and puts them in the context where they were spoken, any person who can read can see how many teachers have led so many astray? One question, when we let God lead us to truth,

can enable the most uneducated among us to find the truth and see just how simple the truth of these question and you wars, earthquakes, etc. really is.

> That question is, "Who did Jesus say would hear of these wars?" Forget what you have heard others say and let Jesus tell you. It is very simple to answer. Read what Mark reveals to us. There were only four people who heard Jesus speak these words

and they were: Peter, James, John and Andrew (Mark 13:3). Now answer the question posed above. Who did Jesus say would hear of these wars and disasters? The KJV uses a twoletter word ("ye") and a three-letter word ("you"). These words have nothing to do with any war beyond the life of these four apostles! These four men were the ones who were told they would hear of the wars. The plain truth is you cannot believe what you have heard others say. Listen to Jesus and it will change how you read all He said in this chapter.

Lay Aside All Filthiness

Picture your worst possible day working out in your yard. It is 127 degrees out there (well, it feels like it) and you have been sweating profusely. As you were cutting your grass, the wind intentionally changed directions every time you turned and it blew all of the grass trimmings all over

your sweat-drenched body. But, of course, your yard has as much dirt as it does grass, so you're now covered in dirt from head to toe. You spend time cutting down some high tree limbs, and the shavings fall all over you and are now caked on you like some kind of sticky glaze. You look great! Smell even better!

When you're done, what do you do? Do as possible. you just act like nothing has happened? No! Every rational person would not go about the day like a normal day. Instead, he/she would immediately head to the shower, remove every single piece of filthy clothing and get cleaned up. If we recognize this desperate need in regard to a physical filth, why not in regard to a spiritual filth?

The first chapter of the letter from James warns Christians about the severe dangers of sin. Sin is the result of man giving in to "his own desires and [being] enticed" (Jas. 1:13-15). He warns of the danger of being "deceived" (1:16) and not learning self-control (1:19-20). He then bids Christians to understand these dangers and to "lay aside all filthiness and overflow of wickedness" (1:21). Think about these words.

"Lay aside" was an expression that was used of taking off clothes. The Greek middle voice emphasizes "to put off, cast off or strip off from oneself." In other words, get it away from you, as far away as possible. Do we do that with sin?

> Lay aside "all" wickedness. The word "all" does not leave any room for any exceptions. We cannot look at any sin and think, "Well, that one is no biggie, especially compared to some big ones that I could be doing." God says to cast ALL of it off. Do we?

> Lay aside all "filthiness and overflow of wickedness." The word "filthiness," as would be expected, was used of physical "dirt, filth," but it was used in Scripture metaphorically of "moral uncleanness, vulgarity, particularly of impurity of thoughts

and mind." James focuses on both the "filthiness" of one's heart and the "wickedness" of one's deeds. The word "overflow" emphasizes every level and extent of wickedness (great and small), even to the point of needing to put off the evil "residue" that remains when wickedness bubbles over. By demanding the removing of the abundance of wickedness, God requires stripping off every level or piece of it. Do we?

If we would not go about daily activities when we're physically filthy, how can we when we're spiritually filthy?

The Right to Be Wrong

We are quick to defend our rights when we feel they have been infringed. We have more rights than most in this country. but do we have the right to be wrong? We have a civil right to be wrong. God has given us free will to be wrong. A question might be, do we have the right to be wrong and still

have God's promise of salvation? Let's consider what the Bible has to say on a few subjects.

Can we be wrong about having faith in God? The Bible that would speak about salvation begins, Can we be wrong for unless you believe that I am He you will die in "In the beginning God" (Gen. 1:1). It also records, "The fool has said in his heart, 'There is no God'" (Psa. 14:1). "The heavens declare the glory of God...so they are without excuse" (Psa. 19:1; Rom. 1:20). "Without faith is impossible to please God" (Heb. 11:6). If we want the salvation that the Bible talks about, we can't be wrong about faith.

Can we be wrong about hearing God's word? "For 'everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.' How then will they call on Him in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in Him of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone preaching?" (Rom. 10:13-14). Paul told Timothy "from childhood you have been acquainted with the sacred writings, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus" (2 Tim. 3:15). If we want the salvation that the Bible talks about, we can't be wrong about hearing the word of God.

Can we be wrong about faith in Christ? "Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that

> by believing you may have life in His name" (John 20:30-31). "I told you that you would die in your sins, your sins" (John 8:24). If we want the salvation that the Bible talks about, we can't be wrong about faith in Christ.

Can we be wrong about the gospel? "Go into all the world and proclaim the gospel to the whole creation. Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved, but whoever does not believe will be condemned" (Mark 16:15-16). "Jesus is revealed from heaven with His mighty angels in flaming fire, inflicting vengeance on those who do not know God and on those who do not obey the gospel of our Lord Jesus" (2 Thess. 1:7-8). If we want the salvation that the Bible talks about, we can't be wrong about the gospel. It is clear that if we want what the Bible teaches, we can't be wrong about these and other subjects the Bible teaches.

When one thing does NOT lead to another

As Christians, a primary goal for which we must be striving is to truly "become the righteousness of God" (2 Cor. 5:21). This involves being acceptable to God and in a right relationship with Him, which is achieved not only through His working in us but also as we "work" and "practice" righteousness ourselves (Acts 10:35; 1 John 3:7). That should be our goal!

However, note carefully what James says. "So then, my beloved brethren, let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath; for the wrath of man does not produce the righteousness of God" (Jas. 1:19-20). Did you catch that last part, in contrast to our first paragraph?

If I am trying (as I should be) to "produce the righteousness of God" in my life, then I must be ever-conscious of the fact that, when I am not "slow to wrath" and I allow my anger to be conceived and to grow, I am not able to meet my goal of the righteousness of God.

Useless

The word "useless" is a pretty strong term. The English word means to be "of no use; not serving the purpose or any purpose; futile; of no practical good." Has anyone ever told you that your efforts were "useless"? What if God told you that your efforts were "useless"?

> The Greek word often translated "useless" is used to describe idols (Acts 14:15), "foolish controversies" that Christians must avoid (Tit. 3:9) and our "faith" if "Christ is not risen" (1 Cor. 15:17). Truly, it is being said, that such things are "of no use, not serving the purpose, futile." And we would expect the New Testament to

express such. But notice one other use.

"If anyone among you thinks he is religious, and does not bridle his tongue but deceives his own heart, this one's religion is useless" (Jas. 1:26). I may "look good" as a Christian (in my eyes) and think "all is right" in my relationship with God, but if I do not bridle my tongue, my outward actions of devotion are "useless." "Dear Lord, please help me to control my tongue!"



A Birdie Told Me

I still don't know how my Mom found out. As a young boy I had done something I shouldn't have done, but I didn't worry. Mom would never find out, I thought. Wrong. She confronted me about it the very next day!

I got the nerve to ask her how she found out. "A birdie told me" was her reply. I still, to this day, do not know how she found out. I doubt, though, that some winged creature revealed it to her.

Solomon mentioned something like this in Ecclesiastes 10:20. What did he mean by "the winged creature will make the matter known"? Solomon was using an ancient saying that is still popular today. In using this expression, he revealed several important truths.

First, we must appreciate the speed of words. We often say that "good news travels fast," but in this modern age of technology, news (good and bad) travels at speeds never before imagined. On my computer, I can talk with a friend in the Ukraine. My message is instantly received by him, and he responds immediately. Knowing, therefore, how quickly news gets out, we should choose our words carefully.

Second, we must appreciate the power of words. We can say anything—even in "confidence" (like our bedroom)—that can negatively affect us as well as others. Words do hurt, offend and kindle hard feelings. Therefore, it is vital that we guard what we say at all times—even in situations where we believe none will ever figure out what we said. Paul said that our speech should "always" be with grace (Colossians 4:6). He told the Ephesians to "let no unwholesome word proceed out of your month" (Ephesians 4:29). No qualifiers are allowed. There is no room for any words that are critical, derogatory or that might be classified as gossip.

Third, we must appreciate the appropriateness of words. Again, we're reminded of Paul's admonition to "consider how we ought to respond to every person" (Colossians 4:6). In Solomon's example, a person wanted to "curse" both a king and a rich man. What the king and the rich man did to provoke this curse is not stated. Let's assume that they did something terrible, thus eliciting such a response from the man. Yet, here is the point. Even though they may deserve the curse, it still shouldn't be given—even by one in private. We should develop the quality of being "slow to speak" and "slow to anger" (James 1:19). Is it ever appropriate to curse someone? To speak evil of someone? No! Solomon was warning about inappropriateness of such words, even when spoken in private.

Fourth, we must appreciate the danger of words. A few verses earlier, Solomon warned that "the lips of the fool consume him" (10:12). What would happen if the king and the rich man discovered what was said? It is assumed that it would not be good for the one who uttered the foolish curse. Jesus warned that if one cannot control his angry words, he will get what he deserves (Matthew 5:21-26).

So, what is the practical lesson to be learned? We must learn to control our tongues! James spent considerable time making this very point in his epistle (James 3). May we always exercise wisdom with our words, not only in what we say but where we say them.

"...always abounding in the work of the Lord..." (1 Cor. 15:58)
