

When persecution arose with Saul being in the forefront, the church was scattered, with no one remaining in Jerusalem, except the apostles. The Lord had made provision for the survival of the church by providing spiritual gifts to all the saints. With no apostles, it might have looked like the church was doomed, but those scattered abroad kept on preaching.

As time passed, another persecution arose in Jerusalem. Herod killed James, the brother of John, with the sword, and when the evil king saw how much joy it brought to the Jews, he seized Peter and set the date for him to be killed (Acts 12:1-3). How could the church survive without the leadership of two of the inner circle of apostles? That inner circle of Peter, James and John had experienced events none of the others had seen. > Samuel said that the Lord raised up Moses and Aaron to lead Israel out of Egypt (1 Sam. 12:6). In the promised land the people cried out to God who raised up judges (Judg. 2:16, 18; 3:9, 15). The Lord raised up prophets in Babylon (Jer. 29:15). When "James" dies, God provides another "James." Now think of how in your lifetime you have seen older preachers and elders die and you worried, thinking the church could not survive. It always has survived and always will because God's nature is to raise a new "James" as they are needed.



Your Father Is Rich!

But, your heavenly Father is not only abundantly rich, but He "shall supply all your need according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus" (Phil. 4:19).

Your Father is rich in goodness (Rom. 2:4). The word for "goodness" means "the quality of being helpful or beneficial; goodness, kindness, generosity, benevolence." Read that definition and rejoice that your Father is rich in goodness!

Your Father is rich in forbearance (Rom. 2:4). The word "forbearance" means "the act of holding back from, bearing with, enduring, being tolerant." Read that definition and rejoice that your Father is rich in forbearance.

Your Father is rich in longsuffering (Rom. 2:4). The

word "longsuffering" means "patience; slowness of avenging injuries; self-restraint in the face of provocation which does not hastily retaliate or promptly punish." Read that definition and rejoice that your Father is rich in longsuffering.

Your Father is rich in grace (Eph. 1:7; 2:7). The word "grace" means "free favor; a beneficent disposition toward someone; gracious care/help, goodwill; the action of one who volunteers to do something not otherwise obligatory." Read

that definition and rejoice that your Father is rich in grace.

Your Father is rich in mercy (Eph. 2:4). The word "mercy" means "kindness or concern expressed for someone in need; compassion, outward manifestation of pity." Read that definition and rejoice that your Father is rich in mercy.

Your father is rich in love (Eph. 2:4). The word "love" means "kindly concern, devotedness; unconditional, unselfish, sacrificial esteem that seeks the highest good of its object." Read that definition and rejoice that your Father is rich in love.

Additionally, your Father is rich in wisdom and knowledge (Rom. 11:33). Every single quality of your Father that you can name abounds in excess to the infinite level. Truly, your Father is "abounding in riches for all who call on Him" (Rom. 10:12). Brother or sister, you are rich!

Proverbs for Conflict

Conflict will happen in life. There are many reasons why, but the important thing is how we deal with it. Will we represent Christ well or will we follow the unhealthy paths of common conflict practices? The book of proverbs offers some great wisdom in dealing with and avoiding conflict.

• "A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger" (Prov. 15:1).

• "A hot-tempered man stirs up strife, But the slow "Wisdom from to anger calms a dispute" (Prov. 15:18). above is first

• "When a man's ways are pleasing to the LORD, He makes even his enemies to be at peace with him" (Prov. 16:7).

• "A man's discretion makes him slow to anger, and it is his glory to overlook a transgression" (Prov. 19:11).

• "A brother offended is harder to be won than a strong city, and contentions are like the bars of a citadel" (Prov. 18:19).

• "A worthless man digs up evil, while his words are like scorching fire. A perverse man spreads strife, and a slanderer separates intimate friends" (Prov. 16:27-28).

• "He who gives an answer before he hears, it is folly and shame to him" (Prov. 18:13).

• "Do not go out hastily to argue your case; Otherwise, what will you do in the end, when your neighbor humiliates you? Argue your case with your neighbor, and do not reveal the secret of another, or he who hears it will reproach you, And the evil report about you will not pass away" (Prov. 25:8-10).

These passages offer some great information when dealing with conflict. When the tension starts, our first words can help deescalate the situation. Saying, "Calm down," is not

> helpful, but there are gentle responses that can help. If someone has an issue with you, say, "I'm sorry I offended you. Can we talk about it?" If you have an issue with another say, "When you said or did [enter offense here], it made me feel [enter emotion here]. Can we talk about it?" It is important to acknowledge your part of the conflict and offer a path to a solution. Leave room for mistakes or misunderstandings

on your part. It shows that you are willing to be reasonable and not demanding. The three main areas these passages cover are being slow to react, paying attention to our language, and not spreading or creating more conflict. It happens that these are the areas where healthy resolution most often break down. We should be striving for a solution that is best for all parties involved. We are not trying to get back at them or make them hurt like we hurt. Our words need to be for the edification and building up of the future relationship. It might not be easy, but the relationship can be healthier afterwards.

There is an interesting statement in 1 John 3:9 that has confused some folks. Some translations read that the one who "has been born of God does not sin" and "he cannot sin." What does that mean that "he cannot sin"? It cannot mean that a Christian does not actually sin and that he is unable to sin, because in the first chapter, John said, "If we say that we

> have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us" (1:8). And he shows what happens when we, as God's children, sin (1:7, 9; 2:1-2). So what does "does not sin" and "cannot sin" mean?

Some of the newer translations help a bit. The verb tense used in 1 John 3:9 is the Greek present tense, which denotes an ongoing, continual action. The verse could literally read: "Whoever has been born of God does not make it a practice to continue sinning, for God's seed continues to abide in him; and he cannot continue to practice sinning, because he has been born of God." Does a Christian sin? Yes, everyone does. But a faithful Christian does not make it a practice to keep on sinning, because He is striving to be like Jesus, in whom "there is no sin" (3:5). -DS


