Dealing With Mistakes of the Past

Far too many Christians carry far too much guilt about their past lives and choices they made which now impact the struggles in their daily lives. They look at the godly lives of other Christians and become discouraged almost to the point of just giving up. If this describes you now or in the past, consider

the life of Lot, the nephew of Abraham.

We know little of the early life of Lot. He was the son of Haran, Abraham's brother. The first mention of Lot is in the exodus from Ur. As they entered Canaan, Lot was with Abraham in his journey and even accompanied his uncle when he went into Egypt (Gen. 13:1).

dantly, and their flock and herds became so great that this forced the separation of Lot from Abraham. Abraham gave Lot the choice, and Lot saw the plains of Jordan, which the Bible describes as being "well watered everywhere like the garden of the Lord" (Gen. 13:10). The selfish decision he made impacted the rest of his life. In the plains of Jordan was the city of Sodom. Lot not only moved toward that city, he moved into that city (Gen. 13:12; 14:12). One cannot but wonder how afterwards Lot may have grieved over his decision.

Stop for a moment to consider how many of us may

make wrong decisions which often lead us down the wrong paths. It is the guilt of having made such wrong choices that become part of the burden of our guilt. Lot is not the only one whose decisions impact the rest of their lives.

Lot was like Abraham in that he entertained angels not even knowing they were angels. You know the story of how Lot foolishly offered his daughters to the men of Sodom—wonder if he later regretted this. The angel forced Lot and his

family to leave Sodom and soon Lot lost all his possessions, his wealth, his home and his wife to the fire of God's judgment. Then add the sinful actions of this man in his incestuous relationship with his daughters.

Before becoming too judgmental of Lot, look at how God saw him. Peter said that God "...delivered righteous Lot, who was oppressed by the filthy conduct of the wicked (for that righteous

man, dwelling among them tormented his righteous soul from day to day by seeing and hearing their lawless deeds)" (2 Pet. 2:7-8). We focus on his mistakes (and often we focus on ours), but God saw his righteous tormented soul.

Do not misunderstand what I am saying. Grace is ours, but we cannot continue in sin expecting grace (Rom. 6:1). Do not let your past mistakes overwhelm you. Live right, do right, die right! You will never regret it!

Does It Really Matter Why I Was Baptized?

We read about people being baptized in the New Testament and it creates within us a desire to also be baptized. We read about Jesus and the apostles teaching people to be baptized in the New Testament and it prompts us to want to be baptized. So, as long as I was baptized (i.e., fully im-

mersed in water), does it really matter why I did it? Some might argue that it doesn't matter, and others may claim it does. What does the Bible teach?

If it does not matter why someone is baptized, what if they are only doing it to please their parents and to get them off their back? If it does not matter, what if they are baptized because all of their friends were baptized and they just went along with them? If it does not matter, what if they do it because approach about them to be baptized? If it

cause someone dared them to be baptized? If it does not matter, what if someone is baptized just to satisfy the wishes of the person they want to marry?

The list of scenarios could be extended, but perhaps these are sufficient to make the point—even human wisdom recognizes that the reason someone is baptized actually does matter. So then, who gets to decide what reason is acceptable and what reasons are not? The answer should be obvious—Christ has all authority and no man does (Matt. 28:18)!

Since the Bible is the only Divine source of information regarding baptism, why would we look anywhere other than the Bible for the reason one needs to be baptized? Some today claim that one needs to be baptized in order to demonstrate to the world that he has accepted Jesus and been saved. Did you know that there is not a single verse in the Bible that teaches this to be the reason to be baptized? In fact, just the opposite. Some examples in the book of Acts (the Ethiopian in

Acts 8, Saul in Acts 9, the jailer in Acts 16) were individuals who were baptized "immediately," without waiting to gather a crowd to demonstrate to them (or to anyone else) that they were already saved.

So, what reason does the Bible give for one to be baptized? There is only one. When a sinner realizes that his sins are separating him from God and that he must make a change in order to be saved,

that person "must" be baptized, so that in the moment of immersion, he may be "saved" and have his sins "washed away" by the blood of Jesus (Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38; 22:16). That is the only Biblical reason for one to be baptized.

What if someone is baptized for a different reason than to obtain forgiveness of sins at that very moment? Then, that person was not baptized for the reason the Bible pinpoints and that person needs to decide if they want to follow the Bible's teaching (and Christ's authority) on the matter.

"Mercy Triumphs Over Judgement"

Am I being as

merciful as I can

be?

There are passages in the Bible that encourage us, build us up, inspire us, and keep us going through difficult times. Then, there are others that instill fear and reverence for the Lord. Passages like, "For if we go on sinning deliberately after receiving the knowledge of the truth, there no longer re-

mains a sacrifice for sins, but a fearful expectation of judgment, and a fury of fire that will consume the adversaries" (Heb. 10:26-27). There is a passage out of the book of James that makes me reflect and weigh my choices carefully. Here is why.

The passage reads, "So speak and so act as those who are to be judged by the law of liberty. For judgment will be merciless to one who has shown no mercy; mercy triumphs over judgment" (Jas. 2:12-13). You may read this and think it benign, but it is bot

mercy; mercy triumphs over judgment" (Jas. 2:12-13). You may read this and think it benign, but it is both beautiful and deadly. The danger in this passage is in our nature to desire mercy but deal out judgement. In Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, He had this to say about the merciful: "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy" (Matt. 5:7). He taught against the harsh judgement of the religious hierarchy of His day. "Do not judge so that you will not be judged. For in the way you judge, you will be judged; and by your standard of measure, it will be measured to you. Why do you look at the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log

that is in your own eye?" (Matt. 7:1-3). Even the parable of the wicked servant highlights this concept with vivid imagery. "Then summoning him, his lord said to him, 'You wicked slave, I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not also have had mercy on your fellow slave, in the same way that I had mercy on you?' And his lord, moved with anger, handed him over to the torturers until he should repay all that was owed him" (Matt. 18:32-34).

So how do I faithfully apply "mercy triumphs over judgement" in my life? First, we need to show mercy whenever we can. Think of it like planting a garden. I will sow the seeds of mercy in the soil of this life that I might reap the harvest of mercy in the next. Second, we need to maintain a balance as in all things. There are actions that people take to which they must be held accountable. We can't show mer-

cy and forgiveness to someone continuing in sin. "What shall we say then? Are we to continue in sin so that grace may increase? May it never be! How shall we who died to sin still live in it?" (Rom. 6:1-2).

The concept of mercy and judgment causes me to reflect carefully because it is easy to practice harsh judgement. It is not easy to forgive and be merciful. I want mercy and I need grace so I must give it. Carefully consider your dealings with those around you. Are you showing mercy?

What if someone made this wish for you?

The apostle John wrote a short note to a good friend of his named Gaius. In some of our notes today, we might say something like, "I hope you are doing well." John sort of said that, but he placed a pretty heavy qualifier on it. John said to his friend, "Beloved, I pray that you may prosper in all things and be in health, just as your soul prospers" (3 John 2).

Did you catch what John said? John prayed that his friend would "prosper" and that he would "be in good health" (NASB). Those are nice (and ordinary) things to wish, but note what level John wished for his friend to prosper and be in good health—"just as your soul prospers." John wanted Gaius to be as healthy physically as he was spiritually.

What if someone wished that for you? Are you as healthy spiritually as you are physically? What if we wished that for others? What if someone's physical health was sustained at the same level as his spiritual health? Some folks may not be doing so well. What would it take to get us to focus more on our spiritual health than we do our physical health? – DS

What kind of church is this?

Imagine for a moment that there was a person living in the city of Philippi in the first century who decided to visit the church one Sunday. This person walked in and asked, "What kind of church is this?" If you were there in the first century and heard that question asked, would it strike you odd? Think about it. In the first century, there was only one church (Eph.

4:4). There were not hundreds (or even a few) denominations. In other words, there were not "kinds" of churches!

When the first car was invented, you would not have asked, "What kind of car is this?" It was the car! The first and only one! There were no

others, so there were no "kinds" of cars! So, it would not make sense in the first century to ask, "What kind of church is this?" It was the church! The first AND ONLY one! There were no others, so there were no "kinds" of churches.

So, today, should we not simply go back to the Bible and be "the church" that Jesus started in the first century? He gave no authority for different "kinds" of churches (1 Cor. 1:10). He only has "one" (Eph. 4:4; 2:16; 1 Cor. 12:12-13). – DS






