God's Personal Message to You

Have you ever

wished that God

had come and

personally

spoken to you?

As one reads the Bible or listens to sermons, he learns great truths. He learns the truth about the origin of the created world, and this knowledge becomes the basis of faith. He reads about the lives and struggles of godly men and is filled with awe when he sees their faith and how it sustained

them. Yet, sometimes he just wishes that God would give him a personal message.

He studies the scheme of redemption and what sin does and how it brings bondage. He reads and sees how the blood of Jesus surpasses the blood of bulls and goats. He comprehends that His precious blood is the basis of salvation and the great price Jesus paid when He died such a horrendous death. He marvels at all of this and there is no doubt it im-

pacts his life and the decisions he makes, yet he may still wish that God would give him a personal message.

He reads the Bible and sees those messages God personally gave to Noah about the building of the ark and the coming flood. He reads about God's messages to Abraham about Ur and later about offering Isaac. He may not want to receive the message about his own son that Abraham received about his son, yet he thinks how wonderful it would be to receive a personal message from God.

Perhaps this story will help you, if you have ever had thoughts about God giving you a personal message. A Christian who I know so well tells the story of how he now looks at such messages. His first two children were born just fourteen months apart, and one night as he was telling them bedtime stories, he said to them, "I want to tell you something so important. Are you aware that when God wrote the Bible, He put in it one special verse for you? So, when you read this part of

> the Bible and this one verse remember that God put this in the Bible especially for you."

Their eyes were wide with excitement to know what personal message God gave just for them. That verse? "Obey your parents...for this is right" (Eph. 6:2). The truth is that this verse is in the Bible as a personal message to children!

The man then thought, "Are there any verses in the Bible God put there especially for me?" What about loving your wife like Christ loves the church? What about training your children in the teachings of God? It then dawned upon him that every verse, chapter, book, event, parable, discourse and every word is God personally speaking to him!

When you arrive at this point in your life, it will change how you study. This holy book is God's message, written personally to you and it gives you all you need to know. You do have a personal message from God-read it!



This Little Light of Mine

It has been proven that one of the greatest memory devices is to set something to music. In preparing for tests, some people will try to take the information they are attempting to memorize and create a rhyme that they can sing. God created our minds as fascinating machines, and He tied our memo-

ries somehow to song. When little kids are trying to remember the order of the books of the Bible, often they will sing the song. When not-so-little "kids" are trying to remember the names of the apostles, they will often sing the song. I applaud those parents who have recordings of church hymns and children's Bible songs that they play for their children around the house and in the car. It gets those spiritual concepts "stuck" in their heads (and in their hearts).

Think about how many Bible verses are set to songs. Glenn Colley and his family set hundreds of Bible verses to song for "little kids" to learn. Jeff Miller, from Apologetics Press, did the same thing. Think about how many "good ole VBS songs" are actually a Bible verse. What a great way for our children to learn the Word of God and to get it hidden in their hearts and written on their souls! One old classic is "This Little Light of Mine." Think about the words of this song.

"This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine!" Jesus

told His followers that this is our responsibility (Matt. 5:14-16). We are to be a "light" in a world of darkness (Eph. 5:8), and of course, our "little" light is merely reflecting the true "light of the world," who is Christ Himself (John 1:5; 3:19; 8:12; 12:46). Our responsibility, as Jesus commanded, is not to "shine our lights" but to "let it shine." Living right in a world so wrong just becomes part of who we are on a daily basis.

It gets spiritual concepts "stuck" in their heads (and in their hearts).

"All around the neighborhood, I'm gonna let it shine!" It is easy to "let it shine" on Sundays, when around other lights, but that is not where the benefit of the light is so desperately needed. I need to "let it shine" all around my workplace, my school, my neighborhood, my social organizations, my family, etc. Everywhere "in the midst of a crooked and perverse generation," our "lights" must shine (Phil. 2:15).

"Hide it under a bushel? No! I'm gonna let it shine!" Jesus said to not "put it under a basket, but on a lampstand" for the benefit of all (Matt. 5:15). I must not be ashamed of my light for Christ (2 Tim. 1:12)! I must not misprioritize my life so that my light does not shine (Matt. 6:33). I must live, so that all can see the light and glorify God (5:16)!

"Don't let Satan [blow] it out! I'm gonna let it shine!" "Resist the devil" (Jas. 4:7). "Watch and pray, lest you enter into temptation" (Matt. 26:41). The "roaring lion" wants to blow your light for Christ out (1 Pet. 5:8). Don't let him!



Last Message, Beware!

What do you say when you are leaving? Maybe it will be a while before you see someone again or you may never see them again. What words or concepts are most important to share?

Paul had a similar encounter with the elders of Ephesus, when he called them down to Miletus to meet him. Paul told them that they "would

no longer see his face" (Acts 20:25). He validated that the message he had given them had been the truth (Acts 20:20, 26-27). He encouraged them to be on guard for the "church over which the Holy Spirit had made them overseers" (Acts 20:28), that they should be on the alert for "savage wolves" that would come into the flock (Acts 20:29-30). He then used himself as an example of one that would labor in the congre-

gation. He also reminded them of the servant example of Christ, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).

Peter understood that his departure was at hand, "knowing that the laying aside of my earthly dwelling is imminent, as also our Lord Jesus Christ has made clear to me" (2 Pet. 1:14). He was "diligent that at any time after my departure you will be able to call these things to mind" (2 Pet. 1:15). There were things that he wanted the church to be able to remember, which is important because they didn't have copies of the Bible in their homes or on their phones. The teachings they had access to were from the copies the church had of letters, those that had spiritual gifts in the first century, and what they remembered from the teachings they heard. For this reason, he speaks about the validity of his message. He didn't use "cleverly devised tales," but he was "an eyewitness of His majesty" (2 Pet. 1:16). He reminded them that he heard the voice of God on the mount of transfiguration (2 Pet. 1:17-

> 18). He taught them about the nature of inspiration, the operation and origin of the message. Mankind is not the origin of the message. God is the origin of the message with the Holy Spirit as the operation, "men moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God" (2 Pet. 1:19-21). He then contrasts what they taught and how the inspired message was transmitted with false prophets and false teachers. "But false prophets also arose among the people, just as there will

also be false teachers among you, who will secretly introduce destructive heresies, even denying the Master who bought them, bringing swift destruction upon themselves" (2 Pet. 2:1).

It is worth noting that two apostles, when given the opportunity for a last message, spoke about future dangers facing the church. We must be alert to the ravenous wolves, to false teachers, and so-called prophets that twist the truth. "Not everyone who says, 'Lord, Lord'" is teaching truth or is known by the Lord (Matt. 7:21-23).



What Can You Expect from Me?

I imagine there are many questions you might have for a new family/youth evangelist. The chief question among our particular church family would be, "Do I call you Robert now, or can I keep calling you 'Bobbo'?" If you're still wondering, please call me whatever sounds right to you. But,

you probably have much more important questions. So, this is what you can expect from me at Palm Beach Lakes.

In 2 Timothy 4:2, Paul wrote to his son in the faith to reassure him of his mission as an evangelist. While his words were directed at Timothy, the purpose of the letter shows that his words apply to all ministers of the gospel of Christ. Though my focus is on the youth, my mission is the same as Timothy's.

First, I must preach the word. My basic work

is to be a proclaimer, and my subject is the whole counsel of God (Acts 20:26-27). While there are many books out there that offer solid advice for young people and their families, that is not where I should be focused. I must teach the wisdom of God and not of man (1 Cor. 2:2-5).

Second, I must be ready in season and out of season. There will be times where preaching is easy and times when preaching is difficult. There will be times when I might be discouraged. Regardless of the times, I have a duty to fulfill my ministry (2 Tim. 4:5).

Third, I must convince, rebuke and exhort with all longsuffering and teaching. God has given preachers a sacred charge to maintain sound doctrine. Knowing the Scripture is not enough. I must be able to prove the Biblical interpretation. This means I cannot present any private interpretation but the meaning that the text demands (2 Pet. 1:20-21). Furthermore, I must teach the Word of God with longsuffering. Discipleship

> takes time to develop. So, I must be patient as I stand for the truth, call out falsehood, and plead with our youth and their families to seek a closer and more faithful relationship with God.

> So, what can you expect from Robert (or, Bobbo) as a preacher? Expect that I will strive to keep the charge that has been laid before me. I love this church with all of my being. I thank God that He has

given me a deep love and ability to relate with younger people. I pray that I will meet all the expectations that He and the congregation have for me. My work is simple-do the work of an evangelist.

So, my question is, "What does God expect of you?" Our youth program cannot be successful if it is a one-man operation. If you are not already involved in our youth events or mentorship, have you met God's expectations? Who knows if your decision to serve might change the lives of our youth?

Though my focus is on the youth, my mission is the same as Timothy.

We must stay

alert.

Don't Cut the Scriptures Out of Your Heart!

In Jeremiah 36, a scroll was brought before King Jehoiakim, written by Jeremiah, to warn of God's upcoming wrath. The wickedness that had surfaced displeased Him, and now it was up to the king to do what was right. As the scroll was being read to him, King Jehoiakim took it, cut it into pieces with a knife, and threw it into the fire beside him

(Jer. 36:23). The king did not stop to listen to and obey the Lord.

Brothers and sisters, do we do this same thing within our hearts? We may not literally cut up God's Scripture and burn it, but are there certain things that are hard to hear, so we just push them out of sight and ignore them? We must not fall into the trap that Satan leaves before us and cut God out!

We will never know better than our God and should not deceive ourselves into thinking we can! We cannot obtain God's knowledge (Psa. 139:6) due to it being "infinite" (Psa. 147:5).

With this reality, let us put on the humble mindset that the Bible prompts us to. "I will hear what God the LORD will speak, for He will speak peace To His people and to His saints; But let them not turn back to folly. Surely His salvation is near to those who fear Him, that glory may dwell in our land" (Psa. 85:8-9). "How can a young man cleanse his way? By taking heed according to Your word. With my whole heart I have sought You; Oh, let me not wander from Your commandments" (Psa. 119:9-10).

Let us also heed the warnings to those who do not listen to and obey God. "Therefore, to him who knows to do good and does not do it, to him it is sin" (Jas. 4:17). "And that servant who knew his master's will, and did not prepare himself or do according to his will, shall be beaten with many stripes" (Luke 12:47).

> May we be "swift to hear" (Jas. 1:19) but also be "doers" of the Word (Jas. 1:22). James 1:23-25 tells us, "For if anyone is a hearer of the word and not a doer, he is like a man observing his natural face in a mirror; for he observes himself, goes away, and immediately forgets what kind of man he was. But he who looks into the perfect law of liberty and contin-

ues in it and is not a forgetful hearer but a doer of the work, this one will be blessed in what he does."

We see the emphasis the Bible repeatedly puts on hearing and obeying God. We have His Word at our fingertips; so easy to listen to and yet also so easy to cast away. May we not be like King Jehoiakim, who refused to listen or obey when it became difficult, but instead stop and put on a spirit of humility towards the God, who knows all things and can do all things!
