Rejoice in the Lord Always

Christianity was never designed to be a religion of sadness. The words "joy" and "rejoice" are found more than 400 times in the Bible. How could any relationship with God be anything other than the most marvelous experience one could have on this earth? When Paul described the fruit of the Spirit

working in our lives, the second word he used was "joy." Life with Him can never be a life of despair and gloom.

There is joy associated for those who teach others. There is great joy for those who teach. When Jesus told His disciples that the fields were ready to be reaped, He said that both those who sow and those who reap shall rejoice together (John 4:36). The psalmist said that those who sow shall without doubt come rejoicing (Psa. 126:5-6).

There is joy for those who are taught about Jesus. On the day of Pentecost, there were 3,000 who received the word with joy (Acts 2:41). When Philip preached in Samaria, "There was great joy in that city" (Acts 8:8). The Ethiopian "...went on his way rejoicing" (Acts 8:39). The man who found the treasure of the kingdom, "...for joy over it goes and sells all he had and buys the field" (Matt. 13:44). Think about your own experience. Has there ever been any day surpassing the day your sins were forgiven?

There is joy in the midst of trials as a Christian. When adversity comes into our lives, God tells us to "...count it all joy when you fall into various trials" (Jas. 1:3). How can this be? God gives the answer in the verses that follow. It is the trials in our lives which make us "...perfect and complete, lacking in nothing." Notice also that God said, "count it all joy"! We must not focus on the trials of adversity but on the results of them.

Jesus used some amazing words to describe our response when we are hated by others for His sake. "Rejoice in that day and leap for joy" (Luke 6:23). He does not see such times of adversity as a time to weep but as a time to rejoice. But, even more than just a time for joy—a time to leap for joy!

There is immeasurable joy awaiting us at the end of our lives. As Paul journeyed to Jerusalem for the final time, he passed through many cities. In

every one of them there were prophets who foretold the chains and tribulations which he would face when he arrived. Such did not deter his resolve, for he longed to "...finish my race with joy" (Acts 20:24). It was this same joy which Jesus spoke of when His disciples were rejoicing that they had the power to cast out demons. He said, "Do not rejoice in this ... but rather rejoice because your names are written in heaven" (Luke 10:20).

"Rejoice in the Lord always. Again, I say rejoice."

Your Past, Present and Future

In school you learned about the three main verb tenses in English: past, present and future. These tenses describe three very different timeframes. One could say that a boy "threw" the ball (past tense), or a boy "is throwing" the ball (present tense) or a boy "will throw" the ball (future tense).

Those same tenses can be used to describe a Christian's life. The New Testament talks definitively about a Christian's PAST life, with a great emphasis on leaving it in the past. Terminology is used to speak of one's "former conduct" (Gal. 1:13; Eph. 4:22), when one was conforming to "former lusts" (1 Pet. 1:14). The word "once" is used in consideration of when Christians "once walked according to the course of this world" (Eph. 2:2), "once conducted according to the luster of the flesh" (Fab. 2:2) "care ware for

ourselves in the lusts of the flesh" (Eph. 2:3), "once were far off" (Eph. 2:13), "were once disobedient to God" (Rom. 11:30), "were once darkness" (Eph. 5:8), "were also once foolish, disobedient, deceived" (Tit. 3:3). The desire of God is that "once" that "former" life of the past has been "crucified" with Christ, that we should "no longer" live that life (Rom. 6:6).

The New Testament talks definitively about a Christian's PRESENT life, with a great emphasis on living every day for Christ. Terminology is used to speak of "the life which I

now live in the flesh" (Gal. 2:20), "now in Christ Jesus" (Eph. 2:13), "now you are light in the Lord" (Eph. 5:8), "now also Christ will be magnified in my body" (Phil. 1:20). Present tense verbs permeate the New Testament to describe the Christian's present life—"speaking the truth in love...give no opportunity to the devil...let him labor, working with his hands...Let no corrupt word proceed out of your mouth...be kind to one another..." (Eph. 4:15, 27, 28, 29, 32). The

present tense "living sacrifice" of our present lives (Rom. 12) is detailed over and over in Scripture.

The New Testament talks definitively about a Christian's FUTURE life, with a great emphasis on focusing our attention and energies in that direction. Terminology is used to speak of God's promise that He "will give to eat from the tree of life" (Rev. 2:7), "will give you the crown of life" (Rev. 2:10), "will give

of the fountain of the water of life freely" (Rev. 21:6), for the "faithful" Christian "will appear with Him in glory" (Col. 3:4), "will receive the crown of life" (Jas. 1:12), "will be supplied [an entrance] into the everlasting kingdom" (2 Pet. 1:11). We can know for certain that these things "will" happen in the future.

How critical it is for one to "repent" of his PAST life (2 Pet. 3:9) and live "in holy conduct and godliness" in the PRE-SENT (3:11), in order to be ready for "the coming of the day of God" (3:12) in the FUTURE.

Danger Looms!

To put that into perspective, the moon is only 238,900 miles away from the earth and we aren't worried about it careening into our backyard anytime soon. But, an asteroid that is seventeen times farther away makes headlines.

Isn't it interesting, how much power the threat of death holds over us? The tiniest possibility of physical harm is enough to drive us into a panic. This asteroid was discovered

using NASA's asteroid tracking telescope, NEOWISE, which is used to warn of potentially dangerous asteroids. We have spent millions of dollars to prevent an astronomically small chance of danger.

Why then do we not have the same amount of urgency when it comes to our eternal soul? Danger certainly looms for us all. Hebrews 9:27 tells us, "And as it is appointed for men to die once, but after this the judgment..." This isn't

"clickbait." Death is not floating out in the ether, millions of miles away. Death is guaranteed, and when we die, we will have to answer for our sins. "For the wages of sin is death..." (Rom. 6:23).

We don't know when death will come for us nor when Jesus will return (2 Pet. 3:10). Yet, many live their lives like hell is millions of miles away. Death and judgment are coming, and the only path

Is your faith "precious"?

When you read through the letters of Peter, you will come across the word "precious" several times. Of all the things that he describes as "precious," the first one is our "faith" (1 Pet. 1:7). Have you ever thought about your faith being "precious"?

The Greek word "pertains to being of exceptional value; of great worth; costly." Have you ever considered the value and worth of your faith? The fact that "now you do not see Him, yet believing, you rejoice with joy inexpressible and full of glory" (1:8) is of exception value. However, Peter is not merely saying that your faith is of great worth. Note his words carefully: "...you have

been grieved by various trials, that the genuineness of your faith, being much more precious than gold that perishes, though it is tested by fire, may be found to praise, honor, and glory at the revelation of Jesus Christ" (1:6-7). It is the *genuineness* of your faith that is precious (of exceptional value) in the eyes of God, when it has been tested and found to be strong.

Is your faith "precious"? Has it been strengthened by trials? That adds true value! – DS

8 Warning Signs Your Child Is Headed for Trouble



As parents, it is an important duty to monitor our child and his or her activities. This allows us to decipher what path a kid is headed down. When you just focus on punishment and not the root of the issue, there is a good chance he or she could become a problem child. Here are some of the common signs of a child heading the wrong direction. It is important to recognize these and take the appropriate steps to guide your child back down a positive path.

- **1. Mood Swings.** Everyone experiences the occasional change in moods. Teenagers with exploding hormones, in particular, are prone to ups and downs. The key here is to determine if the lows and highs are too excessive, or if your child quickly shifts from euphoria to depression seemingly without cause. Be empathetic and a source of stability. Be calm. Adding to the drama will only make things worse. Finally, try to get your child to communicate what he is truly feeling in the moment.
- **2. Withdrawal.** Not every child is a social butterfly, but that doesn't mean there is a problem. However, if you see signs of withdrawal it could be cause for concern. Watch for signs of depression, lack of confidence, and if he feels rejected by other children.
- **3. Hiding Things.** When you find out they have been hiding something, even if it's trivial, it should tell you that they have entered into suspect behavior. At the very least they are creating habits of secrecy. It either says they are fine with bad behavior or they don't trust you. Each of those is dangerous.
- **4. Dropping Grades.** If a child is getting lower-than-normal grades, something is wrong somewhere. It could be a learning disability, laziness, need for more instruction, or any number of social or domestic issues. It could also be a sign of depression or discontentment. Get to the core of the matter instead of just punishing.
- **5. Sudden Change of Friends.** Making new friends is a good thing. A red flag is when they stop spending time with one friend group and start hanging out with a totally new group of people. It's important to find out what they are drawn to with the new group and what the breakdown was with their former friends. Relationships have a complexity and kids need their parents help in navigating them. Breakdowns in friendships hurt. Wounded hearts often gravitate to unhealthy coping mechanisms to numb or distract from the pain.
- **6. Fluctuating Weight.** Sudden weight loss and gain are normally associated with an unhealthy desire to control. Being a child can feel turbulent and unstable. As a way to deal with the stress, eating disorders or mass consumption can emerge. With these dysfunctional coping strategies, food can easily be replaced by drugs and alcohol or cutting as a way to control feelings of fear, anxiety, and insecurity.
- **7. Personality Changes.** Puberty is bound to bring some personality changes, but keep an eye on it. When a generally upbeat kid becomes more pessimistic or an outgoing kid becomes quieter, there is something driving the negative change. Perhaps they are doing things they know you wouldn't approve of or they are being bullied at school. Maybe they are desperate for approval they aren't getting. Ask them questions such as, "Do you feel like your world is changing a bit? How do you feel about that?" You may also try, "You know when I was your age I had a hard time. How are you coping with the changes going on around you?"
- **8.** Changing The Way They Dress. It's fine to experiment with new looks. After all, kids don't develop a full sense of identity until their mid-twenties. However, a sudden change in dress and image could be more than experimenting. It may be a deep sign of insecurity. Starting to wear more revealing clothing tends to be a step towards sexual activity, while baggy/over covering can be a sign they are hiding something. For example, when a kid always wears long sleeves, even when it is warm, they may be hiding scars from self-cutting. As it has been said before, get to the heart of the issues. Ask questions and be a safe place for your kids as they try to navigate life.


