The Kingdom Is Not Of—But In, Above and For

As daylight was breaking, the Jews brought Jesus to Pilate in their determination to kill Him. Pilate was not a Jew but a Roman who had been appointed governor over the land. The governor went out to those assembled and asked why they had brought Jesus to him. One of the charges was that Jesus

Himself had said that He was the Messiah and a king.

When Pilate learned this, he asked Jesus if He was the king of the Jews. In answering this question, Jesus clearly implied that His authority was so great that even Pilate was subject to God (John 19:11). His defense before Pilate reveals so much about the nature of the kingdom. "My kingdom is not of this world" (John 18:36). It is vital that we understand His kingdom and its relationship to the world.

His kingdom is NOT of this world. The concept of a kingdom in the mind of Herod, the Jews and many in Christendom is impacted because earthly kingdoms have a king who has great authority and sits on a throne. Yet, the words of Jesus indicate another kind of kingdom. Some even view that a time will come when He will sit on a throne in Jerusalem ruling the world. Hear the words of Jesus. I am a King. I have a kingdom. The kingdom that I have is not like the kingdoms of this world.

His kingdom is IN this world. There were eighty-four messengers who affirmed that the kingdom was to be established in the first century—John the Baptist (Matt. 3:2); Jesus (Matt. 4:17); the apostles (Matt. 10:7); and the Seventy (Luke 10:9). Those in sin were delivered from sin and brought into that kingdom (Col. 1:13). It was a reality. It was visible. However, it was spiritual in nature and not of this world. Jesus used these words to describe those in the kingdom. They are in the world, but not of the world (John 17:11-16)

So few in Christendom understand the

understand the true nature of His kingdom

His kingdom is ABOVE this world. The primary difference between these two concepts of kingdoms is that the kingdom of Jesus is above all kingdoms. It is repeatedly described as the kingdom of heaven. Jesus is that King of kings. He is above all kings. The kingdom is kingdom above all kingdoms.

His kingdom is FOR this world. Why is the kingdom in the world? It is because it is the salt of this earth and the light of this world (Matt. 5:13-14). It is not here simply to be a gathering of worshipers each week. It is like the church in Thessalonica whose impact was such that "...the word of the Lord has sounded forth, not only in Macedonia and Achaia, but also in every place" (1 Thess. 1:8). We are here for this world and to give it the hope of heaven.

Entrance into that kingdom involves a new birth, being born again as His Spirit leads us to a baptism in water (John 3:5). Let us know how we can help you!

Water and Salvation

Water is a vital element in God's creation. It is an essential component to life as we know it. Its unique properties make it excellent for cleaning. It is able to replenish itself through the water cycle and allows for biochemical processes in the body to take place. It should be no surprise then that wa-

ter also plays a vital role in salvation.

In 1 Peter 3:20-21, the apostle reveals that a connection between water and salvation exists in the New Testament and existed in the Old Testament. Peter says, "...when once the Divine longsuffering waited in the days of Noah...eight souls, were saved through water. There is also an antitype which now between baptism der in the desert for forty years. All those who resaves us-baptism..." Peter clearly shows us that water saved Noah from a sinful world, and now baptism saves us.

However, this is not the only time that God uses water as His mechanism for salvation. When Moses was called to lead the Hebrews out of Egypt, they too were saved by water. Of this event Paul wrote, "...all our fathers were under the cloud, all passed through the sea, all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea..." (1 Cor. 10:1-2). Again, the Bible $\,$ shows a direct connection between baptism and salvation.

But what happened when people rejected water be-

ing tied to salvation in the Bible? We can read of Naaman in 2 Kings 5 being plagued with leprosy. Elisha told him to immerse himself in the River Jordan, but he rejected the notion because it was too farfetched for him. However, his servants believed Elisha and convinced him that he was wrong, saying, "My father, if the prophet had told you to do something great, would you not have done it? How much more then, when he says to you, 'Wash, and be clean'?" (2 Kgs. 5:13). So, he bathed in the river, and he was cured.

The Bible shows a direct connection and salvation.

Then, in Numbers 14, we read of Israel refusing to cross the Jordan into the Promised Land. Because they feared the giants on the other side, they rebelled against Moses and were cursed to wanfused to cross through the water died without receiving God's land promise. But their children found sal-

vation when they obeyed the word of the Lord and crossed the Jordan (Josh. 4:21-24). Because they did not fear what lay beyond the river, they took the Promised Land and established the nation of Israel.

The Bible's theme of tying water to salvation remains true today. Baptism is what God chose to save us from this sinful world. It doesn't matter if it makes no sense to us. It is true. We have been shown a pattern to follow, and if we doubt or fear the life beyond the water, we will miss our chance at salvation.

The King of who?

When "the wise men from the East came to Jerusalem," they asked for the location of the "King of the Jews" (Matt. 2:2). When Pilate had Jesus crucified, he "put up over His head the accusation written against Him: THIS IS JESUS THE KING OF THE JEWS" (Matt. 27:37). Was Jesus "the King of the Jews"? Well, yes. But so much more!

In the grand scheme, Jesus is "the King of kings" (1 Tim. 6:15). In His sovereignty, Jesus is "King of the nations" (Rev. 15:3). The word "king" not only means, "one who rules as possessor of the highest office" (in a political sense), but even better in this context, it means, "one who possesses unusual or transcendent power" (in a practical sense).

So, here's the question—Is Jesus "King of you and your life"? While He is the "great King over all the earth" (Psa. 47:2), He must possess "transcendent power" in your heart and daily life. Can you truly sing, "King of my life, I crown Thee now"? -DS

God always wants you back!

The Lord sent the sheepbreeder Amos to warn the northern kingdom of Israel of their impending captivity. Israel had long been in rebellion against their Lord, and the consequences were nigh. Still, in a "lamentation" against them, Jehovah pleads with them to return. It's not too late, if they will come back.

> Three times in chapter 5, the Lord pleads through Amos with these parallel calls, "Seek Me and live...Seek the Lord and live...Seek good and not evil, that you may live" (5:4, 6, 14). Note that they were the ones directing their way toward destruction. All they had to do was

choose to turn their eyes to the Lord and seek His will. That's not hard! But it is for folks who refuse to seek!

To "seek the Lord" entails to "seek good and not evil" (5:14). The next verse goes on to say, "Hate evil, love good" (5:15). Take the intensity with which you are rebelling against God's will and throw it into following God's will. Why? So that you may "live." Wherever you are right now, make up your mind to always "seek the Lord and live!" - DS



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The Close Vote on *Baptizo* in 1643

During the Westminster Assembly, which was assigned by English Parliament to produce a Confession of Faith in 1642 and 1643, a very significant vote was called for to determine what mode of baptism would be required. There were fifty people present, fifty-one, counting the moderator. Twenty-five voted for sprinkling; twenty-five voted for immersion. The moderator, who voted only in the case of a tie, voted for sprinkling.

That vote set an important precedent on the mode of baptism was set for the Anglicans, Presbyterians, and Independents. Millions and millions of the religious posterity who descend from these groups have been affected. The situation surrounding this historic and far-reaching event is nothing short of remarkable.

First of all, it is remarkable that a group of men thought they could depart from the apostolic practice of immersion by a human vote. It was the desire of many people in the cold climate of England to prefer sprinkling to immersion because it was considered easier and more polite. This pressure felt by those in charge of making the change, and perhaps other reasons, such as too much concern for Roman Catholic doctrine, caused them to vote for the practice of sprinkling.

A second remarkable thing about the 1643 vote was that the decision was made by only one vote. There was long debating on the proper mode. The question came to be whether the mode would be sprinkling or immersion. This one deciding vote determined that millions would be sprinkled rather than immersed.

A third remarkable thing about the 1643 vote was that a political body controlled it. The Westminster Assembly was convoked and authorized by the English Parliament. The moderator was selected by the Parliament. When the moderator died, Parliament would not allow the Assembly to elect another moderator; Parliament appointed another moderator itself. Men, called Lords, were appointed to watch over the Assembly to make sure that it did not transgress its commission.
