When Our Heroes Fail

Satan uses so many "tools" as he seeks to discourage our devotion to Christ. Faith can far more easily thwart the attacks the god of this world makes against us if we would heed the words of Paul. The great apostle said, "We are not ignorant of his devices," but if we are ignorant Satan takes

advantage of us (2 Cor. 2:11). The English Standard Version translates the words, "We would not be outwitted by Satan; for we are not ignorant of his designs." Our fa

As we walk with the Lord, we can make a mistake by placing other Christians on a high pedestal, and they become a visible hero of faith. Perhaps you have done this, for so many look at others and they become a model of what we want to be some day. However, what do you do when that person changes,

or you get to know him better and he/she no longer stands on that pedestal of admiration where you placed them?

This problem confronted early Christians. In Paul's letters to Timothy, he mentioned men who were respected who lost their faith. In his first letter to the young preacher, Paul speaks of Hymenaeus and Alexander who had rejected the faith and suffered shipwreck. Paul had dealt with them. While we use the term "withdrawing fellowship" Paul used a stronger phrase to describe this action. He says he had "delivered them to Satan," hoping that doing this would help them to see they had blasphemed God by their actions (1 Tim. 1:20—see these same words used in Paul's instruction about withdrawing from an unfaithful Christian in 1 Corinthians 5:4-5).

We do not know the details of these men's actions, but in the second letter to Timothy, Paul mentions Hymenaeus again. This evil man who had been given to Satan in the first letter evidently was still impacting the church. He was teaching a

> false doctrine which was spreading like cancer, and there were those who followed him (2 Tim. 2:17-18). He had overturned the faith of those followers.

> Paul then reminded Timothy of the fact that personal "heroes of faith" can harm the faith of those in the church—one thing has not changed. It is so important that we look at this unchangeable truth when leading brethren leave the faith. Consider what

he says and never tie your faith to people you admire. Failure to understand this gives Satan an advantage over you.

What is that unchangeable truth? Paul says, "Nevertheless the foundation of God stands" (2 Tim. 2:20). Men we foolishly place on high pedestals may disappoint us, but nothing really has changed! Paul closes by mentioning two great foundational truths. God knows those who are His, and we must not follow others into their sin. Put your faith in God and tie your faith to Him. There is only One real hero!



Five Reasons to Love and Study the Book of Acts (Part 5)

We learn about

the nature and

imparting of

miraculous gifts.

Reasons abound for knowing and loving the book of Acts. The list could go on and on. We have seen that from the book of Acts we can learn about (1) how to become a Christian, (2) the power of the gospel (3) the establishment of the church, and (4) the importance and urgency of evangelism. Let's

por

add only one more. We need to study this book to learn about the nature and imparting of miraculous gifts.

As God on this earth (John 1:1, 14), Jesus performed "miracles, wonders and signs" that only God could do (Acts 2:22; John 3:2). When He left this earth, "He poured out" on the apostles the measure of the Spirit by which they could do miracles themselves (and more, as we will see) (2:1-4, 33). There is much that we can learn from the book of Acts about the nature of these miracles and how they were imparted.

Miracles were not just really good tricks. In Acts 8, Simon the Sorcerer was doing magic tricks, which "astonished the people" (8:9-11). But when the multitudes in Samaria saw "the miracles which [Philip] did," they "heeded the things spoken by Philip" (8:6). Even Simon recognized the difference between his tricks and "the miracles and signs" of Philip (8:13).

Miracles were not done to draw attention to the miracleworker but to draw attention to the God of the miracle, and more specifically, to the Word being spoken that was given by the God of the miracle. In Acts 2, "the multitude came together" and "were all amazed" when they witnessed the miracle of the apostles speaking in their own language (2:5-8). The purpose was to get them to pay attention to the words spoken by the apostles about Christ (2:14-36). In Acts 8, the Samaritans "heeded the things spoken" when they saw "the miracles" (8:6). That was the purpose of the miracles. When Peter

raised Dorcas from the dead, "many believed" the Word preached (10:42). That was the purpose.

The measure of the Spirit for miraculous, spiritual gifts was imparted to Christians through the apostles' hands. The apostles "laid hands" on the seven men in Acts 6:6. Why? Then they laid hands on the Christians in Samaria in Acts 8:17. Why? Paul "laid hands on" twelve Christians in Ephesus in Acts

19:6. Why? "Through the laying on of the apostles' hands the Holy Spirit was given" (8:18), to have "power" to do miracles.

What do we learn? Only certain people could do miracles. Miracles were obvious signs of the power of God. Miracles were designed to confirm the Word being preached (cf. Mark 16:20). Only the apostles could impart to Christians the ability to do miracles. Thus, from Acts, we learn that miracles were limited for a time with a specific purpose and are no longer available or needed today (1 Cor. 13:8-13; Eph. 4:8-14).

Our faith can be weakened when it is tied to our personal heroes of faith



God is Omniscient

When Covid-19 struck our nation, we became willing to take whatever precautions we had to prevent contracting and spreading the virus to our friends and families. Immediately, people began buying sanitary masks in bulk. Soon, the CDC told us to stop buying them. The masks cannot prevent you from

getting the virus. They said, "Trust the science!"

A few weeks later, the CDC changed their stance. Now, we need to wear masks everywhere we go. "Trust the science!" they said. The next year, the vaccines rolled out. They told us if we didn't get the vaccine, we were putting people's lives in danger. Again, they said, "Trust the science!" Now, it is unclear how effective, if at all, the vaccine really is.

The truth is you can't always trust the science. Science is always changing because what is known changes so long as new evidence is discovered. We are finite beings, so no matter how much we learn, we cannot know everything.

If we knew it all, then we would be omniscient. Omniscience is the absolute knowledge of all things. The only being capable of omniscience is God. The Bible scholar famous for his *Exhaustive Concordance*, James Strong, defined omniscience in this way, "By this we mean God's perfect and eternal knowledge of all things which are objects of knowledge, whether they be actual or possible, past, present, or future."

God truly knows everything. Nothing can hide from Him (Heb 4:13). His understanding cannot be measured (Psa. 147:5). He sees everything (Prov. 15:3). He knows the number of hairs on our heads (Matt. 10:30). He even knows what is in our hearts (Psa. 139:4). God's knowledge does not change. He has a full grasp of everything into eternity. Therefore, truth resides in God.

Truth is real. Truth is that which actually is. For the last hundred years, the world has pushed the theory that truth is relative. So, what is true for you may not be true for me. However, the Bible teaches us that truth is real and objective. God is truth! Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life..." (John 14:6). God not only knows all that is, He is why it is.

"The science" changes. Man's best efforts to understand the world around him will always come up short. There will always be a better theory or a new conclusion as we gather more data. But, God already has all the variables. He has always known every conclusion. So, when we look to determine how we ought to live, why do we go to the world for answers? The world is still trying to figure it out. God, on the other hand, has known and decided in eternity. "The science" cannot be trusted, but God always can.

What is both tender and firm?

Is it possible that something could be enhanced and superior because it was both tender and firm? In 1833, Robert Grant penned the hymn, "O Worship the King." The last verse begins, "Frail children of dust, and feeble as frail, In Thee do we trust, nor find Thee to fail; Thy mercies, how tender! how firm to the end!" The "mercies" (plural) of God are both "tender" and "firm"!

Repeatedly the psalmists praise the "tender mercies" of our God (Psa. 25:6; 40:11; 51:1; 69:16; 78:8; 119:77, 156). Where would we be without His "tender mercies"? But His mercies are also "firm"! Every verse of Psalm 136 resounds, "His mercy endures forever." Yes, "His compassions fail not" (Lam. 3:22) and have not yet "ceased forever" (Psa. 77:8). Thank God for His tender and firm mercies! – DS

7 Verses That Will Revolutionize Your Marriage



1. Titus 2:4 – A Wife Is Commanded to Love Her Husband!

- a. Observe that Greek word.
- b. She is to be his friend.

2. Ephesians 5:25 – A Husband Is Commanded to Love His Wife!

- a. This Greek word is Agape, the same word found in the "love chapter," 1 Corinthians 13.
- b. Let's go to this chapter and apply the characteristics of this kind of love to our marriages.

3. 1 Corinthians 13:4 – Love Is Patient and Kind; Doesn't Envy, and Isn't Boastful!

- a. Patient: This is the opposite of a short fuse. Am I patient with my wife (1 Pet. 3:7)?
- b. Are you kind to your husband? Polite? Considerate?
- c. Sometimes spouses become envious of the life/role of their husband or wife. The Bible teaches roles which are the very best for good marriage. We must trust Him.
- d. Am I boastful in my personality—inflated with my own importance? There's a world of difference in saying, "I'm doing you a favor to love you...," and "I'm so grateful to be loved by you."

4. 1 Corinthians 13:5 – Love Isn't Rude, Proud, Short Tempered, or Evil in Thoughts!

- a. Sometimes we can be too blunt in the way we say things to our spouses. How you say something can completely color how it is heard.
- b. Am I easily provoked? Do I have a short fuse with my husband?
- c. Make a mental list of the kinds of things that make me see red. Do these all justify the angry things I say when they occur?
- d. "Thinks no evil..." is an accounting term meaning, "Entering an item on a ledger."
 - 1) Are you a collector of grievances in your marriage?
 - 2) If so, I know something about your spouse: He/She is miserable.

5. 1 Corinthians 13:6 – Love Isn't Happy with Sin, But Is Happy with Truth!

- a. Husbands: Protect your wife and children from evil.
- b. Make sure your home is a place where evil is always called evil:
 - 1) Do we watch movies which portray immorality in an approved context?
 - 2) Do we use bad language when angry or surprised?
 - 3) Do we put things ahead of worshiping God?
 - 4) Do we lie when it's more convenient than telling the truth?

6. 1 Corinthians 13:7 – Love Bears, Believes, Hopes and Endures!

- a. Bears all things Any injury, insult, disappointment.
- b. Believes all things Trust, believe in what they can be, and build them up.
- c. Hopes all things Sacrifice for your marriage and never give up. Hope for a better day.
- d. Endures all things Some days will be challenging. Keep going.

7. 1 Corinthians 13:8 – Love Never Fails!

a. If you and your spouse will become and remain faithful Christians, this statement will be true about you.
