A Test of Your Spiritual Health



Most of us are aware that there is an inspection by the health department of restaurants on a regular basis. Failure to pass that inspection can ultimately lead to its closure. We may not be as aware of another inspection that involves our spiritual wellbeing. It is far more important.

David said it this way in the twenty-sixth psalm:

"Vindicate me, O Lord, for I have walked in my integrity. I have also trusted in the Lord; I shall not slip. Examine me, O Lord, and prove me; try my mind and my heart." The prayer closes with the psalmist calling on God for mercy. The focus of the prayer is the selfexamination David made of himself and the kind of life a man who walks with integrity lives. His personal examination is not boasting of his righteousness, but the results of a righteous man honestly looking at his daily life.

The test of walking in truth. David knew of God's lovingkindness and experienced it in that tragic part of life with the wife of Uriah. We do not know if this psalm was written before or after that event, but the elevation of a shepherd boy to the throne is evidence of God's goodness. As David thought of God's mercy and kindness, he looked inward and affirmed, "I have walked in Your truth" (v. 3). The true measure of a man is not whether he has ever done wrong, but what he does after he realizes his sin. David repented and turned from sin for he was honest with himself and walked with integrity.

The test of companionship. "I have not sat with idolatrous mortals, nor will I go in with hypocrites" (v. 4). He hated the assembly of evildoers and refused to sit with the wicked (v. 5). It is folly to think we can spend all our time with those who have little or no regard for God and righteous living. David was a man after God's own heart because his best friend, Jonathan,

> was so righteous. David rejected Jonathan's father, King Saul, and refused to stand with, sit with or walk with ungodly men (Psa. 1:1).

> **The test of worship.** "I will go about your altar...I love...the place where your glory dwells" (vs. 6, 8). He knew that God was in that assembly and loved being there. The world was filled with evil men (vs. 9-10), but David wanted to worship with godly

men. The psalm closes with David blessing the Lord in His assembly.

David looked inward, examined himself and asked God to also examine him and vindicate that he had seen himself as God did. We would be wise to see how our "test scores" compare with David's "score." Even more sobering is how it compares with God's evaluation of our lives. God tells all of us to "...examine yourself as to whether you are in the faith" (2 Cor. 13:5). Walk with integrity and let God score your life!



They All with One Accord

Have you ever been in a worship service and all of a sudden you're thinking about a Honda Accord? Perhaps you've experienced this brain tease, when a verse is read from the book of Acts about the Christians being gathered together in "one accord." One accord? What does that mean?

The expression "one accord" is used 11 times in the book of Acts. It comes from a compound Greek word that combines the words for "same" and "mind," to literally mean "the same mind." The word is used to emphasize the "unanimity" of the early church. They were not all sitting together in one Honda Accord, but they were so unanimous in their devotion to the Lord that maybe they could have figured out a way to fit. Let's consider the usage of this word in the book of Acts.

First, note that the early Christians were not the only ones who acted in unanimity. The enemies of Christ themselves acted "with one accord." Those who heard Stephen preach "cried out with a loud voice, stopped their ears, and ran at him with one accord... and stoned him" (Acts 7:57-58). The same occurred when the Jews in Corinth "with one accord rose up against Paul" (18:12), and when the Ephesian mob "rushed into the theater with one accord, having seized Gaius and Aristarchus, Macedonians, Paul's travel companions" (19:29). In each of these instances, the people were of "the same mind" and "same purpose" and "unanimous" in their actions.

When the enemies of Christ ally together in attacks against Christians, guess what Christians need to do? They also need (and will) ally together, with the same mind, to stand against such attacks, defend the gospel and further the cause of Christ together. Take note of some other times in Acts when Luke employed this expression.

The early Christians "with one accord" came together "in prayer and supplication" (1:14) and "raised their voice to God" (4:24). How often today do we come together "with one accord" for the purpose of praying to God?

The early Christians "with one accord" came together to enjoy fellowship and food with one another (2:46). How often today do we take the initiative to get a group of Christians together "with one accord" just to be with each other and enjoy each other's company?

The early Christians "with one accord" came together in one place to "speak" God's Word (5:12; cf. 8:6) and to send chosen men out with a message to the churches (15:25).

God still wants His church to assemble and behave with "one accord." So, are you "in" the accord or not?

Who Is Good?

Are you a good person? Many people would quickly answer, "Of course! I do lots of good." But, by what standard could someone say if they are?

For Christians, the standard is God. Jesus proclaimed in Luke 18:19, "No one is good but One, that is, God." If God is the

standard, then I don't even come close.

Since we have God as a standard of good and evil, Christians have a unique ability to judge what is right and what is wrong. We can look at God's word, understand His moral law, and apply it to the world. But, what if someone does not believe in God? Can they have a standard for good and evil? The answer is no.

Atheists believe in a reality that is totally reliant on evolution for the explanation of human existence. The only standard that matters to the atheist, then, is the law of the survival of the fittest. So, the only ethic in evolution is that what is good is what leads to the advancement of the human population.

The atheist worldview makes morality imaginary. Without God, there is no standard for morals. If the survival of the fittest is the rule, then anything I do to get there, no matter how heinous, is permissible. It is simply an unimportant matter acting upon another unimportant matter. Joel Marks, Professor Emeritus of Philosophy at the University of New Haven in West Haven, Connecticut, admitted this reality saying, "The religious fundamentalists are correct: without God, there is no morality. But they are incorrect, I still believe, about there being a God. Hence, I believe, there is no morality."

This worldview has dire consequences. A famous evolutionist concluded, "Truly, this earth is a trophy cup for the industrious man. And this rightly so, in the service of natural selection. He who does not possess the force The atheist to secure his [living space] in this world, and, if necesworldview sary, to enlarge it, does not deserve to possess the necessities of life. He must step aside and allow makes morality stronger peoples to pass him by." You may have imaginary. guessed that the man who said this was none other than Adolf Hitler. By this rationale he convinced a nation to be complicit in the murder of millions.

Thanks be to God that the atheists are wrong! We all know that Hitler's actions were evil. If evil can be judged, then God is real. Because God is real, we can know what is right and wrong, and He showed us in His word. We are not insignificant matter. We are bearers of the image of God (Gen. 1:27). Every image-bearer is my neighbor, and I cannot do evil against him (Gen. 9:6; Lev. 19:18). Do you want to be a good person? Then put faith in the only One who is good. Believe in God.

Are you deserving?

Jesus entered the city of Capernaum in Luke 7, and he was greeted by some "elders of the Jews," who had been sent by a centurion to plead with Jesus to "come and heal his servant" (7:1-3). As they "begged" Jesus on behalf of this centurion, the elders exclaimed how "deserving" this man was (7:4). So Jesus made His way to the centurion's house, but before He arrived, the centurion sent his friends to Jesus

to say, "I am not worthy" (7:6-7).

So, which was it? Was this man deserving of Jesus' attention or not? Was this man worthy of Jesus to come to him or not? Well, it depends on who you ask. If you ask the man, he

said that he was not deserving or worthy. But others claimed that he was.

This is reminiscent of Proverbs 27:2, "Let another man praise you, and not your own mouth." Who are we to suggest that we are deserving/worthy of kindnesses from anyone else, let alone Jesus! If we are such, let others make such a claim about us and not we ourselves! - DS

What do people see in your face?

Following years of separation after his brother stole his birthright, Esau made his way to meet Jacob in Genesis 32. Jacob "was greatly afraid and distressed," thinking that Esau may be coming to "attack" him (32:7-8). He made strategic preparations for the saving of his family, and he sent a "present" ahead of him to Esau, hoping to "appease him" (32:20). Note

what Jacob said next: "afterward I will see his face; perhaps he will accept me" (32:20).

What an interesting thing to say. Jacob would know of Esau's reaction and even intentions when he saw his "face." In the next chapter, the two brothers meet, and note what Jacob says to

his brother: "I have seen your face as though I had seen the face of God, and you were pleased with me" (33:10).

Question: When others see us, do they see our face as though they are seeing the face of God? Do our eyes, our mouth, our expression convey that we belong to God? Do others see Him in us, just by looking? - DS


