Five Short Books—Why?

There are five of the sixty-six books in the Bible which contain just one chapter. Some books have over 30,000 words in them, but all five of these books contain a total of less than 3,000 words! As you read these shorter books, think about why they are included in the Bible. Do not overlook

such great truths that our Father gave in them to us. The Bible completely furnishes us (2 Tim. 3:16-17), and if these books were not included, we could not be supplied Five books in the with all we need. Let's take time to look at the book of Second John which has only 13 verses.

As you begin reading the book, you do not have to know for certain if the elect lady is a reference to one particular person or is the bride of Jesus to see the emphasis in the beginning verses. The

word "truth" is found five times in the first four verses. As you read, realize that these verses show that there is truth and that it can be known. That knowledge of the truth is then manifested in our lives after we know it. We walk in that truth. At the time of the writing of this book, there were spiritual gifts like knowledge and prophecy within the church. Even after the gifts ceased, truth would abide, and it would be with them forever. Truth at first was in inspired men but continues in an inspired book. Since the church began, children of God have known the truth, and they walk in it.

John then turns his attention to the importance of understanding love. Grace, mercy and peace are tied to truth and love (v. 2). That love was known from the beginning of their relationship with the Lord and His commandment. It has two primary applications. We must love each other (v. 5) and then love the truth. We cannot understand what love is unless we are walking according to His commandments.

> There is then a warning about the fact that many, not just a few, deceivers are in the world who will attempt to lead men away from His commandments. There is the strong admonition to watch for and be on the lookout for these teachers, lest we lose our salvation (v. 8). "Whoever" can be the teachers or those who follow them, who lose their relationship with both the Father and the Son (v. 9). We cannot be part of encouraging such teachers (vs. 10-11).

This short letter ends showing just how much John, the apostle of love, truly loves the elect. He longed to see them, and there was an expectation that soon he would be with them to spend time talking personally with them. The result of such time with them was joy in the heart of John and in those he expected to see. John sends his greetings to them and includes the greeting from those who were with him.

Take time to read this shortest book in the Bible to see the way we are all changed with Christ in our lives.

"So, what do you want to be when you grow up?" That is the question that adults will always ask children. The usual answers include: doctor, nurse, teacher, firefighter, etc. In recent years, the answers have started to include: YouTuber, Vlogger, Social Media Influencer. There are lots of

options out there today, and parents will often try to steer their children in (or out of) a certain direction.

Young man, you may think that becoming a professional athlete would be the best thing in the world. You may think that joining a band and touring the world would be your dream job. There are some jobs out there that are not very realistic for most guys. There are other jobs that are very realistic but may not be as appealing or as fulfilling as others. For

some reason, one job that never seems to make the Top 5 List of dream jobs for young men (or even the Top 10 List) is to be a preacher of the gospel. Why is that?

I wish I knew the reason(s) that more boys did not want to become a preacher, so that I could address those directly, but I suspect that I can guess many of them. Most of the reasons probably start at home. For many families, "church" is something that we do on most Sundays, but it's not really the number one priority or central focus of the home. Children are very perceptive and readily recognize when an activity is merely being checked off a to-do list rather than being the absolute highlight of the week. As a result, "church" does not become much of an importance to the children in the home, and many of them will grow up not even wanting to go to church when they're older (let alone to be a preacher).

For some families, the sermon part of the worship service is something to be tolerated. What do children see their parents (or, for that matter, other Christian adults) doing during the sermon? When parents/ adults are not fully engaged and interested in the boys not want to sermon but are doing other things (like playing games, surfing the web, scrolling social media, making to-do lists, reading a book, etc.) while the preacher is up "doing his thing," it sends a visually clear message to children that the sermon is something to

be endured rather than enjoyed. What boy would grow up wanting to preach (or even to love the Bible and studying it)?

No doubt, the influence of the home is not the only reason that boys do not grow up wanting to be preachers. Congregations and preachers themselves have probably not done a good job in sparking that interest and generating true excitement for preaching. Whatever the reasons, I want to appeal to you, young man, to be a preacher. It is the best job and best life you will ever have! (More next week)

God Will Avenge...Not You!

You've seen it a thousand times in the movies. The villain looks up to the sky after suffering a monumental blow to his ego and shouts, "I'll have my revenge!" In an instant, we understand the motivations of the antagonist and are convinced to root against him for the rest of the film.

On one hand, this cliché is so overplayed that you will hardly see it in a cartoon anymore. On the other hand, it became so common because the temptation for revenge is as understandable as it is unjustifiable.

When we are wronged, we want that evil to be answered. That is called justice. But, when we take justice into our own hands, it is called revenge.

The Bible tells us, "Beloved, do not avenge yourselves, but rather give place to wrath; for it is written, 'Vengeance is Mine, I will repay,' says the Lord" (Rom. our or 12:19). So, what do we do with the desire for justice?

The desire for justice is not a bad thing. Justice is a reflection of God's nature. "He is the Rock, His work is perfect; for all His ways are justice, a God of truth and without injustice; righteous and upright is He" (Deut. 32:4). When evil is done in the world, God promises that it will be answered with justice. "For the Lord loves justice, and does not forsake His saints; they are preserved forever, but the descendants of the

wicked shall be cut off" (Psa. 37:28). We are even commanded to desire justice. Isaiah 1:17 tells us, "Learn to do good; seek justice, rebuke the oppressor; defend the fatherless, plead for the widow." So, how is justice carried out if we cannot take revenge?

God created institutions to enact His justice in this life. In the church, He gave us the eldership (cf. 1 Pet. 5:1-3; Heb. 13:17). By their counsel and judgment, brethren are held

accountable. In the world, He gave us government. "For rulers are not a terror to good works, but to evil...But if you do evil, be afraid; for he does not bear the sword in vain; for he is God's minister, an avenger to execute wrath on him who practices evil" (Rom. 13:3-4).

When you are hurt, it is right for you to want justice. But, we must seek the Lord's justice and not our own. First, we need to be merciful. "For judgment is without mercy to the one who has shown no mercy. Mercy triumphs over judgment" (Jas. 2:13). We must always extend forgiveness when asked. Second, we must be advocates for those being wronged. We must bear witness against injustices. When the laws of God are broken, we bring the guilty before the church. When the laws of man are broken, we bring the guilty before the court, and any injustice left unserved God assures us will be carried out in eternity (cf. 2 Cor. 5:10).

Words from the Lord as you evangelize

In a recent Bible class, it was noted that first-century Corinth was not only the capital city of Achaia, but it was also "The Capital of Immorality." Can you imagine how difficult it must have been to teach people about Jesus in the midst of religious perversion, rampant sexual immorality and sinful vices in abundance? Oh, wait! You live in 21st-century American culture! Maybe you can imagine such!

Perhaps that is why "the Lord spoke to Paul" while he was preaching in "The Capital of Immorality" with these reassuring words: "Do not be afraid, but speak, and do not keep silent; for I am with you..." (Acts 18:9-10). Paul likely faced much discouragement in such an environment (like you do today), so he needed those words.

God tells you to do the same three things: (1) "Do not be afraid." (2) "Speak." (3) "Do not keep silent." Then He provides this comforting guarantee and motivation: "I am with you." (See the same promise in Matthew 28:19-20). Jesus is standing with you when you speak for Him! Don't ever doubt it! – DS

Your God surrounds the troubles that surround you!

The God that you read about in the Bible DOES NOT CHANGE (Mal. 3:6; Heb. 13:8)! He is the SAME God today as He was in Old Testament days and New Testament days. When the king of Syria sent his "great army" and "surrounded" God's people (2 Kgs. 6:14), God was not off on vacation somewhere, nor was

God too small to handle the surrounding. Instead, God had the enemy surrounding His people surrounded themselves (6:17)!

Your God is big enough, strong enough, wise enough, present enough, caring enough and willing enough to handle every enemy and every

trouble that you face! He "encamps all around those who fear Him, and delivers them" (Psa. 34:7). Elisha's servant could not see God's army surrounding Syria's army, but that did NOT mean that they were not there and ready to act.

Sometimes we question, "Where is God?" Like Job, He is around us "on every side" (Job 1:10). Like trusting Israel, He will "deliver" us from our "enemies on every side" (1 Sam. 12:11). Do you trust Him? -DS


