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Let's Go Back to the Bible

## **Unrealized Timelessness Truth**

read the Bible,

realize timeless

truth is spoken

to YOU!

**Agape love** 

is to color

every action of

a Christian.

As we read the Bible, we sometimes are so focused on how a passage applies to our lives that we so easily lose sight of what was happening when a book was written. Truth is always truth! It cannot contradict itself and is timeless. The laws of God have changed in various dispensations, but the

fundamental aspect of truth does not change. Our failure to spoken understand this is the basis of the title for this article—unrealized timeless truth.

Psalm 138 is a good illustration of this. It is described as a "Psalm of David" and the opening verses reflect the heart of the great king. David praises God with his whole heart; he sings praises to God; he worships God toward His temple; he praised God for His lovingkindness and truth, and he magnified what God had said.

In verse four, he turned his attention and states that all the kings of the earth would magnify God. This was not true of the kings in David's day, but he looked to future happenings. The unrealized truth is found by carefully reading all of the verse. All the kings of the earth would hear the words of God's mouth. Pay special attention to the fact that "words" is plural. The voice of God had spoken directly to man at Mt. Sinai, and it *still* would speak to kings. How is this? Was He about to

speak from heaven to those kings? Obviously not. They were to hear the same messages His mouth spoke because the very words God used are eternal! Truth is eternal and this emphasizes that when we read the Bible, we too are hearing the words from the mouth of God.

Another illustration of this principle is found in the words spoken at the burning bush. To whom were these words spoken? The obvious answer is Moses (Luke 20:37), but they

were also spoken to others. Hear the words of Jesus describing this event (I will capitalize one word to emphasize truth). "Have you not read what was spoken to YOU by God, saying, 'I am the God of Abraham...'" (Matt. 22:31). God's exact words spoken at the bush were spoken to the Jews of Jesus' day! By implication they are spoken to us! This is an unrealized, timeless truth.

Finally, realize what will happen at the final judgment. All mankind will be judged by the precise words written in the books of the Bible. "And I saw the dead, small and great, standing before God, and the books were opened...and the dead were judged according to their works, by the things where were written in the books" (Rev. 20:12-13). Truth is truth. Truth is eternal. The words of truth are spoken to all mankind of every age. Remember this as you read the Bible. Read it carefully for truth is spoken to YOU!

## **Greet One Another**

There may be certain parts of Scripture that we think only applied to first-century Christians and we just skip over them. But, perhaps we should take a closer look. Consider for a moment the numerous times that Christians were directed to "Greet one another." That still applies today.

First, think about the word, "Greet." The Greek word

literally means, "to draw to oneself." It is defined as, "to engage in hospitable recognition of another through word or gesture, welcome, express good wishes, treat with affection." This generally involved embracing or kissing, and the term is used repeatedly in the epistles as an imperative verb, indicating a command of God that is not optional. Do you greet?

Second, think about the object of the action, "Greet one another." The reflexive, reciprocal pronoun "one another" involves all brethren doing this to all other brethren (Rom. 16:16; 2 Cor. 13:12). Just as we are to love one another, encourage one another and serve one another (mutual responsibilities of every Christian for every other Christian), we are to greet one another. Paul says, "Greet all the brethren" (1 Thess. 5:26), and John says, "Greet the friends by name" (3 John 14). Do you greet your brethren regularly?

Third, think about the method, "Greet one another

with a holy kiss." The Lord was not demanding a kiss in all generations and all cultures, but He was taking a common practice of that day and regulating it among the Christians. First-century greetings often included the kiss of friendship, not a passionate kiss. In modern culture, it usually is a hand-shake or a friendly hug—some kind of gesture that (remember the literal definition) would draw another to oneself in a welcoming, friendly way.

Fourth, think about the regulation of the greeting, "Greet one another with a HOLY kiss." The emphasis in the text is on the word "holy." The Lord took the common greeting of the day and ensured that it was done out of Christian affection. It is to be "holy," meaning "set apart, sincere, unhypocritical." You need to mean it when you greet your brethren and you need to keep it Christ-like. Peter said,

"Greet one another with a kiss of love" (1 Pet. 5:14). Agape love is to color every action of a Christian.

Fifth, consider that our holy greetings are to be extended beyond our brethren. Jesus said, "If you greet your brethren only, what do you do more than others?" (Matt. 5:47). When you are at a church service, spend time greeting your brethren warmly, but make it a priority to seek out guests and give them a genuine, friendly Christian welcome. Our guests should feel like they are wanted in our family.

## Who Is a Christian?

How do you identify a Christian? In the Bible, the first time the term "Christian" is used is found in Acts 11:26. Here, we see that it is the disciples of Jesus who were given this title. A disciple is a student or follower of another. So, a Christian is someone who follows the teachings of Christ.

Today, there are many people who claim to be followers of Jesus but teach many different things. Are they all Christians? Before Jesus went to the cross, He prayed this about those who would believe in Him, "...that they all may be one as You, Father, are in Me, and I in You; that they also may be one in Us, that the world may believe that You sent Me" (John 17:21). Here, we learn two things. The disciples of Jesus must be united, and that unity must be in Christ Jesus.

What does it mean to be "in Christ"? According to Romans 8:1, being in Christ Jesus means you have "no condemnation." In Romans 12:5, being in Christ means that you are part of the "one body." In Ephesians 2:13, if you are in Christ Jesus, then you "...have been brought near by the blood of Christ." So, someone who is "in Christ" is someone who is saved from condemnation, is a member of the one body (or church), and has gained admittance by the blood of Jesus. "For

in Him dwells all the fullness of the Godhead bodily; and you are complete in Him, who is the head of all principality and power" (Col. 2:9-10).

This next question is very important. How, then, do we get in Him? Look at the next two verses in Colossians 2. "In Him you were also circumcised with the circumcision made without hands..." How? "...by putting off the body of the sins of the flesh...." How? "...by the circumcision of Christ..." What

is that? "...buried with Him in baptism..." How does baptism do that? "...in which you also were raised with Him through faith in the working of God, who raised Him from the dead" (Col. 2:11-12).

In order to be "in Christ," you must be brought into Christ. This passage shows us that this only happens in baptism. Throughout the New Testament, we are commanded to be baptized (cf. Acts

2:38; Mark 16:16; John 3:5; 1 Pet. 3:21). It is not a work of man, but as Colossians shows us, it is the working of God.

So, who is a Christian? If you were never baptized into Christ, then you cannot be in Christ. If you are not in Christ, then you were never saved, and you cannot be a member of His church because you never gained admittance by the blood of Jesus. Your salvation is incomplete. A Christian is a disciple of Christ. That means that you follow His teachings. Have you followed Christ into the saving waters of baptism?

#### Do you complain?

One of the most challenging and compelling verses in the Bible is Philippians 2:14 – "Do all things without complaining." That verse was not written (only) to children. Keep reading into verse 15, where it implies that those who do complain are at fault in the eyes of God, worthy of blame and guilt for not distinguishing themselves as children of God apart from the crooked world.

Complaining is not becoming of Jesus or His followers! Let's do "all things" for "His good pleasure" (2:13-14)! – DS


