"I Hope God Exists" vs. "I Know God Exists"

Is there any way

Is there any way that you can really know that God exists? Is believing there is a God like a wish? A wish is something we would like to happen, but there is little chance that it will. Is faith more like a dream that has nothing to do with reality?

Or is faith more than an idle dream but there is some level of expectation that the dream likely will

become a reality? We live our lives serving God, and we make choices every day hoping that He does exist. Sometimes when we talk about God and heaven that belief in God shall know I am the Lord" (Exo. 6:7). The Egyptians we say, "Well, I really hope that there is a God." Those words can imply that the odds are that He exists, but there is a chance that He does not.

Or is there another level so that we can really know that God exists. Can mature faith and

hope become a reality? Can I actually know that God does exist? Look at how God uses the word "know" when He came into Egypt to deliver the Jews from bondage.

At the burning bush God gave Moses what most would consider to be an insurmountable task. God answered all of Moses' questions like "Who am I...What is Your name...Suppose they will not believe me?" God answered that third question in three ways. Moses was to cast his rod on the ground before the people, and it would become a serpent. If they did not believe him, he was to put his hand in his garment, and it would come out covered with leprosy. If they would not believe these first two signs, then he was to take water from the river, pour it on the dry ground and it would immediately be turned into blood. Wishes and dreams can become hope. Hope can become so strong that hope becomes knowledge.

See this shown in the events after Moses left Egypt. Moses told the Jews God was about to bring them out of bondage and when that happened, "Then you would know (Ex. 7:5). Pharoah would know this when all the water turned into blood (Ex. 7:17). Moses told Pharaoh that the removal of the frogs at the time Pharaoh selected was so that he might "...know there is like Jehovah God" (Ex. 8:10). Space does not permit looking how often this was said in Egypt (Ex. 8:22; 9:14; 9:29;

10:2; 10:7; 14:4; and many, many others)!

If you believe this happened in Egypt because you trust the Bible, how much greater can your faith be because of what we read about Jesus and His life. Here's the application of this to our lives. Do you wish that Jesus really lived and did what He did? Or do you fondly hope that the odds are that these signs show He is Immanuel? It is far more than this. You can know that God is and that Jesus came. It is not a dream!



Why I Enjoy Teaching One-on-One Bible Studies (Part 1 of 2)

Preaching the gospel is fun! Standing up and proclaiming God's Word to five people or 500 people is one of the most exciting things ever! I wish more men (and young men) desired to be preachers!

But, here's something that I enjoy just as much as standing up and preaching to

a bunch of people. I love an opportunity to sit down at a table one-on-one with someone who is not a Christian and open up the Bible with him/her. For some Christians (and some preachers, included), this can be an intimidating experience. But, when you do it, and the more you do it, the more comfortable you will become and the more you will enjoy it, to the point of wanting to do it more and more. Why do I enjoy one -on-one Bible studies with non-Christians so much?

I am always using the same textbook. I'm not a teacher who is handling math, science, history and health textbooks for multiple classes. I walk into a Bible study with one book. It's the same book for every study and works the same in every study. That makes it easy and fun.

The Bible does not change. In some fields of study, you have to keep up with the latest advancements, the latest findings, the latest updates, the latest amendments, etc. That can be exhausting, and no doubt, you might miss something.

When I walk into a Bible study, I have absolute confidence that nothing has changed in the Bible from the last time I opened it. God's truth "is settled in heaven" (Psa. 119:89), "endures forever" (1 Pet. 1:25) and will not "pass away" (Matt. 24:35).

The Bible is always right. Sometimes people in a study will guestion what the Bible says. Sometimes they will compare what they have heard from someone else. Sometimes they will even disagree with what the Bible is saying

> about something. But "none of these things move me," for "The statutes of the Lord are right" (Psa. 19:8) and His "commandments are righteousness" (Psa. 119:172). It's always right.

> The Bible has all the answers. When I start a study, I know there is always a good chance that someone is going to ask a question for which I don't have the answer myself. That's ok. That doesn't

make me nervous, because I know that the Bible has the answers. Sometimes the answer is, "I don't know, but let's find out." Or sometimes the answer is Deuteronomy 29:29, but for those things that are revealed to us, the answer always begins with, "The Scripture says..."

I can rely on the Bible and not me. Bible studies help me to build my faith in the Bible and to "trust in [His] word" (Psa. 119:42), for it will always "lead me in the way everlasting" (Psa. 139:14). [More next week]

Pump the Brakes

If you have spent any time driving on I-95 through Palm Beach County, Florida, then you know that some of the worst driving in the world happens right here. The key to navigating these roads is to master defensive driving. If you can do that, you will probably be just fine.

First, you have to watch on the road. Spatial aware-

ness is very important. Second, you need to anticipate possible road dangers. This can be a lot more difficult. You never know if someone will suddenly cut you off or slam on their breaks. The best practice is to play it safe. Don't rush, watch the flow of traffic, and if you have to, pump the brakes. Being willing to find an exit from tempted when he is drawn away by his own desires slow down can rescue you from all sorts of hazards.

Most drivers already know these things. But, for some reason we often have trouble applying these same principles to our view of sin. Instead of looking ahead and looking for the warning signs of sin, we allow ourselves to get as close as we possibly can and then are surprised when we have an "accident." Question: If I close my eyes and start driving down I-95 at rush hour, can I really call it an accident when I slam into the first car I come across? It is no different with sin. We need to walk defensively by being aware of our surroundings and anticipating temptations.

Look at the example of David and Bathsheba. David allowed temptation to turn him into an adulterer and murderer. But, was it just an accident? In 2 Samuel 11:2-4, we can see that David ignored several warning signs. The scripture tells that first, he "saw" Bathsheba bathing. Then, he "beheld" her beauty. After that, he "inquired" about her. Finally, he "sent" for her. At which point should David have realized that he was heading down a dangerous path? Seeing Bathsheba could have

> been avoided to begin with if he kept his eyes where he knew they should have been. Instead, he let the temptation blind him to the dangers.

No one accidentally sins. God gives us warning signs. James 1:14-15 tells us, "But each one is and enticed. Then, when desire has conceived, it gives birth to sin; and sin, when it is full-grown, brings

forth death." We need to be aware of the things that tempt us and avoid them at all costs. In 1 Corinthians 10:13, God promised that He will always provide us a way to escape sin. But, we cannot close our eyes and expect to find an exit from sin.

We need to walk defensively. When we see the signs of temptation, instead of barreling through them blindly, pump the brakes. Look for the way out. "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil walks about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour" (1 Pet. 5:8).

God is with you at work!

Some Christians endure much hardship in their workplace from their boss, coworkers, clientele, etc. It breaks my heart to hear of the mistreatments that many have experienced.

Can I remind you what happened to Jacob? Well, he worked for his father-in-law. That might have been a recipe for trou-

ble from the beginning. It started out well, but things changed. Laban's "countenance...was not favorable to him as before" (Gen. 31:2, 5). Jacob "served" "with all his might" and did the best he could (31:5), but things did not improve. Laban "deceived" him and "changed [his] wages ten times" (31:7). Does any of that sound familiar? Have you been mistreated on the job?

Underline three statements and remember these when you go to work: (1) Even in all of this, Jacob said, "But the God of my father has been with me" (31:5). (2) The Lord told him, "I have seen all that Laban is doing to you" (31:12). (3) Jacob realized, "God did not allow him to hurt me" (31:7). Remember in all that happens, God is with you, sees it all and protects you. -DS

Complaint department—not where you think it is

I had someone call me at the church office one time and ask for the HR Office, as they wanted to file a complaint. That was a fun conversation. Have you ever wondered where the "Complaint Department" is for Christians? It's a two-part answer.

Part 1: "Do all things without complaining and disputing" (Phil. 2:14). Well, looks like the "Complaint Department" got closed before it could ever open. Circle the word "all." No complaining! (Ancient Israel apparently missed this memo.)

Part 2: "I pour out my complaint before Him" (Psa. 142:2). When you've got a complaint, consider Luke 6:31 and then Colossians 3:13, then grab 1 Peter 5:7. After that (or better yet, before that), "cry out to the Lord" (Psa. 142:1). Take your "trouble" (142:2) to Him: "My spirit was overwhelmed...No one acknowledges me...No one cares for my soul...I am brought very low...they are stronger than I" (142:3, 4, 6). After you unload your complaint, remember: "You knew my path... You are my refuge...You shall deal bountifully with me" (142:3, 5, 7). Leave it with Him! He will take care of it...and you! - DS

 - 1) How important are you to God?
 - 2) How important are you to Jesus?

4. Learn to Appreciate Flowers (Matt. 6:27-30)!

- a. Jesus' admonition Consider the lilies...if God so clothes the grass...will He not much more clothe you?
- b. John 14:1 Personal questions:
 - 1) Ever had your faith tested?
 - 2) What grade would you give yourself?

5. Give God Your Cares (Matt. 6:31-32)!

- a. Jesus' admonition Therefore, do not worry...your heavenly Father knows...
- b. 1 Peter 5:6-7 Personal questions:
 - 1) Who controls your life?
 - 2) Now, what kind of future do you expect?

6. Commit Yourself to a Cause (Matt. 6:33)!

- a. Jesus' admonition But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness...
- b. Luke 14:25, 33 Personal questions:
 - 1) How do you spend the majority of your free time?
- 2) How do you spend the majority of your monies?

7. Live One Day at a Time (Matt. 6:34)!

- a. Jesus' admonition Therefore, do not worry about tomorrow ...
- b. James 4:13-14 Personal questions:
 - 1) Can you predict [no guessing] the details of tomorrow?
 - 2) Why worry?

Conclusion

ii.

- i. Someone has said, "Worry is like a rocking chair. It gives you something to do, but it gets you nowhere."
 - Philippians 4:6-7 NOTE the sequence: (a) Problems? (b) Pray. (c) Peace!
 - a. An exclusion: Do not worry about anything! *Be anxious for nothing!*
 - b. An inclusion: Pray about everything! In everything by prayer...let your requests be made known to God!
 - c. A conclusion: Peace! The peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard!
