## **Knowing That You Can Know**

The Bible expresses such profound truths in such simple ways that we read them and think we already know this truth, when in reality we do not know what we know! If these words intrigue you, then permit me to use God's simply words to illustrate this.

I vividly recall an experience from our early days in New Zealand in 1962. As we tried to learn

more about the various religious groups meeting there, we visited a denomination I knew nothing about. As we were asked, "Do you know the Lord as your personal Savior?" I had never heard this phraseology before, but I did know the answer. We knew Jesus, we knew He had saved us, so we were wel- do not love truth comed.

How would you have answered that gues-

tion about knowing the Lord? I wish I had known then how the apostle John would have answered it. John said that we not only can know Him, but we can absolutely know that we know the Lord. Hear these words of this great apostle. "Hereby we know that we know Him..." He says more than saying we can know the Lord-he says we can know that we know Him. Let me ask you if you know the Lord as your Savior? Do you absolutely know that you know Him? What evidence can you give that you know Him? Read what John says.

"Now by this we know that we know Him, if we keep His commandments" (1 John 2:3). Read these simple words and think about them. (1) We can know Him. (2) We can know that we know Him. (3) The way we know that we know the Lord is not to just "feel assurance" in our hearts that we know Him. The way we know Him is not just a deep feeling in our souls that we know Him. (4) The divinely given measure of knowing Him is whether we keep His commandments.

> But John says more in the next verse. John says that anyone who says that he knows the Lord and does not obey Him "...is a liar, and the truth is now in Him" (1 John 2:4). We may not consciously know we are lying but God sees us differently.

> In fact, if we do not love the truth about how to serve Him, even God Himself will give us a strong feeling of salvation. "They did not receive the

love of the truth that they might be saved. And for this reason God will send them strong delusion, that they should believe the lie" (2 Thess. 2:10-11). Hear these truths. If we do not obey Him, we do not know Him and He will allow us to strongly believe that we know Him. Let me ask you again. Do you know the Lord as your personal Savior?

If I do not obey Him, I do not know Him. I do not love Him (John 14:15). If I do not obey Him, I am not His friend (John 15:14). How do you know you know Him and love Him?



## "I Will Die on That Hill"

This expression, with an obvious military origin, is often used in everyday life to express an absolute willingness to make a strong defense and hold a position (in a particular argument), with no intent to ever consider compromising or backing down (even if presented with information that makes one's

position indefensible). It is being unmovably committed.

In a surprising and very unfortunate conversation a while ago, someone used that expression about the particular position that they held. I am not ments are not ... writing this for that person's benefit but for yours.

In the conversation we were having, one of the main topics of discussion was the relationship of baptism to one's salvation from sin. The individual with whom I was conversing was adamant that bap-

tism, while a good and appropriate action, has no connection at all to the forgiveness of sins. What was interesting, but not unusual, is that no attempt was made in their responses to ever answer the verses in the New Testament that clearly connect baptism with being "saved" from sins (Mark 16:16; 1 Pet. 3:21), obtaining "the forgiveness of sins" (Acts 2:38), washing "away" sins (Acts 22:16), getting "into Christ" (Rom. 6:3; Gal. 3:27) and "into His kingdom" (John 3:5). Their position was that salvation occurs at faith and baptism is not essential.

When it was apparent that the truth was not moving this person, I asked the individual a question that I have asked many others over the years. It is not designed as a "gotcha" question, but as an eye-opening, finally-make-the-connection question. Question: "Which one of these statements do you believe is correct? (1) The Bible teaches that baptism does not save us. (2) The Bible teaches that baptism does now save us."

> Here is the answer that I received: "I will answer your question with #1, that baptism does not save, and I will die on that hill. We will all find out at the judgment."

Here's the problem. In 1 Peter 3:21, God says plainly, "Baptism does now save us." This person dismissed that Bible teaching and answered, "Baptism does not save us." In a daring response, the individual picked a manmade doctrine over a God

-given doctrine, and did not just pick it, but laid down the "I will die on that hill" pledge.

Friends, the Bible says plainly that we are saved through faith (Eph. 2:8) and plainly that baptism saves (1 Pet. 3:21). Those statements are not contradictory, nor are they designed for individuals to take sides. "The sum of [God's] word is truth" (Psa. 119:160), which means BOTH are truthfaith PLUS baptism saves (Mark 16:16). God expects us to obey the sum of His word before we die and before judgment.

#### "The night in which He was betrayed"

We've heard it so often that maybe it has lost its impact-"... the Lord Jesus on the same night in which He was betrayed..." (1 Cor. 11:23). What night? The night He was betrayed! That's not just a chronological marker or a filler to make Paul's sentences even longer! That event was tragic!

After Jesus washed 24 grimy feet and explained the heart of a true servant, He quoted Psalm 41:9, "He who eats bread with Me has lifted up his heel against Me" (John 13:18). Then, right before He said, "one of you shall betray me," the verse says, "He was troubled in spirit." The Greek for "troubled" means, "to cause inward

turmoil, disturb, agitate with grief and anxiety" (cf. John 11:33-35; 12:27-28). Jesus was inwardly torn up about being betrayed. But, not just Jesus! When He announced this, His apostles "were exceedingly sorrowful" (Matt. 26:22) with distress and grief.

One of Jesus' closest friends betrayed Him to the malicious mob, setting off the sequence of events that would end in His crucifixion. That ought to exceedingly grieve us today also! -DS





## **"Does This Offend You?"** by Kyle Butt

"I'm offended!" "That is offensive to me!" "You must not do that, because it offends me!" You will often hear statements such as these on television, the radio, or any number of media outlets. Those who use these types of sentiments throw them down like a gauntlet, daring you to continue. It is as if the fact that they are offended should cause you to stop whatever it is you are saying or doing that offends them. Somehow,



"I'm offended," has become the verbal alarm that signals some sort of mistake or misstep on the part of the speaker.

The fact is, however, just because a person is offended is not necessarily a reason to stop saying or doing something. Jesus often offended people, but that did not stop Him from preaching and teaching the truth. When a person takes offense at something, it often says much more about the heart of the one who is offended than it does about the person who supposedly "caused" the offense.

On one occasion, after Jesus taught about how the Pharisees had abused God's Word, His apostles came to him and said, "Do You know that the Pharisees were offended when they heard this saying?" (Matthew 15:11). It is almost as if the apostles thought like many people today. They seemed to be indicating that, because Jesus had offended the Pharisees, He should stop teaching those ideas or change His message. Jesus, however, thought nothing of the sort. He knew that His message offended the Pharisees because of the hardness of their hearts, not because of the way the message was delivered. Jesus understood that the hearts of the Pharisees needed changing, not His message or even the way He delivered it. He responded to His apostles by saying, "Let them alone. They are blind leaders of the blind" (Matthew 15:14). Surely we can agree that the Pharisees would have been further offended by Jesus' follow up comments. Their offense, however, was misplaced. They were blind to the truth. They should not have been offended at Jesus' message. Jesus' message was the truth that God had sent to set them free (John 8:32).

Mark 6:1-6 tells about a time Jesus returned to His hometown of Nazareth. He went to the synagogue and preached the Word as He often did in other places. The townspeople who heard Him murmured, "Where did this man get these things?... Is this not the carpenter, the Son of Mary, and brother of James, Joses, and Simon? And are not His sisters here with us?" The text then states, "And they were offended at Him." The fact that they were offended did not mean Jesus had done anything wrong. It did not mean that He should have taken a different approach to preaching in His hometown. It meant only that the hearts of the hearers were calloused, sinful, and refused to recognize God's message when it was preached. Jesus never cowered to the "I'm offended so you must stop" tactic, and neither should we.

At one time Jesus preached to a great multitude of His disciples. Many of His own disciples did not understand the message and "murmured" about Jesus' preaching (John 6:61). Jesus then asked them, "Does this offend you?" (John 6:61). Many in our day would say that if Jesus offended the crowd, He was sinning and should change His message, change His delivery style, or re-word His statement to be less offensive. Jesus, however, responded by saying, "What then if you should see the Son of Man ascend where He was before?" (6:61). What was Jesus' point? If the people were offended with Jesus' message that He was the bread that came down from heaven, just think how they would react if they saw Jesus ascend back into heaven, which was what He planned to do in the near future (Luke 24:50-53).<sup>1</sup> Not only did He refuse to quit preaching or change His message, He added something to the message that the audience would have had more problems accepting! Obviously, Jesus did not feel the need to stop preaching or change His message because His audience was offended.

It is certainly true that Christians should let their speech "be with grace, seasoned with salt" (Colossians 4:6). It is also true that Christians should avoid unnecessary offense (Matthew 17:27; 1 Corinthians 8). The Gospel, however, is exclusive and offensive to many people. Those with dishonest, sinful hearts will always be offended at the simplicity and straightforwardness of Christ's Truth. As Christians, we should follow the example of our Lord. We must never be bullied into silence or intimidated into changing our message simply because a person or group is offended at the truth.

#### Endnotes

<sup>1</sup> It is interesting that when Stephen was martyred, he exclaimed that he saw Jesus in heaven "standing at the right hand of God" (Acts 7:56). This statement so offended the mob that "they cried out with a loud voice, stopped their ears, and ran at him" (Acts 7:57).
