

See What Happens When the Bible Is Read

What happens

when men read

the Bible deter-

worshiping God

The return from Babylonian captivity is truly one of the least known parts of the history of Israel but marks one of the most remarkable periods in the lives of God's chosen people. When Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, left the city of Jerusalem, he left nothing but ruins behind. The walls were

gone and no longer was there a temple, a priesthood, an altar, an ark of the covenant, two tablets of stone with the Ten Commandments inscribed on them—there was no city—it all lay in ruins. It was destined to stay this way for seventy years, for God had promised a return of a righteous remnant to restore the great city.

The return was not immediately completed **mined to find the** (Neh. 8:18). When they found they had not been nor was Jerusalem rebuilt quickly. When the seventy will of God years of captivity ended, Zerubbabel brought the largest number of Jews with him back to the city. The population of Jerusalem during the celebration of its feast days before the captivity had to be hundreds of thousands. The number who returned with Zerubbabel was 42,360 (Ezra 2:64). They did not immediately rebuild the city but they first built the temple. True worship was not restored until Ezra and those who came with him brought that about. Nehemiah came later and the city was still devastated, and he brought about the rebuilding of the walls so the city could be safely repopulated. God had promised and it had happened!

With the temple, the priesthood and the walls completed, all the Jews-all the men, women and children who were old enough to understand—assembled in an open square. Ezra stood on a large podium and brought the copy of the law of God with him. The Bible described it this way: "So they read distinctly from the book, in the Law of God; and they gave the sense, and helped them to understand the reading" (Neh. 8:8). He began at daylight and finished reading the Word of God at noon.

> The results were amazing. "All the people wept, when they heard the words of the Law" (Neh. 8:9). They listened to the reading of the Word of God for the next seven days and there was a great revival worshiping God in the right way in keeping one of the feast days, they immediately did what they had

learned from simply reading the Bible. They did it the right way. "For since the days of Joshua the son of Nun until that day the children of Israel had not done so. And there was very great gladness" (Neh. 8:17).

This is precisely what respecting the Bible brings about. Read the book. Make it simple enough so even children can understand it. Let the listeners' hearts be humbled and determined to do His will and change their lives to do it God's way. What would happen if America had this kind of heart!?

But Did You Worship?

Sometimes we may equate "being in an auditorium" with worshiping. Sometimes we may associate "gathering with other people on Sunday" as worship. But, when we are (1) in an auditorium (2) with other Christians on Sunday, do we actually worship? That is a critical question to answer.

We have a God-given responsibility to "worship" God (John 4:23-24), to "praise" God (Heb. 13:15), to "glorify" God (Rev. 15:4), to "Give to the Lord the glory due His name" (1 Chron. 16:28-29). This requires desire, thought, effort, determination, activity, etc. There is nothing "passive" about worshiping God. I am not to be an observer or spectator. From beginning to end, my heart and body must be engaged.

However, we sometimes place the emphasis in the wrong place. It is not that some things are not essential to worship, and it is not that some things could cause heartfelt worship to be made unacceptable to God, but we must not lose sight of the real purpose and focus of our worship. Give this some thought.

You may go to worship on Sunday (not Saturday), as Scripture teaches (Acts 20:7; 1 Cor. 16:1-2), but did you worship? You may partake of the Lord's Supper every single first day of the week, as Scripture teaches (Acts 20:7; 1 Cor. 11:1734; 16:1-2), but did you worship? You may sing with the congregation without the accompaniment of mechanical instruments, as Scripture teaches (Eph. 5:19; Col. 3:16; Heb. 13:15), but did you worship? You may ensure that you are in a place were males lead the worship assembly, as Scripture teaches (1 Tim. 2:8-14; 1 Cor. 11:3; 14:34-35), but did you worship?

You may arrive on time and stay for the entire service, but did you worship? You may give a large amount of money, but did you worship? You may stay awake through the whole sermon, but did you worship? You may There is nothing sing out, follow along with the prayer and say "passive" "Amen," and take of the bread and juice, but did you worship? about

> It may look, on the outside, like you did everything right and that you were worshiping God, but only you and the Lord know your heart to know if

you truly did worship Him. Jesus spoke of those who misplaced the real focus of worship and said, "These people draw near to Me with their mouth, and honor Me with their lips, but their heart is far from Me" (Matt. 15:8). In the next verse, Jesus said that such worship (which is not, by definition, actually worship) is "in vain" (15:9).

Our Lord is "worthy to be praised" (Psa. 18:3) and to "receive glory and honor" (Rev. 4:11). When we gather with other Christians on Sunday, let's make sure we worship Him.

Ancient Words, Ever True

Matt. 24:35). In Romans 3:1-2, Paul talks about how God preserved the Old Testament, "What advantage then has the Jew?...because to them were committed the oracles of God." And now, that responsibility was passed to the Lord's church, who have kept them perfectly for 2,000 years. How amazing!

The second stanza reads, "Words of life, words of hope, give us strength, help us cope; in this world where're we roam, ancient words will guide us home." The Bible gives us comfort. No matter what tragedies may happen in our lives, we can always go the words of God to lift our spirits. Psalm 119:54 tells us, "Your statutes have been my songs In the house of my pilgrimage." Whatever life brings, I can rejoice in the words of God.

The third stanza says, "Holy words of our faith handed down to this age, came to us thru sacrifice; O, heed the faithful words of Christ." We continue the reminder of the preservation of the Scriptures, but focus, this time, on the sacrifices men made to bring them to us. Over the millennia, men of God poured their time and energy into copying the Bible. And in the pursuit of translating it into common lan-

Consider 1 Thessalonians 5:22—"Abstain from every form of evil." Underline "every form." What "form" and "how close" can I get to sexual impurity, moral impurity, greed, hatred, jealousy, wrath, selfishness, envy, drinking, etc., etc. (Gal. 5:19-21)? Let us NOT see "how close" we can get to sin! Let us hold ourselves far away! – DS
