The Three Hardest English Words

There are some really long words in our language. I remember years ago when I first heard what was at that time the longest one. It was antidisestablishmentarianism. I learned it when watching the national spelling bee. It took me a while to learn it, but I mastered how to say it.

"Supercalifragilisticexpialidocious" is not recognized as a word, but a nonsense word from Mary Poppins. It is one that, while not easily pronounced, can be sung by those who saw the movie. If you have ever wondered, the longest word in the dictionary is "pneumonoultramicroscopicsilicovolcanoconiosis" a medical term describing lung infection caused by said, so often not plagues were removed he kept on sinning! Even in inhaling minute particles of dust.

As difficult as these words are to say, they are not the hardest to say as a three-word phrase. The phrase has only eleven letters in it, but there is something about these three words that makes them so difficult to say. In fact, these words were unspoken for the first 2,500 years men were on this earth. Every person could have said them, but no one ever did. What are these three words?

The three English words hardest to say are, "I have sinned." Who was the first person to use these words in the Bible? It was not Adam or Eve in the garden, for instead of saying what was true, they blamed the serpent or the woman whom God had made. For some strange reason, these three words are hard to understand. They were not said by the millions of people who perished in the flood. They were not said at the Tower of Babel. They were not said by Abraham when confronted in the lie he told about Sarah. They were not said by Jacob who stole the blessing and the birthright from Esau. They were not said by Joseph's brothers. Such an important phrase, but so hard to say!

> The first time this phrase is found in the Bible was when Pharoah said these words twice to get plagues removed from Egypt. How genuinely were they spoken? Evidently not at all, for when the our day, sometimes men call upon God with these words but actions show they were not sincere.

They were spoken by Balaam who beat his donkey and talked to him. The false prophet then saw the angel and said these words but likely he was talking about doing wrong to the donkey. He said the words but kept on going on his journev to curse Israel.

The phrase is found less than 20 times in the Bible, and in a historical setting, David and the prodigal son use them nearly half of the time. Now think about yourself. You have wronged God and others, but how often do we use them?

The Truth About Jesus (Part 1 of 7): The Introduction

Three words, so

easy to say, but

never said. When

even meant.

There are 31,102 verses in the Bible. That's a lot! If you memorized one verse per day, you could have the whole Bible memorized in just over 85 years. Of course, every verse in the Bible ultimately is about Jesus Christ—Someone is coming (summary of the Old Testament books), Someone is here

(summary of Matthew through John), Someone is coming again (summary of Acts through Revelation). But, if you could memorize one verse that would give you an overview of the life, purpose, greatness and truth of that Someone, start with 1 Timothy 3:16.

You will probably notice in your Bible that most of the verse is set apart in its formatting, similar to the way that the book of Psalms or other poetic sections in your Bible might appear. In doing so, the translators help us to see six pivotal truths about Jesus Christ that are integral to the story of the Bible. But, before Paul gets to those six transforming truths, he introduces them with these words: "And without controversy great is the mystery of godliness." What is he telling us?

Paul emphasizes truth's CERTAINTY: "without controversy." The Greek word literally means, "that which one confesses," and it is defined as "most certain, uncontestable, undeniable, beyond dispute, without doubt." Think about God using that word to describe the truth of Jesus Christ—it is without controversy and beyond dispute. Only a foolish mortal would deny or argue against the undeniable!

Paul emphasizes truth's SUPREMACY: "great is." The truth of Jesus Christ and God's plan to save mankind is of surpassing importance. Nothing compares. It is likened to oxygen—we cannot survive without it. There is not (and never will be) anything greater or more important in your life.

The truth of **Jesus Christ is** certain, supreme, clear and relevant.

Paul emphasizes truth's CLARITY: "the mystery." The word does not mean mysterious or incapable of being understood. Quite the opposite. That which (i.e., "the mystery of Christ," Eph. 3:4) "was not made known" in "other ages...has now been revealed" (3:5). God's plan for salvation through His Son has been clearly revealed in the gospel.

Paul emphasizes truth's RELEVANCY: "of godliness." On the one hand, "godliness" stands for the entire Christian system, which has been revealed. On the other hand, the truth of Jesus Christ leads one to a life of "godliness," referring to one's devotion and conformity to God's will, as one seeks to please God in all things.

The truth of Jesus Christ is certain, supreme, clear and relevant to our lives! As the Lord's church, we are "the pillar and ground of the truth" (1 Tim. 3:15). We must know it! We must teach it and defend it! Let's study this together.

God Is Worthy of All Praise

Every first day of the week, members of the Lord's church assemble to worship their heavenly Father according to the Scriptures (cf. Acts 20:6-7; 1 Cor. 11:18-32; 1 Cor. 16:1-2). Many people, however, feel that going to church is not for them. They say they don't need a building to worship God.

They can worship God anywhere in their daily living. This feeling is not supported by the Scriptures. In Psalm 150, the Lord says there is a proper place to worship, a proper reason to worship, and everyone is required to worship.

The Lord to worship.

In the first verse, the psalm tells us that worship is done in the sanctuary of God. "Praise the Lord! Praise God in His sanctuary; Praise Him in His mighty firmament!" When the psalm was written, the sanctuary of the Lord was the temple. Today, however, the temple of the Lord is the church (Eph. 2:19-22). "Now, therefore, you are no longer strangers and foreigners, but fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God...in whom the whole building, being fitted together, grows into a holy temple in the Lord..." If you are not assembled with the church, you are not in the right place for worship.

In verse 2, we see why God should be worshipped. "Praise Him for His mighty acts; Praise Him according to His

excellent greatness!" Who is the God that we worship? He is the God who spoke the universe into existence, who parted the Red Sea, who gave His only begotten Son to die for the sins of the world. Who can compare to the power, wonder, and love of the Lord? The Lord must be praised because He is worthy. If your worship is not aimed at praising the Lord, your heart is not in the right place for worship.

Finally, the psalmist explains that everyone is required to worship God. "Let everything that has breath praise the Lord." Every created being owes its existence to the Lord. Not only that, but He also provides daily blessings, caring for us like a devoted Father. Psalm 103:13 tells us, "As a father pities his children, So the Lord pities those who fear Him. For He knows our frame; He remembers that we are dust." If our Father is so caring, why would we not take the small

amount of time He requires of our week to give thanks to Him for all He has done for us?

God is worthy of all praise. He has demonstrated His love for us in all aspects of our lives. Are we so self-important that we think we don't need to demonstrate our love in return? We all must humbly gather together in the proper place He designated for worship and with the proper reason He designated for worship. Don't miss out on all the blessings of worship by forsaking the assembly.

Doing what's best for the church

Most preachers live by a guiding principle that they will strive to make decisions and take whatever actions are necessary to do what is best for the church. Removing self and being truly determined to put the needs of a congregation above one's own personal desires is essential to the betterment of the Lord's people and the Lord's purpose on this earth. Most elders live by that same guiding principle. Most deacons long for that, as well.

But, here's something to consider. Is that only a life principle that someone like an elder or a preacher are committed to follow? Or is that not a determination that God wants all of His

That's merely a small part and a natural outgrowth of having Christ as "Lord in your heart" (1 Pet. 3:15, NASB), because doing what's best for the church (read that as, "doing what's best for Jesus' body and Jesus' bride") is doing what's best for Jesus Himself. Read the second sentence in the first paragraph again. Is that you? – DS

Source material

Usually when I fly, I take a lot of study material with me to work on various lessons or projects. If I'm working on lessons, I will usually take pictures of the passage(s) in my wide-margin Bible, so that I have the notes from my Bible readily available on the flight. It is also extremely helpful, when I'm sitting on the plane, to be able to zoom in on the text in the picture,

making it easier to read the very small (multi-colored) print that I have written in my margins and even between the lines of the printed Biblical text.

Earlier this year, a young lady next me was looking at my phone, as I zoomed in and out on the

text and my notes. She couldn't tell exactly what it was, but she commented, "That's quite some source material that you're reading." I showed her that it was my Bible with handwritten notes around it...and she immediately shut down, turned away and stopped talking to me. That hurt. But what she said stuck me. The Bible is our "source material"! It is our source of truth (John 17:17), of life (Phil. 2:16), of all things that we need to serve God acceptably (2 Pet. 1:3). – DS
